SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY SELECTED FOR \$2 MILLION TMCF CAPACITY BUILDING GRANT



Southern University and A&M College has been selected as one of only eight HBCUs to receive \$2 million through the Thurgood Marshall College Fund's (TMCF) Project HBCU Capacity Building Initiative, funded by Lilly Endowment Inc. The initiative represents a \$25 million investment to strengthen HBCUs through research, operations, and innovation.

Southern's proposal, "Building Capacity for Strategic Data Leadership at Southern University and A&M College," was developed and submitted by Chancellor John K. Pierre, Dr. Luria Young, Dr. Caronda Bean, and Dr. Scott Wicker. The project will enhance the University's ability to use data-driven decision-making to improve student success, enrollment, and institutional performance.

"This investment will accelerate our efforts to build a stronger, more innovative Southern University," campus leadership shared. "It positions us to create new opportunities for our students, empower our faculty, and elevate the University's capacity to serve our community."

TMCF President and CEO Harry L. Williams added, "This initiative is about building sustainable capacity so that HBCUs can continue to lead, innovate, and transform lives for generations to come."

Over the next two years, TMCF will track progress across participating institutions, monitoring improvements in enrollment, retention, graduation rates, research output, and overall institutional sustainability.

Southern University is proud to join this select group of HBCUs working to advance innovation and strengthen the future of higher education.





SCHOOL OF EDUCATION EARNS NATIONAL CAEP ACCREDITATION

The School of Education, led by Dr. Emily Jackson-Osagie, has been recognized as one of 36 educator preparation providers (EPPs) from 22 states to earn accreditation from the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) during the Fall 2025 review cycle.

This national recognition places the School of Education among an elite group of 544 CAEP-accredited programs worldwide, representing institutions across 43 states, the District of Columbia,

Puerto Rico, Bahrain, Jordan, Oman, Qatar, and the United Arab Emirates.

CAEP accreditation affirms that the School of Education meets rigorous national standards focused on high-quality instruction, continuous improvement, and strong evidence that its graduates are prepared to be effective, caring educators in diverse PK–12 settings.

"This accreditation is a significant milestone for our School of Education," said Dr. Jackson-Osagie. "It reflects the dedication of our faculty, staff, candidates, and partners who work tirelessly to uphold excellence in educator preparation. We are honored to be recognized among this year's 36 accredited providers."

The CAEP Accreditation Council reviews educator preparation programs using a peer-review process grounded in evidence, equity, and accountability. Accreditation ensures that programs consistently demonstrate strong outcomes and a commitment to preparing teachers who are ready to meet the needs of today's classrooms.

The School of Education celebrates this achievement as it continues its mission to prepare knowledgeable, compassionate, and impactful educators for schools and communities across the region, state and nation.

SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY CONCLUDED UNESCO AI LITERACY WEEK 2025 WITH STRONG ENGAGEMENT

Southern University and A&M College successfully concluded the Southern University–UNESCO AI Literacy Week 2025, a three-day event that strengthened the University's understanding and application of Artificial Intelligence in teaching, learning, and academic leadership.

Led by Dr. Moustapha Diack, Department of Science/Math Education, College of Science and Engineering, the initiative brought together faculty, staff, and academic leaders for collaborative learning and exploration of AI's rapidly growing role in higher education.

Throughout the week, participants engaged in sessions designed to deepen AI literacy and expand practical knowledge:

- Day 1 addressed AI Governance and Ethics, establishing a foundation for responsible and ethical innovation.
- Day 2 showcased AI Literacy in Practice and featured a special tribute to Dr. Leon R. Tarver II, honoring his enduring impact on culture, global collaboration, and academic excellence.
- Day 3 focused on Prompt Engineering, offering practical insight into how tools such as ChatGPT and GPT-5 are reshaping instruction and academic operations.

Additional resources, including the Day 3 publication, a commemorative video honoring Dr. Leon R. Tarver II, and a podcast exploring AI, JEDI principles, and the future of learning management systems were made available to participants.

Faculty were reminded to complete their AI Literacy Portfolios, which will be required for participation in the University's next phase of AI professional development. Southern University also announced that expert-level AI training sessions will take place in Spring 2026, providing deeper, hands-on engagement with AI tools and ethical applications.

The successful implementation of AI Literacy Week was supported by Dr. Luria Young, the Office of Academic Affairs, and college and departmental partners across campus. The initiative marked a significant step forward in Southern University's commitment to innovation and its strategic vision for an AI-enabled future.

institutional effectiveness and

through strategic innovation and

partnership. The event was coordinated with leadership and support from Robert Easley and Tamara Foster-Montgomery, whose contributions were central to the success of this capacity-building effort.

Capacity-building is defined as the process of developing and strengthening the skills, abilities, processes, and resources that organizations and communities need to survive, adapt, and thrive in a fast-changing world. At its core, true capacity-building involves long-term transformation, shifting mindsets, expanding capabilities, and cultivating resilience rather than simply completing tasks.

Southern University continues to advance this work through its Corporate Capacity Building Model, developed by Institutional Advancement and Career Services. This model has demonstrated meaningful impact on student development, employer engagement, and alignment between academic programs and workforce needs.

As workforce and industry expectations evolve, Career Services departments nationally are transforming through new technologies and innovative student support models. The career center of the future must focus on building meaningful partnerships, fostering career communities, and engaging students and alumni throughout their professional journeys. Such work requires sustained strategic planning rather than short-term solutions tied to outdated practices.

DRAX Capacity Building Day reinforced that student success is a shared responsibility, requiring intentional collaboration among faculty, staff, alumni, industry partners, and external stakeholders. changing world.
















CADE LIBRARY FACULTY EARN CERTIFICATE IN OPEN **EDUCATION** LIBRARIANSHIP AND NATIONAL APPOINTMENTS



John B. Cade Library faculty members Dr. Maya Riley Banks, Head of Public Services, and Maletta Payne, Head of Technology and Information Services, recently completed the Certificate in Open Education Librarianship through the Open Education Network (OEN), a national organization supporting access and affordability in higher education through open educational resources (OER).

The eight-month program provides training in open education practices, copyright and licensing, and program development. Participants from across the country engage in online coursework, mentorship, and project planning designed to build institutional support for OER. Their participation was sponsored by the LOUIS Consortium, which continues to champion open education initiatives statewide.

As part of the program, both librarians also completed the Library Copyright Institute, receiving advanced instruction in copyright for academic librarians.

Maletta Payne shared that the experience strengthened her leadership and expanded her capacity to support campus-wide open education efforts, particularly within the HBCU context. She has since been appointed to the OEN Event Planning Committee and selected as an advisor for the American Library Association's Libraries Transforming Communities initiative.

Dr. Banks also continues to represent Cade Library nationally. She was appointed to the Editorial Board of College & Research Libraries News and to the ACRL University Libraries Section Academic Outreach Committee for the 2025–2027 term. Her ongoing scholarship in affordable learning and open pedagogy informs her work in student and faculty engagement.

Dean of Libraries Dawn Kight praised both librarians, noting that their accomplishments "reflect the depth of expertise and innovation that define Cade Library's mission to advance teaching, learning, and open access across the Southern University System."







BOOKED @ CADE RECAP: AN AFTERNOON WITH DR. **MONA LISA SALOY**



The John B. Cade Library continued its Fall 2025 Booked @ Cade Author Series on Thursday, November 6, with a meaningful and engaging visit from Dr. Mona Lisa Saloy, Conrad N. Hilton Endowed Professor of English at Dillard University. Dr. Saloy is the author of several celebrated poetry collections and most recently co-editor of Hurricanes Katrina & Rita at 20: An Anthology of Louisiana Poetry with Art, a powerful volume reflecting on memory, community, culture, and resilience in the years before and after the storms that forever changed Louisiana.

Faculty, students, staff, and community members filled the Multipurpose Room to listen as Dr. Saloy shared not only her scholarship, but also her lived experience as a culture-bearer, poet, and witness to the shifting landscape of New Orleans. Her remarks highlighted the richness of Louisiana's oral and artistic traditions, emphasizing the importance of preserving language, memory, and story — especially in communities where history is often spoken, sung, or danced long before it is written down.

Throughout the program, Dr. Saloy encouraged the audience to keep showing up for their own lives, offering a personal example from her publishing journey. She recounted how one of her earlier books was submitted 25 times, receiving 24 rejections before finally being accepted — a reminder that persistence is, in her words, "soft power in motion." Her message resonated deeply: talent matters, but resilience matters more.

The discussion also touched on how Hurricanes Katrina and Rita reshaped not only the physical geography of New Orleans, but also the cultural, emotional, and communal landscape of the city. Dr. Saloy spoke candidly about loss, memory, migration, and the continuing work of restoration and reclamation.

Following an engaging audience Q&A, guests had the opportunity to purchase books and receive personalized autographs, creating a warm close to a thoughtful and inspiring event.

The John B. Cade Library thanks Dr. Saloy for sharing her voice, vision, and spirit — and we thank all who attended for continuing to help make Booked @ Cade a place where story and community meet.


