The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that the demand for qualified construction managers will grow eight percent between 2021 and 2031. It is anticipated that much of this demand will be generated by construction projects funded by the Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). Although requirements may vary, publicly funded construction projects are often required to meet participation goals for Minority, Women, Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (MWDBE). The increased demand for construction managers created by the IIJA will likely lead to increased demand for minority construction managers. Increased demand without sufficient supply leads to shortages. According to the United Negro College Fund (UNCF), 25% of African American STEM graduates are produced by HBCUs. With its HBCU designation, SUBR is uniquely positioned to produce Construction Management graduates ready to meet the burgeoning demand for minority construction managers.

B. The Master Plan and Institutional Role, Scope, and Mission

How does the program align with your institutional role, scope, and mission? If the program does not align, provide a compelling rationale for the institution to offer the program.

The mission of Southern University and A&M College, an Historically Black, 1890 land-grant institution, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is to provide a student-focused teaching and learning environment that creates global leadership opportunities for a diverse student population where teaching, research, service, scholarly and creative expectations for students and faculty are achieved through the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral programs offered at the institution via different instructional modalities and via public service. The proposed program will create a myriad of opportunities in the field of construction management for our diverse student population. Construction management is a growing field and educated construction managers are in high demand.

7. How does the program align with your institution's strategic plan and academic program portfolio?

One of the goals of the strategic plan of Southern University and A&M College is "Commitment to Student Access and Affordability." The plan includes a listing of related objectives including several which will be addressed by the proposed program: (1) increasing end-of-semester fall head count enrollment, (2) increasing new first-time and full-time enrollment, (3) increasing undergraduate enrollment, (4) increasing transfer-in enrollment, and (5) increasing the percentage of adult learners (25 years and older).

- 8. How does the program align with the priorities outlined in the Board of Regents Master Plan for Higher Education? Provide brief descriptions for each. Additional details will be required later in the proposal.
 - Accessibility (mode of delivery, alternate course scheduling)

Many potential construction management students work full-time. Classes will be offered evenings and Saturdays as much as possible. As the program matures, hybrid and/or online class offerings will be incorporated.

Affordability (use of OER, transfer agreements, prior learning assessment, employer funded)

The Southern University System and the SUBR Bookstore participates in Follett Access, a partnership that allows students to rent textbooks at a reduced cost with the charge posted directly to the students' tuition and fees bill. In addition, instructors will be encouraged to consider OER materials. Prior Learning Assessments to allow students to receive academic credit for work experience will be incorporated into the program. Further, the curriculum has been developed to consider the Louisiana Transfer curriculum and still allow students to complete the program with an additional two years of study.

Partnerships (with industry, community-based organizations, other institutions)

We will pursue partnerships with local high schools and community colleges to recruit students. In addition, we will also pursue partnerships with the Associated General Contractors (AGC), National Association of Home Builders (NAHB), Louisiana State Contractors Licensing Board (LSCLB) and local contractors. Through the College of Science and Engineering, partnerships are already being developed with contractors, Hensel Phelps and McCarthy. In addition, the Southern University System Office of Facilities Planning will provide internship opportunities for program students.

Work-based learning (paid or experiential internships, apprenticeships, etc.)
 The curriculum for the proposed program includes a requirement for an internship. Opportunities will be provided by the System Office of Facilities Planning and local partners.

C. Need

9. How does the program align with relevant local, regional, and/or state workforce strategies and future societal educational needs?

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) is expected to create close to a million new jobs over the next decade. Many of those jobs are expected to be in construction, engineering, and accounting. Second quarter data in 2021 indicated that 88% of contractors were passing on projects because they were having difficulty finding educated and skilled workers. This proposed program seeks to provide educated, qualified construction managers and because of the demographic of our student population also address issues of underrepresentation of African Americans in this field.

10. Summarize faculty engagement with alumni, community representatives, employers, Regional Economic Development Organizations (REDO) or other external stakeholders and explain how those conversations shaped the design and curriculum of this proposed degree.

Contractors such as McCarthy and Hensel Phelps have reached out to speak with classes to stoke student interest in the construction management field. In addition, these contractors have provided feedback regarding specific knowledge, skills and abilities that would make graduates more valuable and productive once hired. This feedback has been incorporated into the required courses of the curriculum. Further, alumni who have worked in construction management have also provided feedback regarding coursework and education that would have been beneficial. This feedback has also been incorporated into the curriculum.

Consistent with the University's traditional service area, the program is expected to attract students from a local, regional, state and national service area.

It is anticipated that students in the existing program will be able to take courses from the Construction Management program as technical electives as a "concentration." Students completing Associates' degrees at 2 year colleges will be able to complete bachelor's degrees in approximately two additional years at Southern University. Employers will offer internships and recruit program graduates for full-time positions. Students in the Civil Engineering program who wish to transfer to Construction Management will be able to utilize the majority of their coursework from years one through three. Further, students in the Civil Engineering program will also be able to complete twelve hours of construction management electives for a concentration in construction management. We anticipate a summer program to introduce high school students to construction management.

29. Describe how the institution will support graduates in meeting career goals such as securing employment, further education, and industry certification.

We have two employer partners and will continue to seek additional partnerships to promote employment upon graduation. We will also invite employers to participate in career fairs and recruitment activities on campus and interact with students in classes. Students will be required to sit for the Certified Associate Constructor examination as well as complete a three hour course on Credentialing and Professional Development as part of the curriculum.

Employment rates and successful completion of the AIC Certified Associate Constructor examination will be tracked at the time of graduation.

Students in the Introduction to Construction and Engineering Management course in the Civil Engineering department are asked each semester what their short term and long-term career goals are. A number of those students want to work in construction and many of them want to own contracting firms. In addition, students at BRCC express an interest in pursuing a bachelor's degree but are intimidated by the prospect of attending LSU.

Dr. Sahoo,

The Criminal Justice Department is requesting that your office approve a revision to its traditional (on-campus) Master of Science in Criminal Justice curriculum.

The changes to the curriculum reflect the removal of all 4 special concentrations (Corrections, Criminal Justice Investigation, Law Enforcement, and Public Administration) areas. Currently, the degree given in this Criminal Justice Program does not acknowledge any concentration but, instead a more generic degree in Criminal Justice. To maintain consistency with the degree offered, the Department merely removed the 4-concentrations and merged one course from each concentration to make up the middle section of our curriculum sheet (or 12 credit hours) offerings. The number of total credit hours for the completion of the degree never changed (i.e., 36). The core course offerings never changed, the required electives numbers (i.e., 12) are the same but now reflect the blended courses (once reflected in the concentrations), and the other electives remain the same (except that there are more selections to choose from). Please see the attached documents (the old curriculum with the Concentrations noted and the newly revised curriculum with the removal of the concentrations), along with a completed Curriculum Change Recommendation Form. Upon your approval, please refer the request to your standing curriculum committee, as I am informed that this is the protocol. If not, please advise.

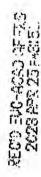

The goals of this program are to: 1) provide students with advanced knowledge in research, theory, and statistics that contributes to their educational and professional development; 2) create the framework for students' research, management approaches, and leadership developments, from an historical and contemporary context locally, nationally and globally.

- 1. Identify the connection between research, theory, and statistics in a scholarly written format.
- 2. Evaluate various management approaches, criminological and leadership theories to identify the advantages and disadvantages.
- 3. Evaluate selected historical and contemporary leadership styles and the impact on the local, national, and global economy, social contexts, and geo-political environments.

Rationale for the Change:

Since the inception of the Criminal Justice Master's program at SUBR, the curriculum has offered basic criminal justice core and elective courses. Historically, the elective courses were further divided into 4 separate concentrations along with an additional 6 hours of free electives. However, due to the existing market changes (i.e., student demands, trends in criminal justice curricula, and declining enrollment), the future growth, and advancement of the program, the department moved to make the necessary changes to place our students in a more competitive environment.

Failure to approve this BA-7 would result in Baton Rouge Campus not having adequate budget authority to address its increase in self-generated fees in the current fiscal year. This BA-7 provides for a shift in fees and self-generated revenue.

Greetings President Shields:

Eleanor Collins, a staff member at the Southern University Law Center (SULC) in collaboration with Ken Dawson has completed an application for two projects totaling \$600,000 under the Federal Highways Administration (FHWA) Recreational Trails Program for Louisiana (RTRL). The program is a state administered federal-aid grant program funded by the National Recreational Trails Fund Act (NRTFA) of 1991 for the purpose of providing and maintaining recreational trails and trails-related facilities.

The FHWA RTPL for Louisiana is an 80/20 reimbursable (the state reimburses sponsors 80% of eligible costs) matching grant program. The sponsor match can be either cash or value of documented contributions of land, material, equipment, labor or services.

Grant funding can be used for the entire trail project or a component (trail, tread, bridge or boardwalk, trailhead, trailside, etc.) of the trail. Projects are selected based on criteria developed in compliance with federal regulations.

I am requesting board authorization for the grant proposals to be submitted and board ratification of any steps needed by either you or me to facilitate execution of the grant if it is awarded. Authorization and/or ratification also means that the university system has the ability to manage the project and that the matching funds are available for the project.

Please present this request to the Southern University Board of Supervisors at its July 21, 2023 meeting for approval. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

This letter comes to request your approval of the attached Cooperative Endeavor Agreement (CEA) between Southern University and A&M College and the Southern University System Foundation. With your favorable review and consideration we also request that it be placed on the agenda of the July 21, 2023 Board of Supervisors meeting for consideration. This CEA provides for the establishment and funding of the Felton G. Clark Endowment Program. If approved, would allow the University to use HBCU Title III grant funding as a 1 to 1 match for non-federal funds deposited into the Endowment Program at the System Foundation. This 5-year grant program allows the University to spend up to 50% of interest earned each year for educational purposes. The endowment corpus must remain in its investment accounts for 20 years beyond the last deposit into the account.

The year 1 allocation from the HBCU Title III grant is \$500,000. The Foundation has already identified and earmarked the year 1 matching funding of \$500,000. Hence, the approved CEA for the Felton G. Clark Endowment would begin with an initial corpus of \$1,000,000.

This agreement was developed by the University general counsel to comply with HBCU Title III, federal and state requirements. Please contact me if I can answer any questions or provide additional assistance or support to this request.

CONTRACT BETWEEN

WHEREAS, University has \$500,000 in Title III grant funds that it desires to use for the recently established *Felton Grandison Clark Endowed Fellowship Fund*;

WHEREAS, the Foundation has been established for the purpose of raising money for University;

WHEREAS, the Foundation has received donations in excess of \$500,0000 for match to the \$500,000 endowment grant by the University's Title III grant program;

WHEREAS, University desires to designate the Foundation as the entity to act as the depository and manage the endowment activity; and

WHEREAS, Foundation agrees to be bound by the terms of the and obligations of the program.

NOW, THEREFORE, the University and the Foundation do agree for the mutual covenants and consideration set forth herein as follows:

I. LEGAL JUSTIFICATION

Pursuant to Title 34 § 628.3 of the Code of Federal Regulations, the University is permitted to designate a foundation as the recipient of an endowment to manage the endowment activity under the following conditions:

- A. The Foundation is legally authorized to receive endowment fund corpus and will do so in accordance with the regulations (i.e., Title 34 §§ 628.3, 628.6, 628.10 and 628.41 through 628.47 of the Code of Federal Regulations); and
- B. The University agrees to be liable for any violation by the Foundation.

C. By signing below, the Parties agree that the above requirements have been met and necessary assurances are agreed.

II. FUNDING

The University has taken \$500,000 of its Title III funding for this endowment program, which represents less than twenty (20) percent of its total grant amount. The Foundation has identified a dollar-for-dollar match with private funds it has received on behalf of the University.

Appropriate private funds include cash or low risk securities. The Foundation expressly agrees that the private funding source will not include a pledge of funds or securities, deferred gifts such as a charitable remainder annuity trust or unitrust, any federal funds, any borrowed funds, or the corpus or income of an endowment fund or quasi-endowment funds. This includes the corpus or income of an endowment or quasi-endowment fund established for the purpose of raising money for the institution.

III. OBLIGATIONS OF THE FOUNDATION

- A. The Foundation shall act as depository and manager of the private funds and the Federal matching funds pursuant the provisions referenced above. Said funds must be invested by the Foundation, and must have a duration of twenty (20) years. The Foundation agrees to the twenty (20) year grant period from the last Title III match deposited and that all federal requirements associated with the use, reporting and audits of grant funding.
- B. The Foundation acknowledges it must establish an endowment fund independent of any other endowment fund established by or for the University.
- C. The Foundation acknowledges it shall invest, for the duration of the grant period, the endowment fund established under this part in savings account or in low-risk securities in which a regulated insurance company may invest under the law of Louisiana. When investing in the endowment fund, the Foundation shall exercise the judgment of care, under the circumstances, that a person of prudence, discretion and intelligence would exercise in the management of his or her own financial affairs. The Foundation acknowledges that it may not invest its endowment fund in real estate.
- D. The Foundation acknowledges it must keep records of the source, kind and amount of matching funds; the type and amount of investments of the endowment fund; the amount of endowment fund income; and the amount and purpose of expenditures of endowment fund income.
- E. The Foundation acknowledges it must retain each year's records for a minimum of five (5) years after the grant period ends; allow the Secretary access to information that the Secretary judges necessary to audit or examine the records required, carry out the audit required in 2 CFR part 200, subpart F, comply with

the reporting requirements in 2 CFR 200.512, and submit reports on a timely basis.

IV. USE OF FUNDS

- A. The Parties agree that an Endowment Committee shall be established including but not limited to the following individuals or his/her designee, the Title III Director, the CFO, and Provost of the University and the CEO of the Foundation to establish recommendations for expenditure of any allowable income and/or corpus after the expiration of the grant period.
- B. The University may withdraw and spend up to fifty (50) percent of the total aggregate endowment fund income earned prior to the date of expenditure.
- C. The University may spend endowment fund income for:
 - a. Costs necessary to operate the institution, including general operating and maintenance costs:
 - b. Costs to administer and manage the endowment fund; and
 - c. Costs associated with buying and selling securities, such as stockbroker commissions and fees to "load" mutual funds;
- D. The University may not use endowment fund income for:
 - a. A school or department of divinity or any religious worship or sectarian activity;
 - b. An activity that is inconsistent with a State plan for desegregation applicable to the University; or
 - c. An activity that is inconsistent with a State plan applicable to the grantee.

V. GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. The University reserves the right to terminate this agreement and designate another foundation or itself as the manger of the endowment.
