Collection Overview

Macrophages are diverse in their phenotypic markers, physiology, and biological role. Classically activated and alternatively activated macrophages are part of the range of macrophage types. The nomenclature is also diverse. Classically activated macrophages are described as M1 cells and alternatively activated macrophages are labeled as M2. Alternatively activated macrophages are involved in wound healing, their antimicrobial effector functions are reduced and their role in infectious diseases is of great interest. Alternatively activated macrophages of human or mice origin show many shared similarities, but also some interesting differences in gene expression and transcriptional markers. Surface expression of phenotypical markers such as are used to
