Academic Stabilization Initiative

The Academic Stabilization Initiative provides structural and operational consolidation of previously autonomous units or functions in order to achieve a performance based outcome that exceeds what could be achieved working independently. Over the past decade the academic structure, college names, and departmental clusters on the Baton Rouge (SUBR) campus have been in continual flux. In response to the Southern University Strategic Plan being presented to the Board of Supervisors in April 2016, the Office of the Executive Vice President and Provost has worked in tandem with the faculty and academic deans to propose a stable academic structure for the Baton Rouge campus.

This Academic Stabilization Initiative is essential to insure that Southern University has properly aligned its academic programs and administration in a manner, scope, and sequence that allows the University:

- To have distinctive programs that provide high quality education;
- To attract top student scholars and faculty;
- To produce prepared high-quality graduates; and
- To lead the University's efforts toward becoming a Carnegie Research University high research activity DRU/H within the decade.

This proposed academic structure promotes interdisciplinary engagement and supports the articulated development of the current and anticipated SACS Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP). While creating efficiencies (e.g., elimination of course duplication), the stabilized academic structure has the potential for enhancing traditional majors alongside innovative inter-departmental programs for better response and adjustment to the demands of the job market. The administrative structure frames each academic major to ensure a rigorous general education foundation, focused on developing strong written and oral communication skills, with interpersonal skills and creativity in problem solving skills that can lead to gainful employment.

This structure supports the requisite curricular requirements of each of the existing SUBR degree majors, the state guidelines for general education, and provides fertile context to the establishment of new academic offerings. Each of the academic college configurations results in significantly increased benefits and opportunities. Three primary considerations served as guiding criteria during the academic stabilization process – efficiency, growth, and excellence.

- 1. The efficiency criterion prioritizes the creation of synergy among programs, faculty, and students.
- 2. The growth criterion requires each college and unit to result in a likelihood of increased enrollment and higher retention and graduation rates.
- 3. The excellence criterion establishes intra-college options for securing new sources of extramural funding, possibilities for new research consortia, and a dynamic attractive to high caliber graduate students.

The Academic Stabilization Initiative provides new and improved collaborative research, teaching, and service opportunities for faculty and students. Even more, it portends the anticipated development of new academic majors. New programs (particularly, at the graduate level) will serve as a magnet for faculty, students, stakeholders, industry, and government.

The Academic Stabilization Initiative is the proactive in engagement in administrative opportunities across the Southern University and A & M College that:

- (1) reduce administrative duplication;
- (2) promote innovative collaboration across silos; and
- (3) encourage efficiencies and cost-savings.

Additionally, the Academic Stabilization Initiative is intended to identify fiscal relief by promoting self-generated funds across all units – academic, agricultural, athletic, and auxiliary. For example, academic units seeking to employ Associate Deans will need to identify a non-General Fund source of funds.







Policy:

Based upon the recommendation of the Chief Academic Officer of a degree-granting campus of the Southern University and A & M College System, a Chancellor may forward to the President the name of a deceased student for the awarding of an honorary posthumous degree. Upon approval by the President, the remaining steps are the same as for the undergraduate procedure (i.e., ratification by the Board of Supervisors.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

The Board of Supervisors of Southern University and Agricultural and Mechanical College (Board) hereby extends as Chancellor of Southern University Law Center (SULC), John K. Pierre, and (Chancellor) who hereby accepts the following terms of employment.

TERM OF EMPLOYMENT

The employment established in this Agreement is for an initial term of three (3) years and one (1) month, commencing on April 1, 2016 and ending on June 30, 2019.

The Board affirms the Chancellor's initial appointment as a full professor with tenure at SULC.

DUTIES AND CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT

The Chancellor shall report and be responsible to the Board through the System President as required in the Board's by-laws.

The Chancellor's employment shall be subject to all other rules, orders and regulations established and adopted by the Board, as amended from time to time except as such rules, orders and regulations conflict with the express terms of this Agreement.

The Chancellor shall comply with all other laws and regulations applicable to his specific office and public officials.

The Chancellor will be subject to an annual review by the System President to be conducted in a manner and by a procedure determined by the System President. The President along with the Chancellor will establish performance goals. The goals and objectives will be the basis for his performance review for the three (3) years of the Agreement and any extensions thereof.

COMPENSATION

The Chancellor shall be paid an annual salary of two hundred eighteen thousand two hundred eighty three dollars and ninety six cents (\$218,283.96) for the term of this Agreement as compensation for his services while serving as Chancellor. This annual salary will be paid in the form of equal monthly installments no later than the last calendar day of each month in accordance with SUS's payroll procedures.

The Chancellor shall receive a housing allowance of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) annually and an automobile allowance of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) annually, which shall be paid in the form of equal monthly installments no later than the last calendar day of each month in accordance with SUS's payroll procedures.

The Chancellor will be eligible to participate in the benefits plans for health, insurance, retirement and any other benefits that are available for full time administrative employees.

The Chancellor will be required to meet the following benchmarks annually. The President through the Board has the discretion and the decision to provide incentive compensation to the Chancellor based upon the following benchmarks. The benchmarks are listed below:

- 1. Improve overall graduation from the base year of 2015-2016.
- 2. Increase retention rates from the base year of 2015-2016.
- 3. Improve alumni participation and alumni giving from the base year of 2015-2016.
- 4. Improve bar passage rates from the base year of 2015-2016.
- 5. Increase faculty scholarship and research based upon the scholarship and research of the last SULC AALS report.

TERMINATION

Termination Without Cause

The Chancellor may be terminated without cause at the recommendation of the System President with approval of the Board. If the Chancellor is terminated without cause, he shall have the right to select an option as stated herein. If the Chancellor is terminated without cause and elects to become a full-time professor, he shall be entitled to eighty percent (80%) of his salary that he would have received as Chancellor for the balance of the initial term of this Agreement.

The Chancellor, upon termination as Chancellor without cause, shall have the right to: (a) remain at SULC and assume the position of full professor with tenure at SULC or such other campus as may be mutually agreed upon by the parties or (b) he may elect to leave SULC. For purposes of this paragraph, the Chancellor shall receive eighty percent (80%) of his salary for the balance of the term of this agreement and upon the end of the term of this agreement, the Chancellor's faculty compensation shall be calculated as the average of the three highest paid faculty salaries in the department where the Chancellor is tenured.

If the Chancellor elects to leave SULC following a termination without cause he will not be entitled to any further compensation beyond amounts earned as of his last day of employment. Any amounts owed Chancellor under this section shall be paid in the form of a lump sum no later than fifteen (15) days after Chancellor's last day of employment.

The parties agree that the above payments represent liquidated damages and are all that is due should the Agreement be terminated without cause, except ordinary claims for benefits accrued and vested as of Chancellor's termination under any pension or welfare benefit plan sponsored and/or maintained by SUS for the benefit of full-time administrative employees.

Resignation

The Chancellor shall provide the System President with notice of resignation of at least ninety (90) days unless such notice is waived by the System President or occasioned by illness or disability. If the Chancellor voluntarily elects to leave his position as Chancellor during the term of employment herein he shall be entitled to assume his appointment as a full professor with tenure within the Southern University System at the President's approval. He shall be compensated at the average of the three highest paid faculty in the department he is tenured. The Chancellor is not entitled to summer faculty pay unless agreed by the President. His faculty position will begin at the start of the fall or spring semester immediately following the expiration of the ninety (90) day notice period or following the effective date of his resignation should it be sooner.

Expiration

After the end of the term of employment specified herein, the Chancellor shall revert to his position as an at-will Chancellor without any action required on the part of the President or Board. The Chancellor shall continue as Chancellor on an at-will basis upon expiration of this agreement subject to the same terms and conditions as other unclassified administrative staff. In the event the Chancellor is terminated or resigns after the expiration of this agreement, he shall be entitled to assume his appointment to the faculty at the same compensation as if he has resigned during the term of this agreement.

Termination For Cause

If the Chancellor is terminated for cause, he shall be terminated from all positions with SULC immediately, including his position as a tenured faculty member. If terminated for cause, with the exception of amounts earned prior to the Chancellor's termination date and ordinary claims for benefits accrued and vested as of Chancellor's termination under any pension or welfare benefit plan sponsored and/or maintained by SUS for the benefit of full-time administrative employees, the Chancellor shall be entitled to no further payments whatsoever after his termination date. The reasons for termination shall be provided to the Chancellor in writing and he shall be afforded an opportunity of not less than ten (10) days to respond to such notice and a due process hearing before the Board or a designated Board Committee.

The Board may terminate the Chancellor for cause for the following reasons but not limited to:

Conviction of a crime of moral turpitude;

A finding of academic dishonesty as that term is defined in the Faculty Handbook;

Felony indictment for a crime of moral turpitude or other crime which would bring SUSLA's and Southern University System's reputation in disrepute;

Neglect of duty; and

Disability (defined as an inability to fulfill the duties of Chancellor, with the provision of reasonable accommodations, for a period of at least ninety (90) consecutive days.).

SERVICE ON CORPORATE BOARDS

The Chancellor may serve as a member of the Board of Directors of other public or private corporations so long as such service is not a violation of any law and will not interfere with or detract from the performance of his duties and responsibilities as Chancellor or create any conflict of interest involving or affecting the SULC. The Chancellor shall obtain approval from the System President prior to accepting an appointment to, or agreeing to continued service on, any such Board. The System President shall not unreasonably withhold its approval.

EDUCATIONAL BENEFITS

The Chancellor and the members of his immediate family shall be entitled to any privileges or benefits of attendance at SULC or such other campus within the Southern University System as afforded other full-time employees of the SULC or other campuses within the Southern University System.

For purposes of this paragraph, the Chancellor shall receive eighty percent (80%) of his salary for the balance of the term of this agreement and upon the end of the term of this agreement, the Chancellor's faculty compensation shall be calculated as the average of the three highest paid faculty salaries in the department where the Chancellor is tenured.

If the Chancellor elects to leave SUSLA following a termination without cause he will not be entitled to any further compensation beyond amounts earned as of his last day of employment. Any amounts owed Chancellor under this section shall be paid in the form of a lump sum no later than fifteen (15) days after Chancellor's last day of employment.

The parties agree that the above payments represent liquidated damages and are all that is due should the Agreement be terminated without cause, except ordinary claims for benefits accrued

and vested as of Chancellor's termination under any pension or welfare benefit plan sponsored and/or maintained by SUS for the benefit of full-time administrative employees.

Resignation

The Chancellor shall provide the System President with notice of resignation of at least ninety (90) days unless such notice is waived by the System President or occasioned by illness or disability. If the Chancellor voluntarily elects to leave his position as Chancellor during the term of employment herein he shall be entitled to assume his appointment as a full professor with tenure within the Southern University System upon the approval of the President. He shall be compensated at the average of the three highest paid faculty in the department he is tenured. The Chancellor is not entitled to summer faculty pay unless agreed by the President. His faculty position will begin at the start of the fall or spring semester immediately following the expiration of the ninety (90) day notice period or following the effective date of his resignation should it be sooner.

Expiration

After the end of the term of employment specified herein, the Chancellor shall revert to his position as an at-will Chancellor without any action required on the part of the President or Board. The Chancellor shall continue as Chancellor on an at-will basis upon expiration of this agreement subject to the same terms and conditions as other unclassified administrative staff. In the event the Chancellor is terminated or resigns after the expiration of this agreement, he shall be entitled to assume his appointment to the faculty at the same compensation as if he has resigned during the term of this agreement.

Termination For Cause

If the Chancellor is terminated for cause, he shall be terminated from all positions with SUSLA immediately, including his position as a tenured faculty member. If terminated for cause, with the exception of amounts earned prior to the Chancellor's termination date and ordinary claims for benefits accrued and vested as of Chancellor's termination under any pension or welfare benefit plan sponsored and/or maintained by SUS for the benefit of full-time administrative employees, the Chancellor shall be entitled to no further payments whatsoever after his termination date. The reasons for termination shall be provided to the Chancellor in writing and he shall be afforded an opportunity of not less than ten (10) days to respond to such notice and a due process hearing before the Board or a designated Board Committee.

The Board may terminate the Chancellor for cause for the following reasons but not limited to:

Conviction of a crime of moral turpitude;

A finding of academic dishonesty as that term is defined in the Faculty Handbook;

Felony indictment for a crime of moral turpitude or other crime which would bring SUSLA's and Southern University System's reputation in disrepute;

Neglect of duty; and

Disability (defined as an inability to fulfill the duties of Chancellor, with the provision of reasonable accommodations, for a period of at least ninety (90) consecutive days.).

SERVICE ON CORPORATE BOARDS

The Chancellor may serve as a member of the Board of Directors of other public or private corporations so long as such service is not a violation of any law and will not interfere with or detract from the performance of his duties and responsibilities as Chancellor or create any conflict of interest involving or affecting the SUSLA. The Chancellor shall obtain approval from the System President prior to accepting an appointment to, or agreeing to continued service on, any such Board. The System President shall not unreasonably withhold its approval.

EDUCATIONAL BENEFITS

The Chancellor and the members of his immediate family shall be entitled to any privileges or benefits of attendance at SUSLA or such other campus within the Southern University System as afforded other full-time employees of the SUSLA or other campuses within the Southern University System.

He also indicated that the contract did not seem to protect the interest of the University and was more favorable for the employee. In addition, Atty. Clayton noted that there were no benchmarks included in the contract.

Dr. Belton explained that in order to attract the best candidates certain terms are standard and common practice in higher education when hiring university chancellors. President Belton stated that the document has changed in that there is a time period included of 3 years and also the fact that the salary is comparable to that of their peers.

Rev. Gant stated that even though it may be common practice to grant tenure, the University is operating in uncommon times and perhaps the common practice may not be feasible at this time. He stated that he prefers to deal with positions and not a particular person.

Dr. Tarver stated that the contract is an evolving document and contains certain protections that the University has to provide to individuals at this administrative level. He stated that there is nothing unusual about the contract presented and that it does not differ from any other contracts that have been done in recent years for chancellors at other campuses in the system.

In addition, it would be unfair to have some chancellors in the SU System with tenure and others without tenure. Chairman Tarver stated that perhaps the topic of contracts should be discussed during the upcoming retreat and that the Board should not delay approval of the contract at the expense of an individual who is prepared to begin working.

A. Interim Financial Report as of December 2015, SUS

System Vice President for Finance and Business Affairs Flandus McClinton reviewed the written financial report that was included in the packet for each Board member.

B. Legislative Update

Mr. Rodney Braxton of Southern Strategies-LA appeared before the board and reviewed a summary of the bills that would affect higher education and those that are scheduled to be brought before the Legislature during the current session. He informed Board members that there remains a \$70 million shortfall in the state budget and stated that there would probably be a special session immediately following the regular session to address the state's budget issues. IMPLEMENTING LEADERSHIP

Southern will undertake the implementation of this strategic plan in keeping with the approval of the SU Board of Supervisors. Based on the goals and strategies articulated in this plan, annual action plans will be crafted to implement specific initiatives. These action plans will be implemented by Southern's administration and other responsible offices at various levels of academic, as well as, non-academic units with oversight and accountability.

This implementation will engage and empower faculty, staff, students, and other constituents through Southern's structure of institutional governance. Using this strategic plan as an overall framework, each college, school, and other academic or non-academic unit will develop its own strategic plan demonstrating congruity and consistency with the University's strategic plan. These plans will outline their respective strategies and improve their national and international competitiveness. The plan recognizes the interdependence of various funding sources and the importance of partnership in supporting key initiatives. The plan will account for the University's dependence on both public and private sources of contribution, including fees and tuition, sponsored funding, internal reallocations, private giving, and state funding.

Resource development, annual budget allocations, and reallocations will demonstrate alignment with the priorities of the strategic plan and related initiatives. Comprehensive assessment of progress on the strategic plan, including the specifically defined metrics and benchmarks for peer comparisons, will be conducted every year. This will involve the participation of assessment committees with representation from appropriate University constituencies. This culture of assessment/data-driven decisions will also include annual assessment of funding investments regarding the progress on critical benchmarks and metrics. Based on this assessment and changes in the funding environment, mid-course adjustments may be made to the strategic plan as appropriate.

Annual progress reports will be presented to the Board of Supervisors, and will be made widely available to the campus stakeholders, state/national/international audiences, and the public through forums, a Web site, and reports. Thus, the implementation and progress assessment of the strategic plan will demonstrate transparency and commitment to accountability. Together with the Board of Supervisors and the breadth of Southern 's constituents it serves, the entire Southern community looks forward to building critical resources and implementing this strategic plan to achieve its goals toward a galvanizing vision.

At the center of this plan is the land-grant mission of Southern University and A&M College, as it has been redefined, to serve a unique and diverse population of Louisiana, the nation, and the world through the nurturing, creation and engagement of human resources to support global demands by *Creating Leaders* that are visionaries, engagers, and enactors.

Envision

In order to truly create an atmosphere at Southern University that enables its students to discover career and life pathways by providing them with the necessary skills, resources and experiences needed to successfully achieve their goals. Management

Too often strategic plans are created and ultimately fail because more energy is exerted on strategy design with little time spent devising an effective means of implementation. The 2016 – 2020 Strategic Plan will not only provide a strategy, but also a means of implementation to ensure all of its objectives are addressed. To successfully execute this strategy, it must be the focus of every person – faculty, staff and student at Southern University and A&M College. It will be the responsibility of the SU administration to create, monitor, and reward that focus as it is expressed. In order to provide such leadership required to successfully implement the strategies contained herein, the "Three Cs of Strategy" – Clarify, Communicate, and Cascade - will be utilized.

Clarify the Strategy

The SU Strategic Plan will be presented in a framework that will guide implementation choices and will ultimately determine the direction of the University.

Communicate the Strategy

The SU Strategic Plan will be disseminated at every level of the organization using multiple mediums. Internal Moodle discussion boards/blogs, message boards, podcasts, and departmental meetings will used to communicate what the strategy is and how the work of each of the University's members will be guided by that strategy.

Cascade the Strategy

The SU Strategic Plan will be cascaded throughout the University organization and get to the practical and tactical components of people's jobs every day. Deans, department heads and other managers will be involved in this process so that they can aid in translating the elements of the strategy to their own functional areas.





Accountability

For a strategic plan to be actionable and accountable, it needs to have tactics with measures that are not vague or general but specific and actionable as well as measurable. Building in the concept of accountability at every step in the strategic planning process will help to keep it concrete and not general or vague. The more specific SU can be at every step in the strategic planning process, the better the chances the goals will be achieved.

Once the plan is deployed and operating, the program/academic units should develop tactics they will undertake to help achieve the strategic goals. These units must ensure that the tactics developed are specific, measureable, and actionable. It will be critical in the accountability process to also define *when* these tactics will be achieved.

In order to be properly accountable, the SU Strategic Plan will need to be tracked. Tracking does not have to be difficult or complex. It does needs to be organized, done on a regular schedule, and centralized. Southern University will develop a process to track its strategic goals and associated action items/tactics.

These services are delivered to students enrolled in the degree programs and the citizens who participate in nondegree activities. Additionally, as an entity that is a part of the higher education system that drives economic development, the University's clients extend beyond students to all citizens who benefiet from a healthy economy. As an institution that contributes to workforce and economic development, job training and retraining, Louisiana's businesses and industries are primary clients and users of the University's academic and non-academic services. And, finally, as an instituttion committed to being accountable for the expenditure of citizens' tax dollars, the primary clients and users of the University's programs are all of the state's citizens who contribute tax revenues to state government.





Southern University Enrollment Rates 2009 - 2013




Southern University Retention Rates 2003 - 2014




Community and Global Partnerships

Creating Community, Public and **Private Partnerships** - Forging strategic partnerships for innovation, economic and workforce development in higher education allows the continued support of the world's ever-changing resource needs. Business and education leaders have engaged in discussions about the gap between the outputs of higher education and the needs

of 21st century innovation and commerce for some time. Despite these discussions, the misalignment between student outcomes and workforce needs persists.

The P-16 curriculum is not sufficiently aligned with workforce needs to provide students with the knowledge and skills needed to compete successfully in the workplace. Similarly, employers have failed to adequately articulate their expectations for the workforce. In order to bridge this gap, The SU Strategic Plan focuses on aiding the University in developing a deeper partnership that enables the adaptation of curricula and co-curricular experiences to build core competencies and promote deeper learning. 

IE provides the end result to determine how well the Institutional Mission is being fulfilled. The institution's goal for IE is for it to function as the catalyst of SU outcomes assessment, meaning IE focuses on measuring how well students are learning in the programs and measuring how well administrative units are operating. Figure 4.1 adapted from (Nichols and Nichols, 2000) as cited in in Virginia Highlands Community College 2013-2014 Institutional Effectiveness Strategic Plan provides an illustration of the relationship between Priority 4 and the institution's and SUBR Strategic Plan.

Effective investment in education requires strategic investment in the facilities in which teaching and learning occurs. To ensure that facilities continue to support the changing needs and demands of the knowledge economy, substantial initial and sustained investments are needed. This will involve improving the process by which decisions are made relating to large-scale investments in its educational infrastructure, with a view to maximizing the benefits of the university's initial investment in education.

Southern University and A &M College is committed to institutional effectiveness and a long-term commitment to transparency, and the assessment of the effectiveness of its programs and services. Under new leadership, and with a focus on Southern Association of Colleges of Schools (SACSCOC) standards, the institutional priorities, goals and mission of the college, IE have taken on an institutionalized commitment to excellence. IE supports the Institution's strategic plan that outlines actions that are taken to implement the Institutional Mission, Goals and Vision.



Two undergraduate students and five faculty members from SUBR's Department of Political Science recently attended the National Conference of Black Political Scientists (NCOBPS) in Jackson, Mississippi on March 16-20, 2016. The theme of the 47th national conference was, "Black Power, Black Lives: The State of Black Politics 50 Years after the March against Fear."

The presentations represented

a few trending research topics in the discipline of political science. The students showcased their research in a student-dedicated poster session. Arnedia Wallace's research was entitled, "An Issue in Race Relations Today: An Examination of the Disparity in Mass Incarceration and Policy Solutions," and Sicqora Williams' research was entitled, "Success of Phase Two and Phase Three Black Politicians in State and Nationwide Campaigns: Examining the Campaigns of Senators Carol Moseley Braun, Cory Booker, and President Barack Obama."

"We are very proud of the wealth of research that emanates from these scholars. We are especially excited to see our two stellar students undertake this opportunity to discuss their research and findings in a national conference setting," said Revathi I. Hines, Alphonse Jackson Professor of Political Science at SUBR, who serves as the students' faculty mentor.

The following professors from the Nelson Mandela School of Public Policy and Urban Affairs presented papers at NCOBPS: Revathi Hines (political science), Melanie Johnson-Cunningham (political science), Leslie Taylor-Grover, (political science), Eric Horent (public administration), and Albert Samuels, interim dean, College of Social and Behavioral Sciences.

The National Conference of Black Political Scientists (NCOBPS) is organized to study, enhance, and promote the political aspirations of people of African descent in the United States and throughout the world. It aims to contribute to the resolution of the many challenges that black people confront. The organization promotes research in and critical analysis of topics usually overlooked and/or marginalized in political science scholarship.

The first meeting of NCOBPS was held in April, 1969 at Southern University under the leadership of the late Jewel Limar Prestage, who served as chair of the Department of Political Science at that time. Since its inception, NCOBPS has developed into a powerful vehicle for elevating the study of African Americans and the African Diaspora within the discipline of political science. Additionally, it has also played a significant role in encouraging more African Americans to pursue graduate study in the field and has created important networking opportunities for black political scientists.

SUBR Student Wins Distinguished Media Award

Adams Apple Award at the national College Media Association's (CMA) convention held in New York City, on March 12-15, 2016. 

Second Poetry Collection Published by Professor John Smith

John Warner Smith, an adjunct professor in the Department of English, recently released his second book-length collection of poetry, *Soul Be A Witness: Songs to Boys of Color*, published by MadHat Press. Mr. Smith's first collection, *A Mandala of Hands* (Aldrich Press / Kelsay Books) was published in 2015.

In the summer of 2013, Professor Smith sat to write a poem as a reply to a Father's Day letter he received from his son Patrick. The response eventually became his second book-length collection of poems.

"The poems of Soul Be A Witness: Songs to Boys of Color," Mr. Smith says, "speak truth of and to boys and men of color as only an African-American son, father, and grandfather can."



His new collection "attempts to go beyond history, biography and contemporary influences to capture the inner, spiritual struggles and possibilities -- archetypal

forces -- that shape and ultimately define the individual and collective journey toward manhood and selfhood," said the writer.

The epic title poem, "Soul Be A Witness," puts the reader inside a Lafayette Parish courtroom and the monologues of eleven different characters in the 1922 trial of Emile Hebert, a young Creole war veteran accused of murder. The controversial trial brought National Guardsmen to the grounds of the courthouse for the first time in parish history - at the peak of the KKK's dominance in Louisiana.

"In many ways," Professor Smith says, "Emile epitomizes every native son of America who is a victim of law enforcement and criminal justice. The poems in the collection call upon the inner-self, the soul if you will, to be a witness to itself . . .to witness its good and evil, its weaknesses, shortcomings and vulnerabilities, but invariably, to know its abiding strength and power over injustice and adversity."

Professor Smith's poems have been nominated for a Pushcart Prize and for the Sundress Best of the Net Anthology. He John Warner Smith

Professor Richard Hobson Shines at Music Recital





SUBR scholars attending were Lamar Burton, a senior agricultural sciences major, Jasmond Tucker, a junior biology major, Jonalyn Fair, a freshman mathematics and physics major, and QuoVadis Savoy, a freshman electrical engineering major. Mr. Burton and Mr. Tucker showcased their technical research during the poster presentation session.

LS-LAMP (www.subr.edu/lslamp) is a statewide, comprehensive, systemic mentoring, and institutional transformation program. Its central objective is to substantially increase the number and quality of minority students enrolling in and completing baccalaureate degrees in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), and subsequently going on to pursue graduate studies in STEM disciplines. The Alliance is composed of 12 Louisiana institutions of higher education and the Louisiana Universities Marine Consortium (LUMCON), a research facility. The Louisiana institutions include Dillard, Grambling State, Southern (Baton Rouge and New Orleans), Xavier University, University of Louisiana at Lafayette, McNeese State University, University of New Orleans, Tulane University, LSU, and community colleges (Southern University Shreveport and Nunez Community College). Southern University and A&M College serves as the lead institution for LS-LAMP.

"For over the past 25 years, LS-LAMP has made its mark to encourage and cultivate scholars of STEM disciplines at the 12 LAMP institutions and into the future workforce of tomorrow. LS-LAMP continues to impact STEM education in Louisiana," said Dr. Bagayoko.

SUBR's Youngest Graduate Focused on STEM



Mr. Polite Stewart Jr., the youngest student to graduate from SUBR, received his undergraduate degree in physics at 18 years old. He began attending SUBR as an undergraduate student when he was 14 years old in the fall semester of 2008, after spending two years in Timbuktu Academy program.

After Mr. Stewart received his physics degree, he decided to work for two years as a post-baccalaureate and research associate at the

Lawrence Berkley National Lab (LBNL) in Berkley,

California. Throughout Stewart's time at LBNL, he received valuable research experience in a number of subjects, ranging from computer science to physics, to mechanical engineering, in terms of design and manufacturing.

During his two years of post-baccalaureate work, Mr. Stewart became conscious of his hands-on learning preference and passion for helping others in a more immediate way than physics could offer. He then came to recognize that engineering was his preferred field, and thus became more focused on becoming a bio-medical engineer and starting his own company. Mr. Stewart plans to use this company as a way to distribute medical devices at a lower cost than the market gives via 3-D printing and a few other mediums.

While Mr. Stewart became emotionally attached to California due to all the experience he gained there, he made it a point to come back to Southern University, where he is currently enrolled, and work towards a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering and a master's degree in materials science and engineering, simultaneously.

Chancellor Ukpolo Announces Resignation

r. Victor
Ukpolo announced his
resignation as Chancellor, effective June 30,
2016. He has served as
Chancellor for 10 years.

"I am truly grateful to America, the Southern University System and SUNO for giving me an opportunity to lead this University for the past 10 years," Dr. Ukpolo

said. "I came to America from Nigeria 44 years ago as a young man with \$200 in my pocket and worked my way up from a dishwasher to become the head of a University. Now it is time for me to start my gradual transition back to Nigeria."

After he steps down, Dr. Ukpolo plans to return to the classroom to teach at SUNO before eventually returning to Nigeria as the patriarch of his family. "It is my hope that I still have some productive years to give back to my homeland," he said.



"My parents, particularly my mother, had not supported my idea to come to America because they feared losing me, but I assured them that I would be back in five years," Dr. Ukpolo added. "Now, 44 years later, I am finally able to keep that promise."

Dr. Ukpolo was appointed Chancellor on Jan. 6, 2006. He led SUNO during a critical time in the University's history, rebuilding the campus that was submerged in flood waters after Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. During his tenure, the Univer-

sity built its first-ever housing complex, an Information Technology Center, a new College of Business & Public Administration Building, and a Small Business Incubator on the newly developed Lake Campus.

Dr. Ukpolo also oversaw the renovations of the University Center, the Leonard S. Washington Memorial Library and the first floor

of the Bashful Administration
Building. In addition, four new
buildings are slated to be constructed: the Education Building, the Natural Sciences Building, the Arts,
Humanities and Social Sciences
Building, and the Millie M. Charles
School of Social Work. The University broke ground on the new Social
Work building in November 2015.
SUNO experienced impressive student population growth under Dr.
Ukpolo's leadership. Immediately
after Hurricane Katrina, he
launched an aggressive marketing

SUNO Opens New Forensic Science Lab

The University hosted a Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for the new Forensic Science Lab March 18 in the Conference Center.

The lab, located in the New Science Building, features ergonomic furniture, a DNA Sequencer, a Pressure Cycler, two inverted microscopes, stereoscopes and numerous kits for evidence collection and drug analysis. Grants from Title III Programs, the Board of Regents and a collaboration with Pressure Biosciences, Inc. in Boston, MA were used to help pay for the new lab and equipment, which costs about \$1 million.



SUNO began offering Forensic Science as a major in 2013. It is one of four Historically Black Colleges and Universities in the country to offer such a program, and the only university in Louisiana to do so. The program, in which 68 students are enrolled, expects to have its first graduates this May.

In January, three Forensic Science students began an internship at the office of Orleans Parish Coroner's Office with Dr. Jeffrey Rouse. Now SUNO students have an opportunity to gain experience at crime scenes and autopsies while receiving valuable networking connections from the Coroner's Office.

"We are very excited about our new lab," said Dr. Pam Marshall, director of the Forensic Science Program. "We have a lot of unique equipment that will allow our students to be exposed to things they will see in a crime lab while using cutting-edge equipment."

Ukpolo continued

and reorganization campaign, which included the introduction of four innovative online programs to attract displaced students. Despite projections that only 1,200 to 1,500 of the 3,600 students enrolled before the storm would return, more than 2,100 students came back to continue their education on the new Lake Campus in trailers supplied the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. With enrollment climbing faster than any other four-year institution in Louisiana, SUNO not only moved back to its original location the winter of 2008, but is also experienced unprecedented growth.

Looking toward future generations, Dr. Ukpolo established an innovative dual enrollment program to allow qualified high school students to earn college credits at the University. He also continues to support the Honoré Center for Undergraduate Achievement, created to reverse the trend of fewer African American males graduating from college, while increasing the number of male-certified classroom teachers in urban settings. Programs such as these demonstrate Dr. Ukpolo's care, commitment and concern for SUNO's students, many who, like him, are the first in their families to attend college.

"As I leave my post as Chancellor, I wish the University and the Southern System well. I still will be here to serve SUNO and the system -- just in a different capacity -- as I make my gradual transition back to Nigeria."

Dr. Ukpolo, formerly the Southern University System's Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs, previously served as Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs at California State University in Los Angeles. He also served as Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs/Special Assistant to the Chancellor for Academic Research for the Tennessee Board of Regents. He started his career as an Assistant Professor of Economics at Austin Peay State University, where he also held an administrative post as Executive Assistant to the President.

Dr. Grant Receives 1st Patent; Dr. Belisle Receives His 6th

Dr. Donna Grant, Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs, has received her first design patent for a fictional character, "Grant the Red Bear. Similar to other make-believe characters, such as "Barney," Grant the Red Bear entertains children of all ages. Dr. Grant also has a line of educational products centered around Grant the Red Bear.

Meanwhile, Dr. William Belisle, Director for Grants and Sponsored Programs, has received his sixth utility patent, Patent Number 9,300,230 "Apparatus for Elevating and Manipulating Object," issued by the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office.



The patent is for a see-through rectangular shaped enclosure equipped with electromagnets at its base and sides. The enclosure is used to elevate magnetic or electromagnetic objects and then manipulate the elevated object movement around the inside of the chamber.

The apparatus will be used to further study and teach electromagnetic, scientific, physical and mathematical principles in high school, university, research and other classrooms and laboratories in ways not previously available. During the Fall of 2015, one of the LSU Mechanical and Electrical Engineering (MEI) Senior Capstone Project Teams selected this patented apparatus for their project and has completed testing and building the first prototype that will be presented in April.

The prototype will be shipped to a large scientific education company awaiting a sample of the apparatus for consideration. Dr. Belisle has prosecuted 'Pro Se' all but one of the six utility patent applications he has received and has a small, but useful understanding of the complex patent prosecution process. He continues the process of technology transfer and commercialization regarding this and the other five patented products in hopes of generating economic development for Louisiana.

Women's Track Team Wins 2 Championships at Indoor Nationals

Senior Orenthia Bennett (pictured in left photo) won the women's 400m and was a member of the winning women's 4x400m relay team as she led SUNO to a sixth place finish at the NAIA Indoor Track & Field Championships at the Dave Walker Track on the campus of East Tennessee State





University Saturday. It was SUNO's best finish at the meet since it claimed the NAIA title in 1997.

Bennett picked up her second national championship running the anchor leg of the 4x400 meter relay. SUNO's team of Hylton, Green, Leonie Robinson, and Bennett finished with a time of 3:43.79, nearly two seconds better than the runners-up.

"I'm so impressed with this team," said Coach Yhann Plummer, a former national champion for SUNO himself. "They have worked so hard to put themselves to compete against the very best. They train every day without complaint, they fight through injuries, and nothing deters them. I'm just extremely proud of them and of my assistant coach Younne Reid for his work, in particular, with these ladies."



SU AG AGENTS ASSIST FARMERS WITH FLOODED STRAWBERRY FIELDS

Farmers in Tangipahoa Parish had major concerns after the recent flood. The 19 inches of


after the recent flood. The 19 inches of record-breaking rain that fell in the Florida Parishes left many strawberry growers with unmarketable crops. What had been shaping up to be a decent season has quickly turned into a bad situation heading into the annual Ponchatoula Strawberry Festival. The most recent flood that occurred can reduce yields and even kill plants, but usually will not result in the contamination of produce with human pathogens. Berry crops can tolerate a great deal of flooding when they are dormant, but when actively growing in spring, flooding for any length of time can be

In this area, growers need several rain-free days so the soils can drain and draw in air to stimulate root growth. Once the plant's roots get adequate oxygen they will begin to grow and absorb the nutrients present in the soil. Many plant diseases, such as Phytophthora and Botrytis, will be much worse following flooding rains. Producers should closely monitor crops and manage these diseases.

Phytophthora spores are spread under flooded

conditions, so chemical treatment will be needed to manage susceptible crops.

A local produce farm lost its early spring and summer crops of Top Pick Purple hull peas, snap beans, and horticultural beans. The farm's five acres of strawberries were also affected after the heavy rainfall. Another producer, Mendez farm located in Independence, LA lost about 95% of its







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detrimental.

DR. GINA EUBANKS APPOINTED TO BREADA BOARD



Southern University Ag Center's Vice Chancellor for Extension Gina E. Eubanks was appointed to the board of the Big River Economic & Agricultural Development Alliance

(BREADA) during one of the organization's recent board meetings.

BREADA began in 1996 when Chris Campany recruited a group of farmers to start Baton Rouge's first farmers market as part of his Master's thesis at Louisiana State University. From that group, the Red Stick Farmers Market was created and the first farmers market was held the same year. BREADA also received its 501 © 3 non-profit organization status in 1996 and began working to increase economic opportunities for small farmers.

BREADA entered into a partnership with the Baton Rouge Area Foundation and the State of Louisiana to open the Main Street Market, which serves as an incubator for small businesses. To date, the organization has established a mobile farmers market that provides access to fresh fruits and vegetables to limited access neighborhoods and a kids club that teaches healthy lifestyles to children.

BREADA has a mission of, "building healthy and strong local food systems; increasing the sustainability of independent local farmers, fishers and food producers; and to foster stewardship of land and community through public markets."

As a member of the board, Eubanks and the other 15 board members will oversee the policies implemented by the organization to assist small farmers and promote the idea of purchasing locally grown food.

Eubanks has been employed with the Southern University System since the 1990s when she joined the faculty as Coordinator of Family and Consumer Sciences. She would continue to rise through the ranks to be named Vice Chancellor for Extension at the Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in 2002.

In May of 2013, Eubanks was named Associate Vice Chancellor and Program Leader for Nutrition and Food Sciences at the Louisiana State University AgCenter. She currently serves in a dual appointment at both the SU and LSU Ag Centers.

Prior to her employment at Southern, Eubanks taught at Alcorn State University, Oklahoma State University and Virginia Tech.

She received a B.S. degree in clothing and textiles from Southern University in 1977. Eubanks earned an M.S. degree in clothing and textiles merchandising in 1978 and a Ph.D. in home economics in 1987, both degrees are from Oklahoma State University.

A multidisciplinary research project was developed by Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center and the Louisiana State University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in collaboration with the USDA Forest Service, Southern Region to address the critical needs to develop scalable, cost-saving biofuels and associated processing technologies from sustainable, alternative, non-food feedstocks (urban wood-waste and energy cane biomass).

The importance of this project stems from several factors: 1. utilization of wood-waste and non-food feedstocks for biofuel and bioenergy production; 2. utilization of low-cost processing methods which will effectively increase biofuels competitiveness; 3. environmental and economic

impact of non-food plants that grow on marginal, non-agricultural land. The successful project outcomes are: (a) benefiting the agricultural community by encouraging sustainable diversification of agricultural production in LA and Southern USA; (b) help develop rural and urban areas by promoting economic diversification and growth emphasizing bio-based energy and products technologies; (c) developing and strengthening R&D programs via enhanced collaboration and coordination of bio-energy research efforts; (d) developing cost saving, scalable, technologies for biofuel feedstock processing; (e) accelerating the technology transfer process from research to commercialization using existing agreements with industry partners; and (f) benefiting the people of the US through development, distribution, and implementation of bio-based energy technologies, therefore promoting energy independence.

The project also provided support and funding for several SU Urban Forestry graduate students. Dr. S.P. Davis completed his dissertation work in 2015. SUSLA Welcomes Dr. Rodney A. Ellis

Dr. Rodney Ellis, a Buckner higher-education consultant, is the former Chancellor of Central Louisiana Technical Community College (CLTCC). Dr. Ellis held this title from February 2013 to June 2015. In this role, he worked diligently to inform the community about the benefits of a technical and community college education. He successfully secured nearly \$5 million in federal grant funding, secured \$650,000 in private funding commitments to start new and upgrade existing programs, restructured and rebranded a 7-campus organization, reduced the budget deficit by \$1.2 million, expanded student activities and program offerings, secured \$19 million from the state legislature for a new building, secured \$5.3 in non-state funding for this new building, achieved reaffirmation from the college's

accrediting body, increased the public's awareness and image of the college, and developed a new 5-year strategic plan, among other things.

Dr. Ellis also served briefly at the Louisiana Community and Technical College System (LCTCS) where he focused on special academic and student affairs initiatives that help Louisiana community colleges achieve the goals in "Our Louisiana 2020: Building the Workforce of Tomorrow," LCTCS's six-year strategic plan. LCTCS serves over 175,000 credit and noncredit students, and 36,000 adult basic education learners at 13 community and technical colleges on over 50 campuses.

Dr. Ellis previously served as Executive Vice President at Atlanta Technical College in Atlanta, Georgia. Ellis worked at Atlanta Technical College for nearly thirteen years where he also served as vice president of IT, planning and development and director of institutional development. Prior to his service at Atlanta Technical College, Dr. Ellis served as Institutional Effectiveness Specialist at the Technical College System of Georgia and senior research specialist at the Roosevelt Warm Springs Institute for Rehabilitation.

He earned his doctorate in Higher Education Administration, with a specialization in Community and Technical College Leadership, from the University of Georgia; a Master of Science in Judicial Administration from Auburn University at Montgomery; and a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from the University of Alabama.

Dr. Ellis has over twenty years of experience in postsecondary education. He specializes in academic and student affairs policy development and compliance, institutional effectiveness and research, accreditation compliance, resource acquisition and management, public-private partnership development, board development and strategic planning.





SUSLA COMMEMORATES SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY SYSTEM AT ANNUAL FOUNDERS DAY


After an initial postponement due to rain and inclement weather, SUSLA commemorated the history and inception of the Southern University System at its annual Founders' Day Celebration held on Wednesday, March 30, 2016, 10:00 am, in the Gym at the MLK Campus. This year's theme, "Southern University: Continuing the Journey, Surpassing Boundaries", paid homage to Southern's 136 year history and honored former Southern University at Shreveport administrator and supporter, Dr. Mary Louise Wilson. Wilson served as the institution's Interim Chancellor in 1993.

Southern University was officially chartered by Legislative Act 87 in 1880, opening in New Orleans, Louisiana with twelve students. The current flagship institution opened in 1914 in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, officially approved to receive land grant funds through the 1890 Morrill Act. Southern University in Shreveport (SUSLA) was

officially authorized and opened its doors in 1964. Today the Southern University System contains five campuses and is the only historically Black college and university (HBCU) system in the nation.

The Red Cross deployed two other shelters in the affected area, with the SUSLA shelter being the location for Caddo residents.






FOULES ADDRESSED CHAMPIONSHIP ATHLETES AS KEYNOTE SPEAKER




