Dear Dr. Belton:

Earlier this year, the Southern University System Board of Supervisors approved our request to appoint Dr. Wilkes as Executive Director of the Southern University – Baton Rouge Student Health Center. Part of the justification for this appointment was that Dr. Wilkes had the professional background and institutional knowledge to reform the Student Health Center by improving the efficiency and effectiveness of its operations and increasing the quality of the student services delivered.

As anticipated, upon appointment, Dr. Wilkes commenced a thorough assessment of the budgetary and operational aspects of the Center with the goal of making comprehensive recommendations for improvements. This assessment included a review of materials of which she was previously aware, but also of information, which she was not privileged to review prior to her appointment. As a result of her comprehensive review, and the input of Center team members, Director Wilkes submitted a revised budget, which, generally, includes significant reductions in spending, allocations of adequate financial resources for purposes of pharmaceuticals, and some salary adjustments. I am confident that the implementation of Director Wilkes's recommendations will lead to a decrease in overhead costs, an increase in operational efficiency, and dramatically improve our ability to provide our students with the health and wellness services they need and deserve. It is important to note that if her recommendations are approved, the Student Health Center is poised to end the current fiscal year with a surplus in excess of \$300,000.00.

Upon review of the revised budget and several discussions with Dr. Wilkes, I have approved her recommendations, as presented. The revised budget recommendation and following personnel actions are hereto attached:

- 1. Associate Director Request to waive search and appoint (Alencia C. Ellis)
- 2. Clinical Pharmacist Salary Adjustment (Claudia Robin)

Dr. Wilkes's recommendation to adjust Ms. Claudia Robin's salary is both deserved based on her stellar performance and necessary to fulfill our organizational goal of high personnel retention. Ms. Robin has provided exemplary leadership and service within the Student Health Center by satisfying the pharmacy needs for our students for a number of years. Her functions are regularly reviewed through unannounced site visits from the Louisiana Board of Pharmacy and she has never been found to be deficient. She's continued to be an effective an indispensable part of our health and wellness team during the leadership transition despite being compensated at a markedly lower rate than her peers, and not receiving a salary review or adjustment during prior considerations. Adjusting her salary also is important for the organizational goals of our Division. Personnel retention allows us to maintain steady progress towards fulfilling our strategic goals. The threat of losing Ms. Robin to recruiting private and public practices looms large in the absence of a salary adjustment. If we lose her, it would disrupt that progress, draw us into a lengthy search and recruitment process, and cost us more particularly because the market rate for a professional with the experiences and accomplishments of Ms. Robin would cost \$120,000.00+. For the foregoing reasons, I believe that this salary adjustment is both warranted and necessary, and I urge favorable approval.

Her excellent ratings on previous unannounced inspections by state boards are a testament of the quality of her work. Previous year budgets did not provide an increase to her current salary. 

Dear Dr. Ellis:

This request solicits your authorization allowing Southern University at Shreveport (SUSLA) to adopt an increase in the general summer school tuition.

SUSLA has consolidated the summer school term into one comprehensive term. During past summer terms, there were separate terms covering the months of June and July. As a result of the consolidation, students can now enroll in a maximum of 15 credit hours in the one term. SUSLA's current fee schedule does not increase tuition beyond nine (9) credit hours. To ensure SUSLA is receiving comparable tuition rates as in prior years, the fee schedule has been modified to increase tuition up to 12 credit hours.

Our proposed fee schedule increases tuition and fees to a total of \$1,116.50 for 12 credit hours as compared to \$2,069.52 at Bossier Parish Community College. Therein, this submittal requests an increase that begins effective summer 2016. A schedule of fee comparison is enclosed to offer an additional justification for this request.



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
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

This request solicits your authorization allowing Southern University at Shreveport (SUSLA) to adopt an increase in the general summer school tuition.

SUSLA has consolidated the summer school term into one comprehensive term. During past summer terms, there were separate terms covering the months of June and July. As a result of the consolidation, students can now enroll in a maximum of 15 credit hours in the one term. SUSLA's current fee schedule does not increase tuition beyond nine (9) credit hours. To ensure SUSLA is receiving comparable tuition rates as in prior years, the fee schedule has been modified to increase tuition up to 12 credit hours.

Our proposed fee schedule increases tuition and fees to a total of \$1,116.50 for 12 credit hours as compared to \$2,069.52 at Bossier Parish Community College. 

The Chairman of the Board shall appoint the Personnel Affairs Committee to act to evaluate the President/Chancellor of the System. It shall be the Committee's duty to review the evaluation instrument, distribute it to the Board members, collect and analyze the completed document. The President/Chancellor of the Southern University System and Baton Rouge Campus shall have a formal evaluation conducted annually in June.

2. Presidential Self-Assessment:

The President/Chancellor shall present in writing to the Board members by the June Board of Supervisors meeting, a self-assessment which shall include, but not be limited to, (1) an assessment of performance in relation to the goals and objectives for the period for which he/she is being evaluated in the six (6) areas of the evaluation instrument; (2) a statement of goals and objectives for the next year; (3) a description of major areas of institutional concern; and (4) an assessment of major factors which may inhibit or alter expectations and objectives.

3. Evaluation Process:

Each Board member shall receive a copy of the President/Chancellor's self-assessment prior to completing the evaluation form. The Committee, having made an analysis of the evaluation, shall present to the full Board, in Executive Session, the final results on or before its annual meeting in June. The Board shall then meet in Executive Session with the President/Chancellor to present and discuss the final analysis of the evaluation.

4. Public Announcement:

The Chairman of the Board shall announce to the public when the Board's assessment of the President/Chancellor has been completed.

From 'Great 48' to 'Sweet 16,' SUBR shines at 2016 Honda Campus All-Star Challenge National Championship



SUBR was one of 48 HBCUs competing in Los Angeles, California for the 27th annual Honda Campus All-Star Challenge (HCASC) National Championship held April 3-5, 2016.

Last fall, 76 HBCUs began the "Road to the Championship," for the HCASC National Championship. In February 64 institutions faced off at the National Qualifying Tournaments. In April, teams from 48 schools competed for the national HCASC title.

The SUBR HCASC team includes Myeisha L. Webb (captain), senior, elementary education, Baton Rouge; Terrence J. Curry, sophomore, biology and pre-med, Newton, Mississippi; Kelvin P. Wells Jr., freshman, political science and international relations, Baton Rouge; and Kenon James Jones, senior, biology, Jeanerette. They were accompanied and coached by Deadra James Mackie, advisor, Dolores Margaret Richard Spikes Honors College and assistant professor, biology, and Diola Bagayoko, SU System Distinguished Professor of Physics, and dean, Dolores Margaret Richard Spikes Honors College.

The Jaguar team advanced to the (HCASC) "Sweet 16" after the preliminary round of the national competition to next compete against the team from Florida A&M University (FAMU). The FAMU team went on to win the 27th Honda Campus All-Star Challenge National Championship.

"It was clear, by the end of the preliminary rounds, that the Jaguar Team was well trained. The brilliance of the Jaguar Team was apparent in the margins of points by which it won several games. The regular and professional practices by the team, throughout the fall of 2015 and the spring of 2016, begot the superior preparation of the Jaguar Team," said Dr. Bagayoko.

Including this year's grant, Southern Baton Rouge has earned \$120,500 during its years of participation. Mary Oberembt, vice president College Bowl Company, Inc. stated, "You should be very proud of your [SU] team! The students and coaches spent countless hours preparing for the tournament, and proudly represented your institution. Honda enjoyed hosting the team, and getting to know your outstanding scholars."

According to Dr. Bagayoko, for the last 27 years, the American Honda Motor Company, Inc. has funded the quiz bowl teams on HBCU campuses in order for them to partake in the National Qualifying Competition and the Honda Campus All-Star Challenge Competition.

Approximately 236 faculty and students from 17 HBCUs were present at the meeting. Hampton University and Norfolk State University served as co-hosts for this highly competitive, academic event.

Eleven SUBR students made technical presentations on results of their scientific research. Arnedia Wallace, a 4.0 Honors College student, won first place in the behavioral sciences category. Andre Spears, another Honors College student, won second place in physics, and Luke Williams, a junior, also won second place, in sociology.

The Beta Kappa Chi Scientific Honors Society was founded in 1921, in Lincoln, Pennsylvania. It is a nationally recognized honors society, created by seven African-American males who were majoring in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) related fields. In those years, African-American students could not join some other honors societies, irrespective of their academic and scholarly calibers. The Beta Kappa Chi Scientific Honors Society was designed to highlight academic and research achievements by minority students with a 3.0 GPA and above. It is a platform for networking between high caliber, purposeful African-American students and STEM professionals. The Beta Kappa Chi Scientific Honors Society is a certified member of the Association of College Honor Societies.

Prof. Dorothy Jackson recently published a booklet titled <u>A Layman's Guide to Elder Law and Estate Planning</u>. The project was made possible through the generous financial support of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) Foundation.

In the piece, Grey analyzes the differences between the federal and Louisiana rules of evidence. Drafters of the Louisiana Code of Evidence largely modeled it after the Federal Rules of Evidence of 1975.

NITA TRIAL SKILLS TRAINING

SULC and the National Institute for Trial Advocacy Training (NITA) are offering a free trial skills training program for legal services attorneys and law students to be held Monday-Thursday, May 9-12, 2016.

Thirty-two attorneys from legal services providers from across the state and 16 SULC students representing graduating seniors and those currently enrolled have signed up to participate in the intensive, hands-on, four-day program. The training, which will pair the public service attorneys with students, will teach students how to become better advocates for their clients.

Registration is set for 8:30-9 a.m., and sessions are to be held from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, and 9 a.m. to noon on Thursday in room assignments throughout SULC's A. A. Lenoir Hall.

This program is one of two offered through the SULC/NITA partner-ship that will give students a competitive edge. The second program is a pilot program in which NITA will conduct a two-day class on client interviewing and fact-investigation skills. The classes will begin in fall 2016. SULC is one of the first law schools in the country to participate in the program.

LOUISIANA SUPREME COURT "RIDES THE CIRCUIT" AT SULC

The Louisiana Supreme Court held oral argument at Southern University Law Center (SULC) on Tuesday, March 15, 2016, on a family law case.

The session was a part of an ongoing effort to educate and inform students as well as the general public about the work of the Louisiana Supreme Court.

The session was open to law students, university and high school students, faculty, and the general public.

The Court periodically uses other venues other than the Supreme Court building in New Orleans. This this practice is known as "riding the circuit." According to Louisiana Supreme Court Chief Justice Bernette Joshua Johnson, "before transportation made it possible to travel easily to New Orleans, the Louisiana Supreme Court was constitutionally required to 'ride the circuit' to ensure citizens statewide would have access to justice," Chief Justice Johnson said.

The Louisiana Supreme Court last held court at Southern University Law Center in 1997.

Southern University Law Center Chancellor John K. Pierre, stated that SULC was "delighted" to host the session because of the "high priority" the school places on civil engagement and access to legal education.

Dr. Willie Jones III, Interim Dean, has been selected to participate in the 2016 Faculty Community of Teaching Scholars (FaCTS) initiative sponsored by the Center for the Advancement of Teaching and Faculty Development, funded through the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.

Dr. Jones attended the CAEP Conference in San Diego, CA March 22-25.

Dr. Jones developing a new bachelor of science degree in Educational Studies.

A program change was approved by the Curriculum Committee to change the prequisites of courses in the Elementary and Early Childhood degree programs. The program will now only require students to pass Praxis I to enroll in methods courses.

Dr. Pamela Wanga presented Master's in Human Development and Family Studies letter of intent to the Curriculum Committee for approval.

The Department of Teacher Education has been preparing for a pilot inspection by the TPI-US (Teacher Preparation Inspection-United States). TPI-US seeks to improve student learning through improving teacher preparation. Inspections provide states and programs with detailed insights into teacher preparation quality in order to foster program improvement and ensure that all new teachers support student learning from day one. TPI-US accomplishes this by working with state policymakers and with preparation program leaders and faculty to organize and conduct inspections at university-based and other teacher education programs throughout the United States. The department will receive \$10,000 for participating in this pilot inspection.

The College hosted its Town Hall Meeting March 17; 72 students attended. The purpose of the meeting was to inform students about new initiatives in the College as well as to give platform to students' views and concerns. Based on the evaluations, students were pleased with the structure of the meeting and they believe the College of Education is headed in the right direction. Dr. Jones was the keynote speaker. Dr. Vincent Johnson, Associate Professor of Education, gave the welcome address. Dr. Sherry Bachus, assistant professor of Child Development and Family Studies; Chandra Richardson, Retention Counselor; Dr. Wanga, Chair, Child Development and Family Studies; and Dr. Tanisca M. Wilson, Teacher Candidacy Coordinator, also had speaking roles. Other faculty members in attendance: Dr. Diane Bordenave, Dr. Deborah Darby, Dr. Jegnita Hegwood and Ms. Gloria Major.

Dr. Wilson and Mr. Mahn Do of Comprehensive Communications have developed the "Over The Hump" initiative in which aspiring teacher candidates who need only to pass the math part of Praxis I CASE engage in targeted tutoring of specific math concepts for five weeks. The goal is for students to schedule and pass Praxis I CASE math in the sixth week. Similar initiatives are being developed for students who need only to pass reading and writing.

Approximately 24 students signed up to attend the Praxis simulation April 5 and April 16. The purpose of the Praxis simulation is to minimize "the shock factor" of taking timed assessments and to fully prepare students, from the registration point to completing the time assessment for the actual Praxis assessment. At the completion of timed Praxis practice test, students receive a detailed assessment report. The Praxis Simulation experience was organized by Dr. Wilson.

The Department of Teacher Education, in collaboration with the Math Department, hosted Praxis I CASE math workshops from Feb. 20 to March 5. Dr. Vincent Johnson, Associate Professor of Education, and Dr. Kim Heon, Associate Professor of Math, facilitated the sessions. Praxis I CASE reading and writing workshops were March 19 - April 9. Dr. Wilson facilitated. All workshops sessions were organized by Dr. Wilson. Datum to assess workshop

effectiveness is continually collected and analyzed.

THE HONORE' CENTER FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

► Enrollment-Recruitment Update

The Honore' Center for Undergraduate Student Achievement's active enrollment figure remains at nine students completing the Spring semester as Honore' scholars, and based on their midterm grades we anticipate that none of those students will encounter any major academic difficulties that would jeopardize their remaining in the program as cohort members entering next year. The five students who withdrew from the program during the Fall 2015 semester also remained enrolled at SUNO. This month, we are requesting an update from SUNO on exactly how many other former Honore' students who left the program for various reasons since 2012 are still enrolled; based on the latest data from the Registrar's Office, that number was nine other students. Those students still enrolled combined with current cohort members represents an estimated 55% undergraduate retention rate overall.

Recruitment-wise, our efforts to recruit through the local high schools have continued but we also believe we must engage other strategies in April. Our 3rd annual Open House event produced four candidates who attended with their parents. Moving forward, we have proposed two new strategies to be underwritten ideally by the Ford Foundation grant:

A "Movers & Shakers" luncheon event in April solicited help in identifying candidates from local church pastors and black male mentoring organizations, such as the Fatherhood Round Table, 100 Black Men and the Silver Back Society.

The program will revisit plans to invest \$6,000-\$9,000 in a paid advertising campaign targeting the three urban radio stations in the metro-NOLA listening area.

▶F.F.A.A. Update

Two other objectives and elements of the Five Fifths Agenda for America approach, besides the development of black male initiative here at SUNO, have been to:

- A. Cultivate stronger partnerships with local school districts and CMO's (charter management organizations) and pro-education foundations.
- B. Explore whether the other two HBCU's in New Orleans would be interested in developing their similar black male initiatives.

The program continues to pursue both of those FFAA goals in 2016, with limited results on cultivating greater synergy with the other two local HBCU's. With regards to cultivating stronger pre-K-12 partnerships, program administrators met with several CMO's, school leaders and pro-education nonprofits about strategic partnerships with the SUNO College of Education and the Honore' program. During March, there were preliminary meetings with representatives from the New Schools for New Orleans (NSNO) organization and the Choice Schools Foundation. Administrators also met with an advocate at the Greater New Orleans Foundation about exploring prospects for local grant opportunities that were announced April 1. The goal remains to expand opportunities for our cohort members and ultimately for other SUNO Education majors to gain needed experience at schools before they do any formal "pre-service" teaching.

▶ Other News

The Honore' Center continued to visit local high schools to recruit new students for its Fall 2016 cohort. The Open

House was March 30 for interested students and their parents. This year, using higher eligibility standards recommended by our SUNO administrators, we are seeking students who will be eligible for entry into SUNO upon matriculation in August. However, we still will consider applicants who might require developmental classes.

During March, three Honore' "apprentice educators" have become fully embedded at the Langston Hughes Charter Academy (pre-K-thru-8), where they are spending two days per week learning various classroom skills and techniques from master teachers and administrators. A recent news story on public radio station WWNO-89.9FM interviewed one of those young men about his experiences. Louis Blackmon, Denzel Roberts and Donovan Woods are the first to participate in the pilot project.

The Honore' cohort members continued to attend weekly Praxis-I Exam preparation sessions on Saturdays. Several cohort members took portions of the Praxis-I CORE exam March 29-31 for the first time, but with mixed results – one passed his section, but two others did not and will have to repeat the exam at a later date.

Cohort members attended a New Orleans Pelicans NBA basketball game, courtesy of the NBA players.

The event received generous sponsor support from the Title IV E Child Welfare Training Program and from the St. Thomas Health Center.

The School received support through the Community Resource Center from the Advisory Group of the Metropolitan Human Services District to support training activities in child's mental health and provide resources in access to human services.

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


Larry Ferdinand Appointed to State Housing Board

Previous projects conducted by Dr. Orban involving poultry, swine and dairy cattle feed formulation, animal feed quality, analysis, safety and biosecurity were in Nigeria, Bangladesh, Kenya, Ethiopia and Mali.












Coach David Francis
