
Business Majors Complete Summer Internships

Six business majors completed an internship for credit course (BADM 470) in five business organizations in the Metro New Orleans Area during the 2021 Summer session. The participating students were Melissa Scott and Nyesha Enclarde (Entergy Louisiana Inc.); Travis Senatus (Avery Lucille, LLC); Brandy George (Verius Property, Inc.); Wakeisha Grant (Entergy Services, LLC); and Carey Broussard (Bercy Enterprises). The eight-week assignment, facilitated by Dr. Igwe Udeh, was an opportunity for the students to practice what they had been taught in their business courses; to acquire the most up-to-date practices in their discipline; and to try out for potential employment opportunities upon graduation. Some of the internships were for pay while others were unpaid. Students were required to submit periodic reports on their experience or designated topics during their internship. At the onset of the internship each site supervisor received information on expectations from their organization and for their interns. At the end of the assignment, each supervisor submitted a comprehensive report about the performance of their interns as well as areas of strength and improvement. The supervisor reports indicated that they were very pleased with the knowledge, work ethic, and confidence level of our students. The students presented a comprehensive written and oral report about their internship experience to their instructor and classmates on Monday, July 26, 2021. The managers of Verius Property were so pleased with their intern that they were present during her presentation and offered glowing testimonials about their intern. The overall report of the students indicated that the internship experience was helpful to their career advancement, learning improvement, and networking opportunities.










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College of Business Reaches Out to New Orleans Charter Science & Mathematics High School

The faculty and staff of the College of Buisness & Public Administration (CBA) reached out to Dr. Monique Cola, Head of School, New Orleans Charter Science & Mathematics High School (NOCSMHS) to explore the possibility of developing dual enrollment courses in business and information technology. Also in attendance was Mr. Aaron Washington, the Entrepreneurship course instructor at NOCSMHS. This was considered an excellent opportunity because NOCSMHS curriculum has a college-readiness posture and many of their students already participate in dual enrollment courses in math and science disciplines. Additionally, some of the NOCSMHS students are interested in starting and operating businesses to profit from their future inventions. The initial virtual meeting took place on July 1, 2021. The two sides reviewed specific courses offered by each to seek common grounds. Two potential courses were identified: Introduction to Business Entrepreneurship (BADM/ENTR 101) and Computer Productivity Application I and II (CISP 164/166). Both sides have been reviewing the syllabi for these courses for where gaps may exist. The CBA brought in Ms. Michaleen Bickham, the Coordinator of Dual Enrollment programs at SUNO to provide guidance on a way forward. We hope to offer a dual enrollment course in business entrepreneurship to NOCSMHS students during the 2021-2022 academic year.

Reaccreditation News

The most exciting news for this month is reaccreditation of the BSW and MSW programs in the School of Social Work. The Millie M. Charles School has been awarded accreditation by the Council on Social Work Education for the next 8 years (until 2028). The School of Social Work founded and named for Millie M. Charles, houses both the BSW and MSW programs which are both accredited. The Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) defines accreditation standards and establishes competency standards for social work education in the U.S.

Dean, Rebecca Chaisson is pleased with Team Social Work for the hard work conducted during this challenging time, especially during the pandemic. The internship team spent countless hours assigning placements of students in internship sites. All members of the faculty and staff made critical contributions for this recognition outcome. Drs. Julianna Padgett and Damekia Morgan helped the School get to the finish line for the self-study process. Dean Chaisson also acknowledges the contributions made by students, internship supervisors, and alumni who participated in the self-study. We are proud of the official recognition as it represents the commitment of the faculty and staff to continuous improvement in our School of Social Work at Southern University at New Orleans. We will continue in our quest for excellence in social work education as we move forward with new challenges in programs of studies. The current context of our lives calls in the U.S. and beyond, mandates that social workers be more actively engaged for the betterment of our families and our communities.

The School continues to plan for enhancing the education of our students. Some of the highlights this month speak to the on-going commitment of our faculty, students, and alumni.

Dr. Derrick Freeman & Monique Robinson, LMSW (MSW '2019)



Dr. Derrick Freeman (PI, Social Work HEALS Scholars program) and our very own, Monique Robinson, LMSW (MSW '2019), Chief Program Officer with Reconcile New Orleans, Inc. (Café Reconcile), met during the month in review. Monique is a licensed social worker with more than 20 years of experience in workforce development including direct services and program management. She has expertise in youth development, workforce development, reentry, and



career pathways with an explicit focus on equity, Opportunity Youth (OY), and individuals impacted by the criminal justice system. Opportunity Youth represents the category of young people between the ages of 16 to 24 years old who are disconnected from school and work.

As part of the strategy to reduce the number of Opportunity Youth (OY) in New Orleans, a pilot project was launched this summer (2021) by Reconcile New Orleans, Inc. called the Reengagement Center with the goal to reduce post-secondary disconnection. The Reengagement Center focuses on connecting young people ages 16-24 to post-secondary education opportunities, including college, occupational skills training, and military - leading to viable career pathways and focusing exclusively on the needs of OY to reduce disconnection and support reconnection.

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Social Work HEALS (Health Education and Leadership Scholars) Scholars program is a healthcare social work scholarship and leadership program here at SUNO for BSW or MSW students during field placement. Our School was among 10 Schools of Social Work that were awarded a six and half-year grant from the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) and the National Association of Social Workers (NASW) Foundation to implement this program (PI, Dr. Derrick Freeman). Together, the 10 Schools of Social Work forms the HEALS Consortium. The national Social Work HEALS program aims to develop the next generation of healthcare social work leaders who can lead efforts to improve quality and equitable access to healthcare in the U.S.

The Millie M. Charles School of Social Work HEALS Scholars program and the Reengagement Center agreed to collaborate with many upcoming community activities during the 2021 – 2022 academic year. Dr. Freeman, the 2021 – 2022 Social Work HEALS Scholars, Ms. Robinson, and the Reengagement Center's staff will address barriers to education, healthcare, and many other challenges that the youth in the City of New Orleans face ongoing.

National Institutes of Health Awarded the Millie M. Charles School of Social Work \$100,100.00 Grant

The National Institutes of Health All of Us Research Program is a historic effort to gather data from one million or more people living in the United States to accelerate research. All of Us is part of a new era in which researchers, health care providers, technology experts, community partners, and the public work together to develop individualized health care.

The *All of Us* Research Program is inviting one million people across the U.S. to help build one of the most diverse health databases in history. *All of Us* Research Program welcome participants from all backgrounds. Researchers will use the data to learn how our biology, lifestyle, and environment affect health. This may one day help them find ways to treat and prevent disease.

The Millie M. Charles School of Social Work (MMCSSW) will develop innovative approaches to educate communities, support enduring relationships with program participants, raise the public's awareness of the *AoU* Research Program, and support outreach efforts to build lasting relationships within BIPOC communities.

Dr. Derrick Freeman (PI), Dean Rebecca Chaisson (Co-PI), Ms. Camille Alexander, MSW (AoU Engagement Assistant), and five Graduate Assistants will work closely during the 2021–2021 academic school year to meet the grant requirements. MMCSSW will use the new funding to sustain the robust partner network it has established through the Community and Provider Gateway Initiative (CPGI). CPGI partners comprise a broad range of institutions, multicultural organizations, and health care provider associations that support the All of Us mission by leading grassroots engagement activities across the country.

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Monique Hurst, MSW, LMSW Coordinator Title IV-E

The Federal Government provides funding to seven (7) universities in Louisiana through Title IV-E of the Social Security Act specifically for preparing and training child welfare professionals. This is in collaboration with the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) and the Louisiana University Workforce Alliance to provide stipends for scholars who wish to have a career in child welfare.

Three Bachelor Social Work (BSW) Scholars were selected based on a screening and application process that requires good academic standing, 2.5 GPA, a written essay and 2 structured panel interviews that requires a passing score of 85 – 100 points. These scholars are Chelsey Flesch, LeShaundra Nelson and Alesia Ridley.

Three Master Social Work (MSW) Scholars were selected as Educational Support Scholars. These individuals are currently employed with the La. Dept. of Children and Family Services and are currently continuing their education and potential advancement in the Child Welfare Profession. Scholars are required to be in good academic standing with a 3.0 GPA and 2 years of excellent job performance within the department. An added bonus for these scholars is that they have also been awarded educational leave to continue to training on the job in other units in Child Welfare. These scholars are Keechann Smith, Melinda Miller and Kaylan Rosette.

THE CENTER FOR GRIEF & TRAUMA THERAPY

Starting this Fall, The Millie M. Charles School of Social Work will open the doors of the Center for Grief & Trauma Therapy. Located on the campus of Southern University at New Orleans, the Center addresses the dire need for high-quality, culturally competent, therapeutic services in our community as a result of community and domestic violence, and the multitude of losses many people have suffered as a result of Katrina and Covid-19.

The Center is generously funded by the Edward Wisner Foundation and will be under the direction of Dr. Torin T. Sanders, LCSW, Associate Professor of Social Work. Dr. Sanders is an experienced grief and trauma therapist, a member of the International Society for Traumatic Stress Studies, and the former co-chair of the New Orleans Childhood Trauma Task Force. The school of social work is led by Dean Rebecca Chaisson, Ph.D.

The Center will provide services to children and adults on an individual, group, and family basis. Sessions will be held on-campus and virtually. Licensed clinical social workers will be working with graduate students in social work to train them to become effective grief and trauma practitioners. Additionally, the Center will also provide community education on the topics of grief and trauma throughout the school year.

Dr. Patrice Sentino (Assistant Professor of Social Work) has been named the Coordinator of the SUNO Title IX program and the Services for Students with Disabilities Program.

The Title IX program is dedicated to ensuring gender equity at Southern University at New Orleans, which includes coordinating the University's efforts to prevent and effectively respond to all forms of sex discrimination (including gender identity discrimination) and sexual misconduct impacting community members, including sexual assault, sexual exploitation, sexual harassment, dating, domestic violence, and stalking. This work is done in compliance with applicable law, including Title IX, the Clery Act, and the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013, all of which are coordinated by Dr. Sentino.



 The Services for Students with Disabilities program addresses the needs of a diverse population and provides special assistance, accommodations, and appropriate services/programs to ensure accessibility and to meet the needs of individuals with documented disabilities. The program's primary purpose is to instill a sense of self-advocacy in students with disabilities and provide auxiliary aids to ensure full participation in all university activities and programs.
