Health Information Management Systems



The Honore' Men started this year off assisting the arrival of Haitian political leaders.

The Haiti Unity Summit concluded on Monday, Jan. 17, by watching Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech. The Haitian delegates and Diaspora members leave the summit with a plan and hope.

The four-day summit hosted by the Southern University Law Center, in conjunction with the 2021 Haitian Diaspora Interest Group, closed with an action plan the Haitian political leaders can use to collaborate with the Accords in Haiti and help improve the government.

General Russell Honoré opened the afternoon with a tweet from Fritz A Jean, the Accord Unitarie de la Louisiane's presidential nomination, asking for peace and unity as the country approaches the Feb. 7 deadline. Feb. 7 is believed to be when the assassinated President Jovenel Moïse officially ends.

There is hope that within the next few weeks leading up to the Feb. 7 deadline, the Accord Unitarie de la Louisiane can lead the way forward with the Accords in Haiti, and there can be collaborations on all fronts.

The following steps for the delegates will be to work to have the interim government established around Feb. 7, determine when the election will happen, and third to make sure there is security in place.

Honoré told the group and the Haitian people in closing the summit, "Remember your motto- strength and unity. You will survive together or fail separately."

The delegates entered the summit with nine different Accords and unanimously agreed upon one Accord, Accord Unitarie de la Louisiane. After hours of deliberation on Saturday and Sunday, the group decided to have a president and Prime Minister run the country. Fritz A Jean was nominated as the next Interim President of Haiti, and Mariam Fetiore, a female candidate for interim Prime Minister.

At the end of the summit, the delegates stated that it was a long and challenging process, but they managed to choose the right direction for Haiti. They are proud of the work done so far in the summit. Some delegates shared how the democratic process is not easy but practical.

Forty-Six Participants Earn IC3 GS6 Certification at SUNO despite Hurricane IDA Disruption

During the Fall 2021 semester, 45 SUNO students, 14 high school students, and one SUNO staff member participated in the IC3 GS6 Certification Training Boot Camp. Of the participants, 89% of the SUNO students earned their certification; 50% of the high school students earned their certification; and the sole SUNO staff also earned their certification. Overall, 77% of the participants earned the at least one or more levels of the IC3 GS6 Certification. Additionally, 8 participants earned all three levels of IC3 certification; 6 students earned two levels of IC3 Certification while the remaining students earned one level of IC3 GS6 Certification.

It should be noted that at the time of this report, a few more students are still attempting additional levels of certification, and many of them have excellent chances of earning them. The IC3 Certification program is sponsored with a Louisiana Board of Regents grant and was kicked off at SUNO in August 2021. The Boot Camp was embedded in four college courses and a standalone weekend camp for high school students. One base was embedded into a Management course (MGMT 491-Leadership & Decision Making) to expose as many non-IT majors as possible to IT certification and its many benefits in their future careers and personal life. Two camps were naturally embedded into Computer Information Systems courses (CISP 451-Project Management and CISP 510-Object Oriented Design). The program facilitator/instructor is Mr. Randy Wild, who holds several IT certifications. Dr. Igwe E. Udeh is the Principal Investigator of the grant, and Dr. David Alijani and Dr. Obyung Kwun are the Co-Principal Investigators. The PI and the Co-PIs were responsible for overseeing the camps' activities. Several IC3 Certification Training Boot Camps are planned for the Spring 2022 semester. 


Southern University of New Orleans Educational Talent Search Senior Spotlight

The goal was to support personal and career development for more than 30 middle school girls attending Capdeu Elementary School. The focus of the January 21st session was entitled "Black Girls Rock with Positive Imagining."

Other sessions throughout the year will focus on developing life skills, building and strengthening self-esteem, and college information workshops. Miss SUNO., Ms. Jessica Thomas, was present among queens from various colleges and high schools such as Dillard University, Xavier University, Kennedy High School, and Mandeville High School, along with others. The guest speaker was KOA Queen Anita Tilliam, and SUNO provided refreshments. The goal of NCBW is to advocate on behalf of Black women and girls to promote leadership development and gender equity in health, education, and economic development.
