

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Commencement 2019: A Special Day for Graduates and SU

After turning their respective tassels, nearly 600 graduates walked across the coveted stage in the F.G. Clark Activity Center to receive their degrees, including 11 Ph.D. recipients.

Chief student marshal Chacity Simmons led fellow graduates to receive bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees in several disciplines, as well as commissions to the U.S. Armed Forces. The university awarded Doctor of Philosophy degrees in environmental toxicology, science and mathematics education, public policy and urban forestry. In addition, 145 students received master's degrees.

The newest alumni heard from the critically acclaimed actor Omar J. Dorsey who delivered the commencement address.

"Today, metaphorically, is your finish line," Dorsey said. "When you walk across this stage today, this is your platform and that



Omar J. Dorsey degree is your gold medal."

Dorsey, a theatre graduate of Georgia State University, plays "Hollywood" on "Queen Sugar," a drama created by award-winning director Ava DuVernay that airs on the Oprah Winfrey Network. Dorsey told the graduates to not rush through the phases of their journey.

"Consider this college journey when you started," he said. "Consider the people you started with. Some are not here today. Some gave up. Some needed more time. Others had their reasons. But, in a marathon, it's about going at your own pace and finishing at your time."

Dorsey reflected on his own career — which includes roles in "Django Unchained" and "Selma" — encouraged graduates to continue to have patience, live in their own lane and understand their timing.

The Honorable Lionel L. Joseph was awarded an honorary doctorate degree. Joseph graduated from Southern University in 1972 with a B.S. degree and from Southeastern Louisiana University in 1974 with his master's degree. He served on the Independence Board of Aldermen for 24 years and currently serves on the Tangipahoa Parish Council representing District 3. He is a lifetime member of Southern University alumni associations.


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Dozens of alumni were celebrated, including members of the Class of 1969 and the Class of 1964. Also marching across the stage were several legacy graduates. Marcus Magee was recognized as a third - generation graduate. In the audience was his father, Jerome Magee, who graduated in 1986 and grandfather Melvin Magee who earned a B.S. degree in chemistry from Southern University in 1955.

D'Antonio Daigre was also recognized as a legacy graduate. His grandparents, David and Irma Ginn, have earned a combined five degrees from Southern and have been football season ticket holders since 1976. His mother, Michelle Ginn Daigre, also earned two degrees from Southern University.

Also recognized were the descendants of Wilbert and Amelia Ferdinand of Port Allen. Seven of their eight children received degrees from Southern. Alesha Murphy and Riyon Jack were the descendants in the 2019 Class, making a total number of 29 direct descendants of the Ferdinands who earned degrees from Southern.

As tradition has it, graduates took the Southern University Alumni Federation pledge, promising to remain committed to the university's progress.


HBCU DAY

staff, community members, and alumni were invited to attend and participate.







Melanie Walker Selected as 2019 Chancellor's Scholar

Southern University and A&M College recognized Melanie Walker, a 21-year-old nursing major, as its Chancellor's Scholar during the Annual Academic Honors Day Awards Program where James Chavis, supplier program manager at Boeing, served as keynote speaker.

Walker who is minoring in psychology, has a 3.77 grade point average. She is a historian of the Student Nurses' Association, a member of the Oncology Nurses' Association, American Nursing Association, Honors Student Association, Beta Kappa Chi, and the National Institute of Science. She is also a Honors College Ambassador.

"She is ambitious, devoted, and prepared to represent Southern University in all arenas," said Dr. James H. Ammons who presented the award on behalf of Ray Belton, President-Chancellor.

Walker is a published author and has been presented with the opportunity to get published in the online database for the American Association of Colleges of Nursing and by Springer Publishing Company. Walker is working on her thesis titled, "The Importance of Peer Mentorship during Nursing School for African American Students: An Integrative Literature Review."

She has accepted a job at Tulane Medical Center in New Orleans. Her goal is to be a certified registered nurse anesthetist, nurse researcher, and innovator.

The presentation was only one of the highlights of the Convocation. Chavis, a native of Itta Bena, delivered the keynote address for the awards program. Chavis earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in engineering from Southern University. He also has numerous certifications in Lean Six Sigma and Contract Management. He spoke to students about having a vision. He told them that once you make your plans, you must put the plan into action.

"Implementing the plan, is the most crucial part of success," said Chavis. "Most people have visions and plans, but never act on their plans because of fear of failure." Chavis said the last step of this process is to produce.

"One must be willing to put in the work in order to make the vision, the plan, and implementation a reality," he said. "To be successful, you have to work as hard as you can even when the tasks seem impossible," he said. "It will be the work that you produce that will define you. Your name and reputation will be judged by the works that you do. I encourage you to work with integrity, diligence, and thoroughness. For you are not only representing yourself, you are paving the way for those who will come after you."

Mr. Chavis has held many positions during his professional career: Engineer, Adjunct Professor, and Welder, with more than 13 years of experience in the field of Engineering. The vast majority of his experience has been in the oil and gas industry where he held key positions such as: Repair Process Engineer of the Western Hemisphere and Principal Reliability Engineer for North America Drilling and Exploration for Baker Hughes Inc. He has managed numerous multimillion-dollar projects domestically and internationally.

Southern Leads Effort to Provide Affordable Learning Solutions

President Ray Belton received the Executive Leadership Award from the HBCU Affordable Learning Solutions Network during the 3rd Annual meeting of the HBCUs Affordable Learning and Quality Online Program held this year in Denver, Colorado on April 2-5, 2019.

The President-Chancellor of the SUS was recognized for his contribution to the launching of the HBCUs Affordable Learning Solution (AL\$) Network in 2007 in New Orleans, Louisiana, and for the pioneering role in enabling the deployment of the Southern University Open Library for Education (suol4ed.org).

This partnership, initiated by Professor Moustapha Diack, led to the launching of Affordable Learning Solutions, the Southern University Open Library (SUOL) for (4) Education (Ed) [suol4ed. org]. The Southern University System of Louisiana is the first Louisiana Higher Education System and the first HBCU in America to have deployed an OER Digital Library for Education. The Library Holdings are teaching, learning, and research resources that reside in the public domain or have been released under an intellectual property license that permits their free use and repurposing by others. OER include full courses, course materials, modules, open textbooks, streaming videos, tests, software, and any other tools, materials, or techniques used to support access to knowledge.

The HBCUs Summit pre-conference workshop was invitation

only. The program included an overview of the AL\$ program; the Hewlett Foundations vision on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusiveness and OER; how to leverage Cal State University-MERLOT's services, HBCUs sharing their lessons learned on implementing their own AL\$ program; and activities for workshop participants to begin planning their strategies for adopting and customizing an AL\$ program for their campus. The afternoon of the pre-conference included a presentation and hands-on activities with "Apple's Everyone Can Code Program".

Louis "Nick" Joseph Awarded Honorary Degree

Louis "Nick" Joseph, a Southern University graduate who has made a lasting and positive impact on his community, the state and the nation, was awarded an honorary degree during the Spring 2019 Commencement Exercises.

Upon graduating from Sunshine High School in 1964, Joseph enlisted into the U.S. Army and completed a tour of duty in Vietnam serving with the 173rd Airborne Brigade. Upon discharged, he joined the Louisiana Army National Guard and retired after 34 years of service, holding the rank of chief warrant officer.

He began his teaching career in 1972 at Westside Middle School in Amite, Louisiana. During Joseph's 32-year tenure as an educator in the Tangipahoa Parish School System, he served as a teacher, principal, supervisor, director of administration, assistant superintendent and superintendent.

In addition, Joseph served on the Independence Board of Aldermen for 24 years and is currently serving his third term on the Tangipahoa Parish Council representing District 3.

Southern Wins \$50,000 Grant from Home Depot

Southern University has been awarded a \$50,000 campus improvement grant through The Home Depot: Retool Your School Grant Program. This program awards historically black colleges and universities (HBCU) grants to make sustainable improvements to their campuses. At the end of the competition, the top three schools with the most votes are considered for a grant. With the outpour of support from the community and our student and alumni groups, the university was fortunate to win a grant for a second year.

This year's grant will be used in the beautification of the iconic, popular part of the Bluff overlooking the Mississippi River. The project will include new seating, lighting, and more. The Bluff is a great asset for the campus community and also frequent visitors to campus due to being a part of a number of regional and national historic trails and districts. Last year, the university won a \$40,000 grant through the program, which was used to remodel and



update the John B. Cade Library which experienced flood damage during the 2018 Christmas holiday break. The grant was used to purchase new furniture and restore study areas.

Dr. Stubblefield Receives System's Life-Time Achievement Award

On April 16, 2019 the Southern University Ag Center's 15th Annual "Connecting Businesses with Contracts' Procurement Conference" was held in the Felton G. Clark Activity Center. The annual conference provides a venue for potential and existing business owners, contractors, non-profits, small towns, and municipalities to learn about the resources that are available through federal, state and local government agencies and prime companies.

Co-sponsors for the conference include the U. S. Small Business Administration, Louisiana Small Business Development Center at Southern University, Louisiana Economic Development (LED), and the Louisiana Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC).

This year's conference featured an inaugural ceremony to recognize excellence in Partnering, Research, Innovation, Development (business/ economic) and Entrepreneurship (P.R.I.D.E.). This event also highlighted Outstanding Researchers, the Rising Star in Research, Outstanding Researcher of the Year, and the Exceptional Star in Technology Transfer at an awards ceremony on Monday, April 15, 2019 at 6:30pm at Hayden Hall Theater.

The P.R.I.D.E. awards began in 1997 as part of a Baton Rouge campus initiative by the Office of Research and Strategic Initiatives and the Office of Sponsored Programs (under the direction of Dr. Robert Ford and Dr. Emmanuel Osagie) to recognize faculty members who excelled in research.

Ms. Lauren McCoy, Fox 44 Evening Anchor, served as Hostess for the evening. Dr. Robyn Merrick was in attendance to bring greetings from the System's Office and presented the Lifetime Achievement Award on behalf of the System Board



chairman to Michael Stubblefield, vice chancellor for research and strategic initiatives.

Dr. Stubblefield, who has a Ph.D. in engineering science in 1997 from Louisiana State University and a bachelor's degree from Southern University, has been a faculty member at Southern University for more than 20 years. He was named Vice Chancellor for Research and Strategic Initiatives in 2007. Dr. Stubblefield has also served as Director of the Center for Energy and Environmental Studies (nine years) and Director of the Center for Information and Technology Innovation (five years) and has more than 60 publications and/ or presentations. He has an impressive research, education, outreach, and contracting track record with over \$30 million dollars in grants or contracts funded during his tenure at Southern University.

Dr. Stubblefield has been a past recipient of one SU Grantsmanship Silver Club award, three (3) Most Funded Proposals Awards, and four (4) Millionaire Club Awards. He was also a 2001 Inductee into the SU Young Faculty Award: Science, Mathematics, Engineering, & Technology Hall of Fame at Southern University, Baton Rouge. He has served on several University, State Education, and National Research committees, panels and boards such as the Louisiana Board of Regents Sponsored Programs Advisory Board, and the National Science Foundation's Proposal Reviewer Panel. He has also chaired or co-chaired committees such as the Southern University Strategic Planning Committee, Louisiana Optical Network Initiative (LONI), Oak Ridge Associated Universities, HBCU/MI and the East Baton Rouge Planning Commission for Brownsfields. He has distinguished himself in the Greater Baton Rouge Area with acknowledgements such as the 2004 Baton Rouge Business Report's Top Forty Under Forty and appointment to the Governor's Transition Higher Education Group of the Economic Growth Transition Advisory Council in 2007.

Professor Deleso Alford Continues Groundbreaking Scholarship



Professor Alford delivered her stimulating research to the Health Science Center Office for Diversity, Equity & Inclusion cohorts, in partnership with the UNM Division for Equity & Inclusion and the UNM School of Law. She served the Spring 2019 Distinguished Diversity Scholar, speaking on *Enhancing Wellness By Honoring Our Humanity*.

Professor Alford is a Shreveport, Louisiana native and Visiting Professor of Law at Southern University Law Center and Adjunct Faculty and Associate Professor of Medicine at the University of Central Florida

Professor Alford is doing ground-breaking work bridging legal and medical education by telling stories—what she refers to as "HER stories"—the unique and particularized lived experiences of black women intersecting with health care and research. She has moved her scholarship into classrooms, benefiting both law and medical students with her racially inflected lessons.

Professor Alford's forthcoming book, *Tuskegee's Forgotten Women: The Untold Side of the U.S. Public Health Services Syphilis Study*, sheds light on how women were directly involved in and/or impacted by the U.S. Public Health Services Syphilis Study. This book offers an acknowledgment of the importance of women's voices, and especially black women's voices, in history.

1L Halari Vargas Organizes Rancher Relief Project




First year law student, Halari Vargas, organized the Southern Rancher Relief Project, and started the Flying V Foundation. The foundation is focused on helping others in agriculture industry after her father passed away.

The Flying V Foundation has partnered with Southern University's Dr. Renita Marshall, Chair of the Department of Ag, the Ag Center, SU's Research and Extension and the College of Ag, and SU's Institute for One Health One Medicine on a disaster relief effort to get hay and fencing supply donations to ranchers in Nebraska affected my the bomb cyclone.

The Louisiana Educational Advancement Project has arranged to have an 18wheeler help haul 100 round bales collected and donated by the St. Tammany Parish 4-H to assist Vargas in her efforts.

The group has set a goal to collect donations from at least 155 people, of just \$20. They are also accepting donations of livestock feed and fencing supplies, and are looking for volunteer drivers with flatbed trailers to haul the remaining bales of hay. Vargas' efforts have been featured on WVLA 9, WVLA 33, and will also be featured on the Louisiana Farm Bureau's shows, *This Week in Louisiana Agriculture* and the *Voice of Louisiana Agriculture*, who will also be shooting footage of the truck departure next week.

Ath PERSONAL HEALTH ANNUAL History Workshop

Nearly 90 individuals learned how to remain heart healthy during the Southern University Ag Center's 4th Personal Health History Workshop on April 5.

The event was hosted by the Center's Family and Human Development Unit in the Smith-Brown Memorial Student Union on the campus of Southern University.

During the workshop, Baton Rouge area cardiologist Dr. Jay Hollman discussed the warning signs of a heart attack in men and women and Nena Verrett-Gipson, the Coordinator of Fitness/ Wellness at Southern University demonstrated exercises to help your heart remain healthy.

The workshop also included sessions on Power of Attorney and Living Wills, the harmful effects of tobacco, understanding your child's personal health, eating for a healthy heart, healthy tactics for personal safety and security, mental health and well-being and Medicaid and Medicare.

"We also provided the participants with personal health history journals to assist them in keeping track of their health conditions, medications, treatments and any past medical procedures they may have had," said Delores Johnson, event organizer and Parent Educator at the SU Ag Center. "This information is often asked for by medical professionals when being admitted to the emergency room or seeing a doctor for the first time," added Johnson.

This is the fourth personal health history workshop hosted by the Family and Human Development Unit. The previous workshops focused on bone and joint health, developing a health journal to keep track of an individual's personal health history, proper foot care, how blood pressure and blood sugar levels respond to dietary factors, and low impact exercises.



The Southern University Ag Center's 3rd Annual Spring Garden Workshop drew a crowd of nearly 125 garden and flower enthusiast. The event was held on April 24 at the Maurice A. Edmond Livestock Arena and hosted by the Center's Wisteria Alliance Program in partnership with the Flower Lovers' Garden Guild and the Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE) Program.

The workshop featured interactive sessions on flower production, house plant care, edible landscapes, hibiscus production and hands-on demonstrations on building raised gardening beds, constructing rain barrels, flower arranging, and hydroponics.

"This conference was really beneficial to me," said Ursula Square, who has recently started gardening. "The information that I received on the edible landscaping will help me be able to grow fruit trees at home. What has really got me going has been learning about the raised gardening bed

and how you can find inexpensive ways to actually construct one, such as using cinder blocks," add Square.

"The Spring Garden workshop is an educational program that helps individuals through hands-on gardening, learning techniques, and skills that they can do at their home," said Zanetta Augustine, Assistant Agriculture Specialist, and workshop organizer. "Individuals can come to the workshop and learn how to garden on their own," said Augustine.

The Wisteria Alliance Program prepares women to own and operate their own farms and other agricultural based businesses. It began in 2012 as a pilot program aimed at providing practical, hands-on training for women who live on farms, and those who are interested in starting a farm, and/or urban or community garden.

The Flower Lovers' Garden Guild began on November 20, 1953, with a group of women gathering to organize a club that would enable them to learn more about flowers, to exchange ideas about their culture and to fellowship. In March 1954, the women decided to call the club the "Town and Country Garden Club." In October 1956, the name of the club was changed to the "Flower Lovers' Garden Guild." Its focus is the beautification of the community and homes with flowers and plants.

Eleven Louisiana residents recently received Food Safety Certification under the Southern University Ag Center's, "Enhancing Capacity of Louisiana Small Farms and Businesses," program. The training was held in Folsom, Louisiana, located in St. Tammany Parish. The all-female class included two restaurant co-owners, their workers and family members who were working in the restaurant.

The training in safe food handling was held for five weeks, ending on April 1. The participants learned about the importance of food safety, good personal hygiene, controlling time and temperature, preventing cross-contamination, cleaning and sanitizing.

Dr. Fatemeh Malekian, Professor at the Southern University Ag Center, conducted the training and was assisted by L'Asia George, Research Assistant, and Emily King, Produce Safety Program Coordinator.

William Augustine, Project Coordinator, brought the Mobile Technology Education Center to Folsom on the last class. The Mobile Unit is a full-size bus retrofitted into a mobile classroom. It is furnished with computers, the internet, a projector, and a small kitchen. L'Asia George conducted a food safety/cooking demonstration on the unit, focusing on using proper food safety practices during preparation, cooking, and serving. Participants received the ServSafe Food Handler Guide and a binder with the information taught in the sessions. At the final session, the participants were awarded certificates acknowledging their completion of the Food Handler course. The training and resource materials were provided at no cost to the participants.


Beta Gamma Sigma Honor Society Inducts New Members

College of Education Receives Child Care Grant

The College of Educ on & Human Development has received a \$226,572 grant from the U.S. Department of Educa to help eligible SUNO students pay for child care while in class.

The Child Care Access Means Parents in Schools (CCAMPIS) Program, authorized by the Higher Educ on Act and administered by the U.S. Department of Educ on, supports t cipa of low-income parents in postsecondary educa through the provision of campus-based childcare services.

SUNO's project, proposed by Dean Willie Jones, is funded for \$56,643 for four years (\$226,572) and will begin Oct. 1. The CCAMPIS Project will be administered through the College of Educ on & Human Development with assistance from the Office of Financial Aid and Ret n Counselors. The Project will use the funds to help students develop a degree program, provide child care assistance to student parents, and make available University counselors to provide resources to students who qualify for funding.

Par ipants in the project end par ng classes, early literacy development, and workshops for student par ipants, including classes ib self-esteem, enrichment and family dynamics.

These best praces will be supported by the Department of Child Development & Family Studies, School of Social Work, Department of Teacher Educa and various professionals from local agencies. 
