As mentioned by the email from Ms Julie Taylor, Director of Academic Relations for the Fulbright at the Institute of International Education, this prestigious award combines two main activities: research and teaching/capacity building. In collaboration with faculty at St. Augustine University of Tanzania, we have identified two tentative research topics to address: changing demand and preferences for Tanzania tourists and the impact of rural electrification on education outcomes. We selected the first topic due to the economic importance of the tourist sector in Tanzania. For the second topic, rural electrification is one of the critical public infrastructure investments toward spurring economic growth and development and achieving the United Nations' commitment to end poverty. However, there is a literature gap regarding the channels through which rural electrification can affect socioeconomic development as rural households switch to clean energy sources.

I will also organize a boot camp on Quantitative research methods using R software. The participants are undergraduate and graduate students and junior faculty. The training is part of the Capacity Building for graduate students and faculty to publish in peer-reviewed journals. I will also work with the faculty to write collaborative research proposals and with senior administrators at St. Augustine University of Tanzania to pursue more collaboration avenues, particularly establishing faculty and student exchange programs.

I look forward to participating in this prestigious program at St. Augustine University of Tanzania.

# Second Amendment To INTERAGENCY COOPERATIVE ENDEAVOR AGREEMENT between LOUISIANA DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT and SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY AT SHREVEPORT, LOUISIANA (SUSLA)

Be It Known, that this Second Amendment to Interagency Cooperative Endeavor Agreement shall be effective as of the 1<sup>st</sup> day of October, 2023 ("Effective Date") by and between:

LOUISIANA DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, also known as Louisiana Economic Development (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "LED" or "State"), an Agency of the State of Louisiana, created and operating under the laws of the State of Louisiana, with offices at LaSalle Building, 11<sup>th</sup> Floor, 617 North 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Baton Rouge, LA. 70802, and a mailing address of P. O. Box 94185, Baton Rouge, LA. 70804- 9185, herein represented by its duly authorized and undersigned Secretary; and

SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY at SHREVEPORT, LOUISIANA (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "SUSLA", or "Contractor"), a Louisiana public educational institution, created and operating under the laws of the State of Louisiana, with offices at and a mailing address of 3050 Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive, Shreveport, LA. 71107, herein represented by its duly authorized and undersigned Interim Chancellor;

Who, in order to serve the public for the purposes hereinafter stated, declared and acknowledged as follows:

WHEREAS, the parties hereto have previously entered into an Interagency Cooperative Endeavor Agreement (Agreement), dated and to begin as of May 18, 2020, and an amended Agreement with services to be completed and terminated on June 30, 2024; and in order to better meet the needs of the parties hereto, the parties now desire to amend, supplement, and extend the term and termination date as provided in the said Agreement, as hereinafter stated;

**THEREFORE**, by mutual consent and agreement, and notwithstanding any other provisions to the contrary contained in the original Interagency Cooperative Endeavor Agreement (Agreement) and previous Amended Agreement, (any and all such contrary provisions being hereby modified so as to be consistent with this First Amendment), the aforesaid Agreement is hereby amended, supplemented, and the term and termination date are hereby extended, as follows:

In **Section IV.**, entitled "<u>Deliverables</u>", of the original Agreement and as amended in the 1<sup>St</sup> Amendment Agreement, is hereby revised, to read as follows:

## IV. Deliverables

The Contractor shall produce and provide for the benefit of the public and the State of Louisiana:

- (a) The performance of activities and services and the achievement of the goals and objectives, as shown above;
- (b) SUSLA shall submit semi-annual Progress Reports to the LED Contract Monitor (beginning on **December 31**, 2023, and thereafter due on **June 30** and **December 31** of each year during the term of this Agreement), signed by an officer or key employee of the Contractor, describing the Contractor's activities and performance of services during the previous period, and the extent of the achievement of the goals and objectives of this Agreement;
- (c) SUSLA shall submit to LED, not later than **December 31, 2023**, SUSLA's Invoice for the first annual grant payment as provided herein; and
- (d) Beginning not later than June 30, 2021, June 30, 2022, June 20, 2023, and June 30, 2024, SUSLA shall submit its annual Sworn Certification of Compliance and Request for Payment of the annual grant funds to be provided by LED through this Agreement, to be consistent with the provisions, goals and objectives of this Agreement; and after their receipt and approval by LED's Contract Monitor, and in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, payment of the annual grant funds may be made by LED. The form for the Sworn Certification of Compliance and Request for Payment to be used by SUSLA is attached hereto as "Attachment A" and is made a part hereof by this reference.

Contractor shall also submit to LED copies of all contracts with outside consultants and service providers relative to the performance of services under this Agreement, if any, upon the final execution thereof.

In Section VIII., entitled "Budget / Maximum Cost / Payment Terms", paragraph 1-5 of the original Agreement and as amended in the 1<sup>St</sup> Amendment Agreement, is hereby revised to read as follows:

# VIII. Budget / Maximum Cost / Payment Terms

The approved Project Budget for this project is incorporated herein as "Attachment B-2", which is attached hereto and is made a part hereof by this reference. The total amount of the costs to LED contemplated by this contract shall not exceed the total amount of ONE MILLION SIX HUNDRED FOURTEEN THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED & NO/100 (\$1,614,900.00) DOLLARS, which total amount shall be inclusive of all costs, expenses and any approved travel expenses to be paid by LED in connection with the public services and activities to be provided under this contract. The total billings to LED for all services and expenses covered by this contract shall not exceed the total amount stated above. This is the total amount that has been allocated for this project by the Department of Economic Development. Reimbursements or payments under this contract will be allowed only for expenditures occurring between and including the dates of May 18, 2020, and June 30, 2025, and all of the Contractor's services hereunder shall be completed by that last date, including the submission of the Contractor's Final Progress Report which shall be due not later than June 30, 2025, and this contract shall terminate on that last date.

Provided Contractor's progress, performance of the Contractor's activities and services, and compliance in achieving its project goals and performance objectives under this Agreement are to

the reasonable satisfaction of LED, as provided hereinafter, payments to the Contractor hereunder shall be made by LED on the following basis, and scheduled as follows:

The <u>first</u> annual grant payment for the Plan Year through Year 2, in the amount of \$396,600.00, in accordance with the Project Budget Reporting and Invoicing Schedule attached hereto, shall be paid by LED to SUSLA on or about **January 1**, 2024, provided SUSLA has submitted its Invoice for this first payment by **December 31**, 2023, and after the approval of the Invoice by LED's Contract Monitor; otherwise the payment may not be paid by LED until 30 days after its receipt of SUSLA's Invoice therefor, and the approval of LED's Contract Monitor;

The <u>second</u> annual grant payment for Year 3, in the amount of \$812,500.00, in accordance with the Project Budget Reporting and Invoicing Schedule attached hereto, shall be paid by LED to SUSLA on or about August 1, 2024, provided SUSLA has submitted its Sworn Certification of Compliance and Request for Payment for this second payment by June 30, 2024, and after the approval of the Request for Payment by LED's Contract Monitor; otherwise the payment may not be paid by LED until 30 days after its receipt of SUSLA's Sworn Certification of Compliance and Request for Payment therefor, and the approval of LED's Contract Monitor; and

The <u>third</u> annual grant payment for Year 4, in the amount of \$405,800.00, in accordance with the Project Budget Reporting and Invoicing Schedule attached hereto, shall be paid by LED to SUSLA on or about August 1, 2025, provided SUSLA has submitted its Sworn Certification of Compliance and Request for Payment for this second payment by June 30, 2025, and after the approval of the Request for Payment by LED's Contract Monitor; otherwise the payment may not be paid by LED until 30 days after its receipt of SUSLA's Sworn Certification of Compliance and Request for Payment therefor, and the approval of LED's Contract Monitor.

In **Section XVIII.**, entitled "<u>Term of Contract</u>", of the original Agreement and as amended in the 1<sup>st</sup> Amendment Agreement, is hereby revised, to read as follows:

## XVIII. Term of Contract

This contract shall begin as of May 18, 2020; this project and all of the Contractor's services shall be completed by and this contract shall terminate on June 30, 2025, (except that the auditing and accounting requirements will survive for one (1) year following such distribution) unless amended in writing, approved and signed by all parties, and approved by the State's Office of State Procurement.

WHEREAS, "Attachment B-1", titled "Project Budget 2020-2024" of the 1<sup>st</sup> Amendment Agreement is hereby deleted and attached hereto as "Attachment B-2", titled "Project Budget 2020-2025" and by this reference made a part hereof, and made a part of the Interagency Cooperative Endeavor Agreement, as amended.

WHEREAS, it is further understood and agreed that the language contained in this Second Amendment shall supersede any language to the contrary contained in the original Cooperative Endeavor Agreement, First Amendment Agreement, and attachments; and all other terms, provisions and conditions of the original Cooperative Endeavor Agreement, the First Amendment

Agreement, and attachments, unless modified herein, shall remain the same, unchanged and in full force and effect.

# STATE OF LOUISIANA PARISH OF EAST BATON ROUGE

#### CONTRACT

Be it known the Board of Regents of the State of Louisiana, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "State" or "Regents, and the <u>Board of Supervisors for the Southern University System, which is officially domiciled at J.S. Clark Administration Building 4<sup>th</sup> Floor President's Office, Baton Rouge, LA 70808, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Contractor," do hereby enter into this contract under the following terms and conditions:</u>

#### Scope of Services

Contractor hereby agrees to furnish the following services:

As provided in Appendix A, Contractor will distribute designated funds to its participating institutions for nurse capitation.

Goals: Regents seeks to increase capacity for enrolling and graduating nurses to serve the needs of the state of Louisiana.

Objectives: The objective of this contract is to expand enrollment capacity through capitation within the Contractor's system by enrolling additional qualified students in the clinical components of the Contractor's Nursing Program during the fall 2023 and spring 2024 semesters, in accordance with Appendix A.

Contractor shall ensure that each participating institution within its system submits the Enrollment Invoice Reports (Appendix B) no later than 15 days following the census date of the fall 2023 semester and spring 2024 semester (as applicable).

Performance Measures: Contractor's performance will be measured by the Contract Monitor based upon a determination of whether the above stated objectives have been met, and all services have been completed in accordance with the terms of the contract.

Monitoring Plan: This contract will be monitored by the Assistant Commissioner for Strategic Planning and Student Success or designee. The Contract Monitor will work closely with the Contractor to review activities conducted and deliverables submitted by the Contractor throughout the term of the contract. The Contract Monitor will address any deficiencies, as well as a plan to correct said deficiencies, with the Contractor. During the term of the contract the Contractor shall immediately inform Contract Monitor of any problems, delays or adverse conditions which will materially affect the ability to attain contract objectives or prevent the meeting of time schedules and goals. Contractor's notification shall be accompanied by a statement describing the corrective action taken or recommended by the Contractor, and any assistance which may be needed to resolve the situation. The Contract Monitor will report the Contractor's overall performance on a contract evaluation form at the end of the contract term.

#### Deliverables:

As the deliverables to this Contract, the Contractor shall validate and submit to Regents the Enrollment Invoice Report (Appendix B) from their participating institutions no later than 30 days following the census date of the fall 2023 semester and spring 2024 semester (as applicable).

#### **Payment Terms**

In consideration of the services described above, the State hereby agrees to pay the Contractor \$3,500 (three thousand-five hundred dollars and no cents) per student, per semester, in accordance with Appendix A and Appendix B. The total maximum amount payable under the contract shall not exceed \$336.000.00 (three-hundred and thirty-six thousand dollars).

Payment is predicated upon submission, and approval by the State, of the Deliverables detailed above and submission of invoices signed by a duly authorized institutional representative. Travel and other reimbursable expenses constitute part of the total maximum payable under the contract and shall not be reimbursed. Payment will be made only on approval of the Assistant Commissioner for Strategic Planning and Student Success or designee and is contingent upon the availability of funds.

If progress and/or completion to the reasonable satisfaction of the State is obtained, payments are scheduled as follows:

#### Taxes

Contractor hereby agrees that the responsibility for payment of taxes from the funds thus received under this contract and/or legislative appropriation shall be Contractor's obligation and identified under Federal tax identification number <u>72-6000817</u>.

#### Public Liability

Contractor shall indemnify and hold the Regents harmless against any and all claims, demands, suits, and judgments of the sums of money to any party for loss of life or injury or damage to person or property growing out of, resulting from, or by reason of, any negligent act or omission, operation or work of Contractor or its employees while engaged upon or in connection with the services required or performed by Contractor hereunder.

#### Claims for Liens

Contractor shall be solely liable for and shall hold the Regents harmless for any and all claims or liens for labor, services, or materials furnished to Contractor in connection with the performance of its obligations under this agreement.

#### **Termination for Cause**

Should the State determine that the Contractor has failed to comply with the Contract's terms, the State may terminate the Contract for cause by giving the Contractor written notice specifying the Contractor's failure. If the State determines that the failure is not correctable, then the Contract shall terminate on the date specified in such notice. If the State determines that the failure may be corrected, the State shall give a deadline for the Contractor to make the correction. If the State determines that the failure is not corrected by the deadline, then the State may give additional time for the Contractor to make the corrections or the State may notify the Contractor of the Contract termination date. If the Contractor seeks to terminate the

Contract, the Contractor shall file a complaint with the Chief Procurement Officer under La. R.S. 39:1672.2-1672.4.

#### Termination for Convenience

State may terminate the Contract at any time without penalty by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the Contractor of such termination or negotiating with the Contractor a termination date. Contractor shall be entitled to payment for deliverables in progress, to the extent the State determines that the work is acceptable.

#### Remedies for Default

Any claim or controversy arising out of this agreement shall be resolved by the provisions of LSA - R.S. 39:1672.2 - 1672.4.

#### Other Remedies

If the Contractor fails to perform in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract, or if any lien or claim for damages, penalties, costs and the like is asserted by or against the State, then, upon notice to the Contractor, the State may pursue all remedies available to it at law or equity, including retaining monies from amounts due the Contractor and proceeding against any surety of the Contractor.

#### Governing Law

This Contract shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, including but not limited to La. R.S. 39:1551-1736; rules and regulations; executive orders; standard terms and conditions, special terms and conditions, and specifications listed in the RFP(if applicable); and this Contract. Venue of any action brought, after exhaustion of administrative remedies, with regard to this Contract shall be in the Nineteenth Judicial District Court, Parish of East Baton Rouge, State of Louisiana.

#### **Record Ownership**

All records, reports, documents and other material delivered or transmitted to Contractor by State shall remain the property of State, and shall be returned by Contractor to State, at Contractor's expense, at termination or expiration of the Contract. All material related to the Contract and/or obtained or prepared by Contractor in connection with the performance of the services contracted for herein shall become the property of State, and shall be returned by Contractor to State, at Contractor's expense, at termination or expiration of the Contract.

#### Commissioner's Statements

Statements, acts and omissions made by or on behalf of the Commissioner of Administration regarding the RFP or RFP process, this Contract, any Contractor and/or any subcontractor of the Contractor shall not be deemed a conflict of interest when the Commissioner is discharging his/her duties and responsibilities under law, including, but not limited, to the Commissioner of Administration's authority in procurement matters.

#### Contractor's Cooperation

The Contractor has the duty to fully cooperate with the State and provide any and all requested information, documentation, etc. to the state when requested. This applies even if this Contract is terminated and/or a lawsuit is filed. Specifically, the Contractor shall not limit or impede the State's right to audit or shall not withhold State owned documents.

## Assignability

Contractor shall not assign any interest in this contract and shall not transfer any interest in same (whether by assignment or novation), without prior written consent of the State, provided however, that claims for money due or to become due to the Contractor from the State may be assigned to a bank, trust company or

other financial institution without such prior written consent. Notice of any such assignment or transfer shall be furnished promptly to the State.

#### Right to Audit and Record Retentiou

Any authorized agency of the State (e.g. Office of the Legislative Auditor, Inspector General's Office, etc.) and of the Federal Government has the right to inspect and review all books and records pertaining to services rendered under this contract for a period of five years from the date of final payment under the prime contract and any subcontract. The Contractor and subcontractor shall maintain such books and records for this five-year period and cooperate fully with the authorized auditing agency. 



Rao Uppu (PI) will devote 75% for two summer months (June and July; salary requested for this period only). The salary component of PI was calculated based on the base 9-month salary of \$85,473 and using the currently approved fringe benefits of 28.02%. The monthly salary of PI is \$9,497, and with the applicable fringe benefits of \$3,992, the total salary would amount to \$18,238. The PI supervised nine Ph.D. works and is currently the major advisor for five doctoral students. ### A. Personal Statement

After obtaining my PhD in biochemistry (1988), I undertook a postdoctoral assignment at the Eppley Institute, an NCI-designated chemical carcinogenesis laboratory at UNMC in Omaha, NE. Subsequently, at the Biodynamics Institute at Louisiana State University, LSU (world renowned for its research in oxidative and free radical reactions in biological systems), I worked on several NIH funded projects. These assignments enabled me to obtain extensive academic and research training in the fields of oxidative and free radical reactions of ozone and nitrogen oxides, mechanisms of enzymatic hydrogen transfer, biological nitration, and bioanalytical method development. Subsequently, in 2002, I joined the then newly established PhD Program in Environmental Toxicology (ENTX; currently the Department of Environmental Toxicology) at the Southern University-Baton Rouge (SUBR). At SUBR, I diversified my research interests to 'ozone-specific' oxysterols and their role in mammalian cell signaling. Additionally, I worked on the development of analytical methods for biological reactive intermediates (epoxides, α,β-unsaturated carbonyls, and alloxan) and semi-persistent organic pollutants (bisphenols), biomedical applications of core/shell nanoparticles of magnetite (especially SPIONs tagged to LHRH), molecular docking and dynamic studies of environmental estrogen binding to estrogen receptor proteins, and more recently, molecular epidemiology of SARS-COVs. All these efforts are consistent with the needs of ENTX program to train highly competent biomedical scientists who take pride in their career choice of environmental/ molecular toxicology. ### C. Contribution to Science

- i. Selective Tumoricidal Activities of SPIONs Tagged to LHRH Taking advantage of the possibility of generating heat locally, we have recently demonstrated a marked increase (4-5 fold) in the amount of heat released with Au-SPIONs and LHRH-SPIONs when compared to SPIONs on application of low frequency magnetic fields (44-430 Hz). In addition to this dramatic increase in hyperthermia, the gold shell provides biocompatibility and opportunities for targeted hyperthermia, the latter being achieved by covalently linking biomolecules such as LHRH to Au-SPIONs through the gold surface. When subjected to a low frequency magnetic field (44 Hz for 15 min), GT1-7 cells (non-cancerous but express receptors for LHRH), previously exposed to LHRH-SPIONs, responded differently from those of LNCaP cells (cancerous and express LHRH receptors; pre-exposed to LHRH-SPIONs) in terms of cell viability and proliferation, release of heat shock protein-70, decrease in mitochondrial transmembrane potential, activity of caspases and eventual cell death by apoptosis and/or necrosis, all of which indicate a step forward for promising applications of LHRH-SPIONs for therapeutic and/or imaging purposes.

Cell Signaling by 'Ozone-Specific' Oxysterols</u> –3β-Hydroxy-5-oxo-5,6-secocholestan-6-al (cholesterol seco aldehyde or ChSeco) is a newly discovered oxysterol, hitherto, known to be formed in ozone and/or singlet oxygen-mediated oxidations of cholesterol. Recent demonstration of ChSeco in the brain specimens of Uppu, Rao #316

Alzheimer's disease and in the arterial plaque indicate that ChSeco can be formed naturally in the body and, like other oxysterols, could be involved in various signaling cascades. It was found that ChSeco is cytotoxic to several mammalian cell types of both immune and non-immune origin. The cell death in non-immune but not immune cells involved extensive formation of reactive oxygen species (ROS). In both cell types, ChSeco at low concentrations appeared to promote apoptosis as evidenced by DNA fragmentation, acridine orange/ethidium bromide dual staining, and actiovation of caspases 3, 3/7, 8, and 9. 4

Oxidative and Free Radical Reactions of Ozone</u> As postdoctoral researcher at the Biodynamics Institute at LSU, for about three years I was involved in developing models for ozone oxidations at the air-lung interface. As part of this, I studied oxidation of lipids, proteins and antioxidants in model systems of different architectural organizations: reverse micelles, unilamellar liposomes, and red blood cell membranes. It was our contention that none of these models is, in itself, perfect; however, the knowledge accumulated from this study of these models systems provide a comprehensive and systematic view of the reactions of ozone with biotargets in vivo. #### A. Personal Statement

Professor and Chair, Environmental Toxicology Department, Southern University and A&M College, Baton Rouge, LA (2018-Contd): I have a longstanding interest in immunology specifically in innate immunity, immunotoxicology and cancer biology using human and murine cell systems, de-identified samples and murine models. My focus is to delineate the molecular mechanisms associated with innate immunity in response to pulmonary bacterial infections, cigarette smoke/E-Cigs aerosol exposure or Pentachlorophenol challenge. Formation of protein-protein complexes, subcellular localization and post-translational modification of proteins and transcription factors have always intrigued me to probe more and my expertise in pulmonary innate immunity and inflammation have uniquely poised me to make headway in this direction. My research group is interested in determining the changes in macrophage polarization and functional dynamics response to e-cigarette vapor exposure. We also focus on immunoproteasomes and autophagy mechanisms which play a critical role in maintaining protein homeostasis in stress/infection models. Currently, we are using bioinformatics, computational modeling, and machine learning (Al) tools to identify the possible molecular targets for focusing in vitro approaches. As an intervention strategy, we focus on targeting histone deacetylases, epigenetic changes, and lipid rafts assembly which play important role in our study models. One of the approaches we use to mitigate stress-induced inflammation is to regulate the assembly of lipid rafts by enriching them with poly-unsaturated fatty acids. We have successfully used this technique earlier and published our findings using cigarette smoke extract-challenged cells. These approaches have the potential to be translated to a broad spectrum of diseases caused or complicated by bacterial infections, environmental toxins, cancer microenvironment or nutritional habits. Regarding my mentoring ability, I have trained several undergraduate, graduate (MS), Ph.D., and postdoctoral researchers; medical residents; medical technicians; and junior faculty. The focus is to build a much-required scientific curiosity among minority students and develop the technical knowledge and skills necessary to navigate them toward successful scientific careers.

Biochemist/Incharge Biochemistry Department, Kalawati Saran Children's Hospital (KSCH), New Delhi (1993-2006): In 1993, I was appointed as a Biochemist/Incharge of Biochemistry Department of prestigious Children's Hospital in New Delhi, India. - 2. Visiting Scientist at The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio: In cancer, the homeostatic balance between cell proliferation and cell death is disturbed and unwanted cells accumulate due in part to inefficient apoptosis. The failure to eliminate cancer cells is due to the inability to activate the apoptotic machinery. Apoptosis, or programmed cell death, is an important biological activity for normal development and as defense mechanisms against pathogens. Improper regulation of apoptosis leads to diseases such as Alzheimer's disease, atherosclerosis, and cancer. Despite the clinical significance of apoptosis, the signaling pathways that regulate it are not completely understood. Monocytes are white blood cells required for innate immunity. Normally, monocytes undergo spontaneous apoptosis within 24-48 hrs. In leukemia, cancer affecting white blood cells, uncontrolled proliferation and inhibition of monocyte apoptosis leads to an excess of unwanted malignant cells. Upon, stimulation monocytes undergo differentiation into macrophages and can survive for 2-3 months. Macrophage stimulation involves the production and release of inflammatory cytokines. Inflammatory and differentiation stimuli induce prolonged monocyte survival by blocking the activation of the apoptotic program. However, the mechanisms that control monocyte survival and apoptosis during inflammation remain elusive. In this regard my work at The Ohio State University focused on the role of heat shock protein 27 (Hsp27) in regulating caspase-3 activity. I also conducted studies to determine the role of plant based compound Apigenin which belongs to Flavonoids family. Flavonoids are ubiquitous phenolic compounds broadly distributed in fruits and vegetables and are recognized as potential anti-inflammatory, anti-oxidant, antiviral, anti-microbial, and anti-allergic, providing important nutraceutical components to our diet. This study was important as it showed that Apigenin can protect the mice from lipopolysaccharide induced lethality.

#### Institutional Commitment

Southern University at Baton Rouge is one of the nation's largest predominantly Black (80%) Land Grant institutions of higher learning. It has an average annual enrollment of slightly less than 8,000 students. As an HBCU, SUBR has long been known for the quality of its undergraduate education programs. To help in addressing the shortage of African Americans receiving Ph.D. degrees in science, the university has committed to moving from a Mater's Colleges and Universities I classification to a Doctoral/Research University-Intensive classification. Thus, a broader impact of the research in the Environmental Toxicology Ph.D. Program is to make a significant contribution to SUBR's mission of becoming a nationally competitive Doctoral/Research University-Intensive institution. At the same time the program is helping to address the under representation of African American and minorities in sciences.

Currently, there are 6 doctoral programs at SUBR, including the Ph.D. program in Environmental Toxicology (ENTX). Initially, in early 2000s, about 80% of the participating faculty members are home-based in the Departments of Chemistry and Biological Sciences. In 2016, recognizing the significant contributions made, the university accorded the status of a full-pledged department, the Department of Environmental Toxicology. Currently, with ever-increasing support from the university, more than 75% of the participating faculty are home based in the Department of Environmental Toxicology and offering research mentoring in four different areas, namely, Chemical Toxicology, Immunotoxicology, Nutritional Toxicology, and Reproductive Toxicology. As of fall 2022, there were 32 PhD graduates in environmental toxicology. In January 2022, the university received the long-awaited Carnegie R2 status (one of ten HBCUs in the US to receive this status). Understandably, the ENTX PhD program played a significant role in the university's effort to acquire the R2 status.

#### Resources at SUBR

Equipment at PI Laboratory: Dr. Uppu's laboratory at SUBR is housed in rooms 145, 146, 154 and 155 of the Health Research Center (HRC). Rooms 145 and 146 are adjacent to one another. Rooms 154 and 155 are located on the opposite and connected by a doorway. The laboratory is equipped with a fume hoods, explosion-proof refrigerators (three), regular refrigerator with freezer compartment (two), a -80  $\Box$ C freezer, storage cabinets for flammable solvents (two), acids (two), and poisonous chemicals (one). The laboratory has all necessary small equipment (balances, pH meters, metabolic shakers, microcentrifuges, and CO2 incubators) and specialty equipment for conducting cell culture (Laminar flow), chromatography (GC, HPLC, TLC, flash, and ion-exchange), protein and nucleic acid electrophoresis and blotting, and protein urification. The laboratory is equipped with high-speed internet connections (through campus LAN) that facilitate access to various databases.

Computer: Dr. Uppu is provided several IBM compatible desktop PCs with Windows Pro (16 GB RAM and 500 GB SSB), word processing and data analysis software (GraphPad Priosm, MetaMorph, and SigmaPlot).

Equipment at HRC: Dr. Uppu has access to the core facilities of HRC, consisting of an autoclave room, ice-making machine, cell culture laboratory, and several analytical instruments. Pertinent to the project work, the major items of equipment are mass spectrometers (HP 6890 GC/MS), NMR spectrometers (Bruker 400 MHz), UV/Vis spectrophotometers (PE Lambda 3840 and Lambda 4B), infrared spectrophotometers (Beckman Microlab 600MX, Perkin-Elmer 1430, and

modern Nicolet FTIR), and Nikon E400 fluorescence microscope with digital camera, Zeiss 100 inverted fluorescence microscope with video camera, Olympus inverted microscope, and Alphainnotech Fluorichem 8000 fluorescence imager.

#### Resources at LSU

The faculty members in the Department of Environmental Toxicology have a constant exchange of scientific information with scientists at LSU in the corresponding departments and the School Veterinary Medicine and the Pennington Biomedical Research Center (which are ca. 10 miles away from SUBR). This is done through sponsoring co-operative projects and seminars of mutual interest and through adjunct appointments. For instance, Dr. Uppu is an adjunct professor in the Department of Pathobiological Sciences at LSU School of Veterinary Medicine. These interactions allow any unforeseen technical problems to be easily tackled and solved. The core facilities at LSU, LSU SVM, and PBRC will be availed as needed from time to time to advance the research work in the current proposal.

### Oxidized Cholesterol in Amyloid Aggregation and Neuronal Cell Apoptosis

#### ABSTRACT AND SPECIFIC AIMS

This study aims at understanding the role of aldehydic and non-adehydic cholesterol oxidation products (COPs) in the formation and consequences of amyloid-β (Aβ) aggregation in neuronal cells. Previous studies from our laboratory have demonstrated that 3β-hydroxy-5-oxo-5,6-secocholestan-6-al (ChSeco; a representative, aldehydic COP formed in ozone and/or singlet oxygen-mediated oxidation of cholesterol) induces AB aggregation and apoptosis with an increase in oxidative stress status (OSS) in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons. Studies from other laboratories have demonstrated the presence of ChSeco in the human brain samples of Alzheimer's disease (AD) and Lewy body dementia, meaning that COPs may have a role in the etiology of neuronal disease. Based on our preliminary results, and the fact that OSS has been suggested to be the primary mechanism by which Aβ aggregates induce cytotoxicity, we hypothesize that COPs induce Aß aggregation in situ which, in turn, mediates the cytotoxicity via increased production of cellular oxidants and lipid peroxidation. In this study, we focus on studying Aβ aggregation, OSS, and cytotoxicity in murine GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons and SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cells (collectively referred to as neuronal cells in this poroposal) by four COPs [ChSeco, 9-oxononanoylcholesterol (9-ONC), 5-oxovaleroylcholesterol (5-OVC), and 5β,6β-epoxycholesterol (ChEpo)]. The two neuronal cells, which represent mouse and human cell types, have been extensively used in studies of the pathogenesis of AD mediated through AB aggregates. The three specific aims (SAs) we wish to study to understand the complex interaction of OSS, Aß aggregation, and cytotoxicity are:

Specific Aim #1: Determine if A $\beta$  aggregation in neuronal cells occurs in response to exposure to both aldehydic and non-aldehydic cholesterol oxidation products (COPs). Previous studies from our laboratory have shown that ChSeco induces A $\beta$  aggregation in neuronal cells derived from mouse. We will extend the study to a neuronal cell line of human origin and examine if similar effects can be produced with two other aldehydic COPs (9-ONC and 5-OVC), and one non-aldehydic COP (ChEpo).

<u>Specific Aim # 2:</u> Determine if oxidative stress mediates the cytotoxicity in neuronal cells exposed to aldehydic and non-aldehydic COPs. We will investigate whether Trolox and NAC reverse cytotoxicity.

Specific Aim # 3: Determine if prevention of A $\beta$  aggregation alters cytotoxicity of aldehydic and non-aldehydic COPs. We will test  $\beta$ -sheet breakers, low molecular weight chaperones, HMG CoA reductase inhibitors, non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDS), and amines (semicarbazide, pyridoxamine, and polyamines) for their effect on reversal of A $\beta$  aggregation and associated cytotoxicity.

The results from specific aims 1 and 2 are anticipated to advance our understanding  $A\beta$  aggregation and downstream signaling in COP-exposed neuronal cells. The information on modulation of  $A\beta$  aggregation by pharmaceutical agents (specific aim 3) is expected to promote further research leading to improved therapeutic intervention and appropriate medical management in diseases associated with protein misfolding.

#### **BACKGROUND AND SIGNIFICANCE**


Neurodegenerative disorders such as AD and Parkinson's diseases are of highest concern to the American public. There are at present 4 million Americans with AD, and half of nursing home beds are occupied by those affected with this disease. In all neurodegenerative disorders, there seems to be alterations in cholesterol homeostasis (1). The central nervous system (CNS) has the highest concentration of cholesterol in the body and most of the cholesterol is synthesized endogenously. Partially oxidized products of cholesterol, often referred to as oxysterols, typically have a hydroxyl (or a keto) group on the cyclopentanoperhydrophenanthrene ring system (e.g., 7-hydroxycholesterol and 7-ketocholesterol), are thought to play a role in the pathogenesis of AD and other neurodegenerative disorders (2, 3). Apart from dietary sources, oxysterols can be formed (or bio-accumulated) because of peroxidation and/or normal enzymatic degradation of cholesterol and its 3-acyl esters (4). Oxysterols have been extensively studied for their role in atherosclerosis (5), but much less is known about their potential effects in the CNS. The available literature, although scanty, indicates that oxysterols can be cytotoxic to neurons, astrocytes, and microglia and neuroblastoma cells (2, 6), the major cell types present in the CNS. Recently, a new class of oxysterols has been shown to be present in vivo in human brain samples of Alzheimer's patients (7) and Lewy body dementia (6). These were postulated to be formed because of endogenous ozone and/or singlet oxygen production (6, 8-10). One of the products of this class, ChSeco (Fig. 1) has been shown to promote Aβ aggregation (7, 8) and α-synuclein fibrilization (6) through protein misfolding in cell-free systems. Studies from our laboratory have shown for the first time that such a phenomenon can also occur in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons when exposed to ChSeco (11). This observation prompted us to investigate the cause and consequences of ChSeco-induced Aβ aggregation in neuronal cells. The consequences we observe are increased oxidative stress and enhanced neuronal loss, both of which are characteristic of AD. The present proposal aims at investigating the molecular basis of Aß aggregation and its pathological consequences, and possible interrogation using pharmaceutical agents. The study encompasses two other similar aldehydic COPs, namely, 9-oxononanoylcholesterol (9-ONC) and 5-oxovaleroylcholesterol (5-OVC), and one non-aldehydic COP, 5β,6β-epoxycholesterol (ChEpo) that are known to be formed at inflammatory sites due to oxidation of cholesterol and its 3-acyl esters, cholesteryl linoleate and cholesteryl arachidonate (4, 12). It is anticipated that these studies will help develop strategies for understanding as well as management of diseases associated with Aß aggregation.

#### RESERCH PLAN AND TIMELINE


#### **PRELIMINARY DATA**

<u>ChSeco induces Aβ aggregation and subsequent neuronal loss in cultured GT1-7 hypothalmic neurons:</u> The results presented in Figs. 2 and 3 demonstrate that ChSeco at low micromolar ( $\mu$ M) concentrations induces Aβ aggregation in intact GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons and their lysates. Within 24 h of incubation with ChSeco, the cells became round, lost adhesion to the bottom of the dish, and the neurite outgrowth was markedly diminished. There was an increased cytotoxicity associated with elevated levels of Aβ aggregates in neuronal cells. The cell death in these treatments retained several key features of apoptosis that include changes in nuclear morphology, DNA fragmentation, and PS externalization.



**Figure 3.** Formation of intracellular Aβ aggregates in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons:(a), none; (b), 1 μM; (c), 5 μM; (d), 10 μM; and (e), 20 μM of ChSeco. Treatment of neuronal cells with Aβ fibrillogenesis inhibitors (f) completely abolished the ChSeco (10 μM)-induced Aβ aggregation. The cells in the upper panel were immunostained for Aβ and visualized with Alexa 488. The nuclei were counterstained with DAPI. The lower panel represents the corresponding phase contrast photomicrographs.

Intracellular oxidative stress plays an important role in both Aβ aggregation and cytotoxicity. GT1-7 hypothalmic neurons exposed to ChSeco had higher levels of ROS production based on DCF fluorescence (Fig. 4A). The intracellular levels of GSH were also markedly lowered. Pretreatment of GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons with Trolox significantly reduced cell death, while NAC supplementation totally abolished the ChSeco-induced cytotoxicity (Fig. 4B).



**Figure 4**. (**A**) Representative tracings of ROS generation in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons treated with ChSeco in the presence and absence of NAC. Treatment with 5 mM NAC totally abolished (or scavenged) ROS produced in neuronal cells exposed to 20  $\mu$ M ChSeco. ROS generation by untreated cells (control; basal fluorescence) was subtracted at all time points. (**B**) Antioxidants protect against ChSeco-induced cytotoxicity in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons. Neuronal cells were treated with different concentrations of ChSeco for 24 h in the presence of antioxidants, NAC (5 mM) and Trolox (0.5 mM). ChSeco exposure in the presence of antioxidants significantly improved viability of neurons based on MTS reduction assay. Data represent the mean  $\pm$  SEM of 3 independent experiments. \* Indicates p < 0.05 vs. respective treated controls.

#### **EXPERIMENTAL DESIGN**

Specific Aim # 1: Determine if Aβ aggregation in neuronal cells occurs in response to exposure to both aldehydic and non-aldehydic cholesterol oxidation products. Rationale: Preliminary studies from our laboratory have shown that ChSeco induces Aβ aggregation in GT1-7 neurons (Fig. 3), a cell line derived from mouse (11). We will extend the study to a neuronal cell line of human origin, SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cells. Also, we will examine if Aβ aggregation is facilitated in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons and SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cells in response to exposure to other aldehydic (9-ONC and 5-OVC) and non-aldehydic COPs (ChEpo). Alzheimer's disease is always preceded by inflammation, and, therefore, the formation of ChSeco at inflammatory sites may be of relevance to the pathogenesis of AD. The reason for inclusion of 9-ONC and 9-OVC is that they are formed at inflammatory sites as a result of peroxidation of cholesteryl linoleate and cholesteryl arachidonate, respectively (12). The three aldehydic COPs (ChSeco, 5-ONC and 9-OVC) are thought to form Schiff's bases with ε-amino groups of lysine residues present in Aβ and thereby promote amyloidogenesis. We include ChEpo in the present study for this COP could be formed in ozone-mediated oxidations presumably due to the secondary reactions of carbonyl oxide intermediates with cholesterol<sup>13</sup> or by other autoxidation reactions (4).

(a). Experimental Approach and Procedures: GT1-7 Hypothalamic neurons and SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cells (ATCC), at sub-confluence (ca. 70%), will be exposed to varying low concentrations of ChSeco, 5-OVC, 9-ONC, and ChEpo. A $\beta$  aggregation will be studied first using neuronal cell lysates based on thioflavin T fluorescence and then confirmed by immunofluoresence in permeabilized cells (see Figs. 2 and 3). To quantify A $\beta$ , we will use a sandwich ELISA, western blot analysis, or a combination of both (11). Because A $\beta$  formation in vivo is a slow and chronic process, in certain neuronal cultures, we will employ very low concentrations of COPs (1-50 nM) and study A $\beta$  aggregation for extended periods of time, typically for 7-10 d.

The procedures for synthesis of ChSeco, sandwich ELISA and western blot analysis of A $\beta$  and its aggregates, and immunofluoresence of neuronal A $\beta$  have all been well established in our laboratory (11, 14). ChEpo will be purchased from Sigma. The following illustrates the synthesis of 9-ONC and 5-OVC.

Synthesis of 9-ONC and 5-OVC — 9-ONC will be synthesized by ozonation of oleic acid in methanol followed by reduction with dimethyl sulfide to yield 9,9-dimethoxynonanoic acid (15). 9,9-Dimethoxynonanoic acid is then condensed with cholesterol using N,N'-dicyclohexyl-carbodiimide in dichloromethane. The product 9,9-dimethoxynonanoyl cholesterol will be hydrolyzed to 9-ONC by passing through an acidic ion exchange resin. For synthesis of 5-OVC, we will use a synthetic strategy that is like the one described for 9-ONC. We will perform ozonolysis of 2-hexenoic acid (Aldrich) in methanol followed by reduction with dimethyl sulfide to yield 5,5-dimethoxyvaleric acid.

(b). Expected Results, Alternative Explanations, and Potential problems: We anticipate that all three aldehydic COPs will induce  $A\beta$  aggregation in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons and SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cells in a time- and dose-dependent manner. ChEpo could also induce  $A\beta$  aggregation by a mechanism that involves either direct alkylation or through oxidative stress and subsequent post-translational modification. The alkylation of  $A\beta$  by ChEpo resulting in insoluble aggregates can be tested by thioflavin T fluorescence assay. We do not anticipate any methodological problems with the SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cell line, as they are commonly used for studies of  $A\beta$  toxicity. The available literature suggests that these cells can be induced to generate  $A\beta$  fibrils (16, 17).

Specific Aim # 2: Determine if oxidative stress mediates the cytotoxicity in neuronal cells exposed to aldehydic and non-aldehydic COPs. Rationale: Several mechanisms have been proposed for the neurotoxicity of Aβ aggregates (18, 19) including membrane depolarization (20), increased sensitivity to excitotoxins (21), and alterations in calcium homeostasis (22). However, the leading hypothesis is that neuronal damage by Aβ is mediated by free radicals and, as such, can be attenuated by supplementation with antioxidants such as vitamin E (23, 24). This forms the rationale for us to study ROS in the establishment of cytotoxicity of COPs in neuronal cells. In fact, preliminary studies from our laboratory indicate that ChSeco and ChEpo induce cell death as well as oxidative stress in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons (see Fig. 4 and ref. 11). The cell death induced by ChSeco was characteristic of apoptosis. ChSeco was found to be more cytotoxic than ChEpo. It was intriguing to note that the two ozone-specific oxysterols, when studied at their respective IC₅₀ values, induce similar levels of ROS, but the neuronal cells respond differently to further treatments with agents that modulate cellular cholesterol levels (14). We will extend the study to SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cells of human origin and examine if similar effects can be produced by 5-OVC and 9-ONC. On establishing the coexistence of cytotoxicity and oxidative stress in the two cell lines, we will examine whether antioxidants inhibit Aß aggregation and associated cytotoxicity.

(a). Experimental Approach and Procedures: We use a battery of tests to analyze oxidative stress in GT1-7 hypothalamic neurons and SH-SY5Y neuroblastoma cells exposed to COPs. First, we will study the time- and dose-dependent generation of ROS using the technique of DCF fluorescence (see Preliminary Data). We will then determine total antioxidant capacity (TAC), lipid hydroperoxides (L-OOH), and cellular GSH and GSSG to corroborate with induction of oxidative stress and cytotoxicity. The cytotoxicity will be studied using the MTS reduction assay followed by detailed characterization using techniques like nuclear morphology, DNA fragmentation, PS externalization, and mitochondrial function (loss of transmembrane potential and release of cytochrome c). The effects of antioxidants will be studied by simultaneous as well as pre- or post-incubation with COPs. In assays of pre-incubation type, we will incubate neuronal cells with antioxidants for 12-24 h, followed by removal of the antioxidants and exposure of cells to COPs for 24-48 h. In assays of post-incubation type, we will expose neuronal cells to COPs for 12-48 h, remove the COPs, and then expose the treated cells to antioxidants for 12-48 h. The experimental protocols for assessing cytotoxicity based on MTS reduction, PS externalization based on annexin-V/propidium iodide staining, DNA fragmentation by sandwich ELISA, and ROS based on DCF fluorescence have been described in our previous publications (11, 14) and the section on Preliminary Studies. The other experimental procedures we wish to employ to accomplish specific aim 2 are given below.

Total Antioxidant Capacity—TAC will be measured according to the method of Rice-Evans and Miller in control cells as well as in cells exposed to COPs (25). Following exposure to COP for 1 h at 37 °C, neuronal cells will be suspended in an isotonic medium containing 1% (w/v) IGEPAL CA-630 (to promote cell lysis), metmyoglobin, ABTS, and  $H_2O_2$ . The samples will be incubated at 37 °C for 5 min. The antioxidant activity of control cells and cells previously exposed to COP will be measured based on the formation of ABTS radical cation at 734 nm. Blank runs will be carried out by omitting cells.

Lipid Hydroperoxides-LOOH will be measured in control cells, as well as cells exposed to COPs, according to the method of Gay and Gebicki (26). Briefly, LOOH (0-10  $\mu$ M) will be allowed to react with 100 to 1,000-fold excess Fe(II) in perchloric acid at pH ca. 1. Complex formation of Fe(III) with xylenol orange will then be measured photometrically at 560 nm.

(b). Expected Results, Alternative Interpretations, and Potential Problems: We anticipate that all COPs will cause cytotoxicity and an increased generation of ROS. Our preliminary studies show that ChSeco and ChEpo induce dose- and time-dependent increases in ROS production and cytotoxicity based on MTS reduction assay. Almost all the experimental protocols including LOOH and TAC have been well standardized and routinely used in our laboratory. We do not anticipate any potential problems.

Specific Aim # 3: Determine if prevention of A $\beta$  aggregation alters cytotoxicity of aldehydic and non-aldehydic COPs. Rationale: In vitro studies suggest that A $\beta$  aggregation is important event for neurotoxicity to occur (27). Accordingly, a valid therapeutic strategy would be to administer compounds that can block fibril or proto-filament formation. One such promising family of compounds is  $\beta$ -sheet breakers. We will use A $\beta$ 40 and A $\beta$ 42 fibrillogenesis inhibitors (Calbiochem) in our studies for their potential to inhibit A $\beta$  aggregation and associated cytotoxicity. In addition to the above, we will test a battery of pharmacological agents for their ability to inhibit, or interfere with, A $\beta$  aggregation and cytotoxicity (see below). The rationale for inclusion of small molecular weight chaperones is that they can accumulate in cells and prevent misfolding of proteins and other macromolecular structures (28). These will give an insight into the mechanism of COP-induced cytotoxicity, and this, in turn, will help in developing therapeutic strategies for neurodegenerative diseases associated with cholesterol metabolism.

The pharmacological agents we propose to examine include small molecular chaperones (ecotine), HMG CoA reductase inhibitors (statins), NSAIDs (indomethacin), protein synthesis inhibitors (cycloheximide), intracellular second messengers (dibutryl cyclic AMP), calcium chelators (BAPTA-AM), inhibitors of RNA synthesis (actinomycin D), endonuclease inhibitors (aurintricarboxylic acid), cyclodextrins (methyl-β-cyclodextrin), and other conventional or unconventional pharmacological agents such as taurine and semicarbazide that potentially can reverse or interfere with Schiff's base formation of COPs with peptides and proteins.

- (a). Experimental Approach and Procedures: We will use both mouse and human neuronal cells to screen various pharmacological agents. We will study ChSeco, 5-OVC, 9-ONC, and ChEpo for their cytotoxicity and induction of A $\beta$  aggregation. The cytotoxicity will be assayed based on MTS reduction assay, A $\beta$  aggregation based on thioflavin T fluorescence, immunofluoresence, and sandwich ELISA. These methods are detailed in specific aim 1. The pharmacological agents mentioned above will be tested for their ability to inhibit cell death and A $\beta$  aggregation. First, we will examine if these agents inhibit COP-induced cell death. We will use concentrations in the range 0.1-1,000  $\mu$ M or an appropriate concentration at which these agents per se do not cause toxicity to the neuronal cells. For the agents that show promise in inhibiting cell death, we will study, whether they can interfere with A $\beta$  aggregation.
- (b). Expected Results, Alternative Explanations, and Potential difficulties:  $\beta$ -Sheet breakers have been shown to inhibit A $\beta$  aggregation and cytotoxicity in IMR-32 neuroblastoma cells (29). We expect that these agents will inhibit A $\beta$  aggregation in both human and mouse neuronal cells. Regarding cytotoxicity, there can be three different scenarios. First, there may be a complete reversal of cytotoxicity, meaning that A $\beta$  aggregation is obligatory in the mediation of cytotoxicity of COPs. Second, there may a partial reversal of cytotoxicity, which could mean that mechanisms other than A $\beta$  aggregation are also involved. The third possibility is that there may not be any reversal of cytotoxicity, indicating that A $\beta$  aggregation plays no role in COPs-mediated cytotoxicity. Similar scenarios are expected with other pharmacological agents mentioned above. If inhibition of A $\beta$  aggregation brings about complete reversal of cytotoxicity,

then the present system can be used as an experimental tool for screening various agents for their therapeutic use. There is rationale for inclusion of various pharmacological agents and most of them have already been tested or contemplated to have therapeutic value. We do not expect any methodological problems except in certain specific situations such as polyamines which need a transporter system for delivery into the cells. Currently, we are not sure if this transport system is present in neuronal cells of interest.

The results of the proposed work are expected to provide information on the cause-and-effect relationship between COPs,  $A\beta$  aggregation, and ROS. The information on modulation of  $A\beta$  aggregation by pharmaceutical agents is expected to promote further research leading to improved therapeutic intervention and appropriate medical management in diseases associated with protein misfolding.

Successful completion of the work is expected to help in publishing two or three manuscripts and several abstracts and pave way to submission of an R15 or R21 grant application to NIH

### PROJECT SUMMARY (See instructions):

Approximately 30% of the population World over are affected by non-alcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD), and it is soon projected to become a leading cause of chronic liver disease. Fat accumulation in liver or steatosis progresses to non-alcoholic steatohepatitis (NASH), a forerunner of cirrhosis, and could culminate in hepatocellular carcinoma. NASH associated cirrhosis is suspected to become the leading cause of liver transplantation by 2030. An annual direct medical cost exceeding \$100 billion in the US alone is projected for the management of complications and comorbidities of NAFLD. High circulating levels of Cholesterol (Cho) and Homocysteine (Hcy), formed from Methionine (Met) are documented risk factors for inflammatory conditions like NAFLD and atherosclerosis. Since both Cho and Met are rich in animal products like dairy, poultry and meat (extensively consumed in the US), and there is a paucity of information on the combined effects Cho and Met, especially in the hepatic context, studies were conducted in adult male Sprague Dawley rats. Hepatic inflammatory and oxidative stress responses were seen only in rats fed high Cho diet but not in rats fed high Met with results like Control (Con) rats. Instead of an additive effect of hepatic inflammation and oxidative stress in rats fed Cho+Met diet, there was abrogation of the initiation and progression of the pathology. Given that NAFLD represents the hepatic component of metabolic syndrome, we chose to investigate the role of sitagliptin, a dipeptidyl peptidase-4 (DPP-4) inhibitor (antidiabetic drug with antiinflammatory and other health benefits that are independent of glucose lowering) to counter the inflammation especially since they have been used for the treatment of NAFLD. Sitagliptin, instead of lowering hepatic inflammation, accentuated it multiple fold in rats fed high Cho. The addition of Met to Cho completely prevented even the exacerbated inflammation due to high Cho substantiating the beneficial effects of Met. DPP-4 inhibitors are in clinical practice for management of type 2 diabetes thus necessitating a better understanding of the diet drug interactions. Importantly, Met and Choline deficient diet have been used for inducing experimental NAFLD. Therefore, it is logical to explore if a dietary excess of Met would counter the disease process. The hypothesis that "Methionine counters the hepatic inflammation and oxidative stress due to hypercholesterolemia preventing the progression of NAFLD" will be addressed with the specific aim, To investigate the role of methionine in combating hepatic inflammation due to hypercholesterolemia and its exacerbations by sitagliptin. Using liver tissues from previous experiments high Cho, high Met and their combination with and without administration of sitagliptin, and rat liver (CRL 1439) cells, investigation of the mechanistic aspects of the beneficial effects will be carried out.

#### RELEVANCE (See instructions):

The proposed studies are transitional since sitagliptin mediated exacerbations of inflammation in high Cho fed rats and its alleviation by Met helps in understanding dietary and drug interactions involved in development of NAFLD.

#### Background:

Approximately 30% of the population World over are affected by NAFLD, and it is soon projected to become a leading cause of chronic liver disease (1, 2). Non-alcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD) is reported to be the most common chronic liver disease in developed countries, and is strongly associated with obesity, dyslipidemia, and diabetes (3, 4). Fat accumulation in liver or steatosis progresses to non-alcoholic steatohepatitis (NASH) to cirrhosis and could culminate in hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC). NASH cirrhosis or NASH associated cirrhosis is suspected to become the leading cause of liver transplantation by 2030 (5, 6). An annual direct medical cost exceeding \$100 billion in the US alone is projected for the management of complications and comorbidities of NAFLD, and thus a major burden on health care system (7). Despite extensive research on understanding the pathophysiology targeted therapies are still unavailable (8). The treatment modality for NAFLD is mainly directed towards mitigation of risk factors like weight gain (healthy eating habits) and co-morbidity management.

High dietary Cholesterol (Cho) and Homocysteine, formed from Methionine (Met) are known risk factors for inflammatory conditions like NAFLD and atherosclerosis. Excessive consumption of foods rich in both Cho and Met can contribute to the probability of developing, and progression of NAFL/NASH. Gupta and co-workers have reported the induction of cirrhosis in rabbits by feeding a high Cho diet (9). There are studies on the individual effects of Cho or Met/Hcy on heart and liver but the combined effects of feeding a dietary excess of Met and Cho, especially in the hepatic context are almost non-existent. Therefore, we conducted both short and long-term experiments that lasted for 35 days and 98 days respectively. Adult male SD rats were fed a) control diet, b) a diet enriched with 1.5% Met or c) 2.0% Cho or d) a combination of 1.5% Met and 2.0% Cho. We saw induction of genes of inflammation and oxidative stress only in rats fed high Cho with rats on Met showing no changes. The rationale for using the combination diet of Met+Cho was to investigate if there would be an additive effect of inflammation. Interestingly, Met when added to Cho, countered the hepatic inflammation. To alleviate inflammatory responses seen in high Cho fed rats, we tested sitagliptin, a dipeptidyl peptidase-4 (DPP-4) inhibitor and an antidiabetic drug with several beneficial effects. Instead of lowering, sitagliptin exacerbated hepatic inflammation in rats on high Cho. However, in the combination diet such exacerbations were not found mainly due to the presence of Met, corroborating the beneficial effects of Met even further. In line with our findings, there are studies demonstrating beneficial effects of Met that include protection from ischemia-reperfusion cardiac injury in the canine model (10), paracetamol hepatotoxicity (11, 12), formaldehyde inhalation toxicity (13), and nephroprotective effects against polymixin induced toxicity (14) to mention some. Additionally, administration of various Met metabolites in experimental animal models of liver disease have been shown to have hepato-protective properties (15). The improvement of endogenous antioxidant reserve by Met has been suggested to maintain and/or improve myocardial structure and function under a variety of conditions. It has been suggested that met could provide protection against oxidative stress-induced myocardial cell damage and heart failure (16). An anti-inflammatory effect of L-methionine was also observed through the inhibition of the release of proinflammatory cytokines in high fat fructose diet fed rats while ameliorating enhanced lipogenesis and lipid peroxidation. Multiple health benefits of L-Methionine including attenuation of high-fat fructose diet-induced NASH by modulating lipid metabolism, fibrosis, and inflammation in rats and prevention of pancreatic β cell damage and prevention of diabetes-induced epigenetic alterations have been reported (17-19).


Investigating the contribution of diet in the progression of NASH to cirrhosis and beyond is critically important. Moreover, dietary intervention and healthy choices have been documented to facilitate the reversal of NASH to steatosis and recovery. Also, since NAFLD has been documented to represent the hepatic component of metabolic syndrome, we chose to investigate the role of sitagliptin in addition to its being used for the treatment of NAFLD (20, 21). We will be using liver and heart tissues from our previous experiments for studies proposed currently. The SD rats we used were euglycemic and remained so for the entire duration of the experiment (both short and long-term; 35 and 98 days) with no differences in body composition (body weight or fat content), and therefore we believe that the tissues from these animals present an ideal opportunity to investigate the disease progression better, since the confounding effects of hyperglycemia or obesity could be ruled out.

Animal products like dairy, poultry and meat are rich in both Cho as well as Met and are extensively consumed in the US. Sitagliptin mediated exacerbations of inflammation and oxidative stress in high Cho fed rats and its alleviation by Met are interesting. A better understanding of dietary components and drug interactions involved in progression prevention of NAFLD is needed. The beneficial effects of Met observed in our studies merit mechanistic understandings for exploring future therapeutic options especially in light of public health relevance and are thus translational.

#### Research Plan

Dietary Cho and homocysteine formed from Met are well known risk factors for inflammatory conditions like atherosclerosis and non-alcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD), and excessive consumption of both Cho and Met can contribute to the possibility of development and progression of NAFL/NASH. Animal products like dairy, poultry and meat which are extensively consumed in the US are rich in both Cho as well as Met and are rarely eaten separately. Although studies on the individual effects Cho or Met/Hcy on heart and liver exist, the combined effects of feeding a dietary excess of Met and Cho, especially in the hepatic context are almost non-existent.

Several major public health concerns worldwide like Obesity, Diabetes, Heart disease and NAFLD, and their association with dietary anomalies are well known. NAFLD comprises of a broad spectrum of histological features ranging from fat accumulation in the liver or simple steatosis to NASH (a more aggressive necro-inflammatory form) including ballooning of hepatocytes and fibrosis that could progress to cirrhosis. Where both steatosis and NASH are reversible by dietary management, from cirrhotic liver the disease becomes irreversible. NAFLD is reported to be the most common chronic liver disease in developed countries and its progression to non-alcoholic steatohepatitis (NASH) and cirrhosis is considered to become the leading cause of liver transplantation by 2030 (26). In subjects with type 2 diabetes, NAFLD is reported to range between 50%–75% (22) and between 80%–90% in obese subjects (23). Accumulating evidence shows that patients with NAFLD are also at high risk of cardiovascular (CV) disease, signifying as main cause of death in these subjects (24).



It is well known that NAFLD encompasses simple steatosis or accumulation of fat, NASH, and cirrhosis which could progress to HCC (Figure 1). Consumption of high fat diet plays a major role in the initiation and progression of NAFLD from simple steatosis to NASH (Fig 1 & 2). Although further progression of NASH to cirrhosis can be reversed by dietary management, reversal after progression to cirrhosis becomes highly limiting.


We used adult male SD rats for all our studies which were euglycemic. It is well known that NAFLD is the hepatic outcome of metabolic syndrome which encompasses obesity, diabetes, dyslipidemia, and atherosclerosis (25). Using SD rats which were euglycemic we were able to explicitly demonstrate NASH in high Cho fed and also sitagliptin treated rats. We did not see significant differences in body weight or fat content or glycemic status in our rats, and therefore believe that the tissues from these animals present an opportunity to investigate the disease progression better since the confounding effects of hyperglycemia could be ruled out.

In rat cirrhotic livers a metabolic shift from oxidative phosphorylation to glycolysis has been demonstrated while normal rat hepatocytes continue to use oxidative phosphorylation to produce ATP. The cirrhotic livers have been shown to have high expression of key glycolytic enzymes such as hexokinase 2, aldolase A, and pyruvate kinase M2. Importantly, cirrhotic livers exhibit elevated expression of lactate dehydrogenase isoform; LDHB compared to healthy livers which is indicative of pyruvate being diverted away from the mitochondria for ATP production. Cirrhosis is an advanced stage of liver fibrosis accompanied by changes in hepatic vasculature leading to compromises of exchange between hepatic sinusoids and the hepatocytes. The endothelial cells that line the sinusoids are fenestrated and these lay on a sheet of permeable connective tissue. Typically, the plasma exchange of nutrients and precursors and products of metabolism with hepatocytes takes place in the space of Disse. The perisinusoidal space or the Space of Disse also contains some mononuclear cells and Stellate or Ito cells. These vitamin A storing cells when inflamed start releasing collagen. In cirrhosis the space of Disse is filled with scar tissue and endothelial fenestrations are lost; sinusoidal capillarization. This is characterized by vascularized fibrotic septa that link portal tracts with each other and with central veins, leading to hepatocyte islands. These are surrounded by fibrotic septa devoid of a central vein and all this culminates in impaired hepatocyte or liver function, an increased intrahepatic resistance or portal hypertension that may lead to the development of hepatocellular carcinoma.

## Program Director/Principal Investigator (Last, First, Middle): Murthy, Subramanyam

Understanding the mechanistic aspects of progression of NASH to cirrhosis and subsequently to HCC is highly critical. With cirrhotic liver secondary complications like portal hypertension affecting the heart, pulmonary hypertension and the heart affecting the liver and subsequently systemic organ involvement and related pathology are not uncommon. Studies on high Cho affecting the liver more than the heart substantiate the significance of dietary component in the disease process (26). Apart from Cho, the foods of animal origin contain high Met. Homocysteine, and intermediate in the metabolism of Met is a documented risk factor for several age-related pathologies like heart disease, stroke, NAFLD and osteoporosis to mention some (27). Despite extensive studies on the individual effects of these nutrients on heart and liver (among others), there are very limited studies on the combination of the two in the heart tissue. However, the studies in liver on the combined effects of feeding a dietary excess of Met and Cho are almost non-existent.


Due to the paucity of information on the combined effects of Cho and Met especially in the hepatic context, we conducted both short and long-term experiments that lasted for 35 days and 98 days respectively. Our objective was to understand acute and chronic hepatic effects of a dietary excess of Met, Cho and their combination. Adult male SD rats were fed a) control diet, b) a diet enriched with 1.5% Met or c) 2.0% Cho or d) a combination of 1.5% Met and 2.0% Cho. The rationale for using the combination diet of Met+Cho was because both are high in food sources from animal origin and therefore it would be interesting to investigate if there would be an additive effect of inflammation. We saw induction of genes of inflammation and oxidative stress only in rats fed high Cho with rats on Met showing no changes or were like that of Con diet fed rats. Interestingly, Met when added to Cho, instead of having an additive effect on inflammation, almost totally countered the hepatic inflammation and other pathological changes. Representative data on the hepatic inflammatory  $(Tnf\alpha)$  and oxidative stress (Nox2) responses seen only in high Cho fed rats and its countering by Met (Met+Cho group) with concomitant and supportive histopathology is shown in figure 2.



In the next set of experiments, to alleviate inflammatory responses seen in high Cho fed rats, we tested sitagliptin, a dipeptidyl peptidase-4 (DPP-4) inhibitor and an antidiabetic drug with several beneficial effects.

The rationale for using this oral glucose lowering drug was not only that it has been in clinical practice for substantial period of time, but independent of hypoglycemic effects, it also is known to exert anti-inflammatory, antioxidative properties in addition to reducing weight gain, delaying gastric emptying among others. In our experiments, an aqueous suspension of sitagliptin (100 mg/kg/d) was administered by oral gavage from day 11 till day 35 in short-term, and from day 31 to day 98 in long-term experiments.

Sitagliptin, instead of lowering exacerbated hepatic inflammation and oxidative stress and fibrosis in rats on high Cho; a totally serendipitous finding. Interestingly, in the combination diet due to the presence of Met, even the exacerbated markers of inflammation ( $Tnf\alpha$ ) and oxidative stress (Nox2) and fibrosis mediated by sitagliptin seen in high Cho were abrogated. Several other genes of inflammation and oxidative stress tested yielded similar results. These findings corroborated the beneficial effects of Met even further and this was also supported by histopathology as represented in figure 3. This phenomenon was observed consistently by analyzing multiple parameters [Published



Results from PI's lab (28-30).

Studies from our laboratory as well as others have shown the beneficial effects of Met eliciting antioxidative, anti-inflammatory and antifibrotic effects.

Typically, oxidative stress, inflammation, & fibrosis are the hallmarks in the pathology of NAFLD. Interestingly, our

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studies were specifically designed to investigate the role of Met in dietary excess of Cho. Understanding the diet drug interactions (though beyond the scope of this application) merits investigations since many diabetics who take this drug also have hypercholesterolemia in addition to other lipid abnormalities. Countering even the exacerbated inflammatory, fibrotic and oxidative stress responses in HCho rats by Met was indeed very remarkable. Therefore, investigations as to how Met counters the initiation and progression of the disease as observed in our studies warrant additional investigations and are proposed in the current application. These studies have public health relevance and thus have reasonable translational value.

In the current application, the hypothesis that "Methionine counters the hepatic inflammation and oxidative stress due to hypercholesterolemia preventing the progression of NAFLD" will be tested by addressing the specific aim, To investigate the role of methionine in combating hepatic inflammation due to hypercholesterolemia and its exacerbations by sitagliptin.

For the studies proposed in this application, liver tissues from our experiments with high Cho, high Met and their combination both with and without administration of sitagliptin will be used. We will analyze for the expression of hexokinase 2, aldolase A, and pyruvate kinase M2 and lactate dehydrogenase B at gene and protein levels since these are known to be important in cirrhosis. We anticipate obtaining useful and important information about progression of NAFLD in rats fed high Cho diets apart from the role played by DPP-4 inhibitors in this process in context of benefits due to High Met. These facets are likely to contribute to advancing our understanding about both diet and the drug and the information obtained will be useful.




Figure 4. The metabolism of methionine (Met) is depicted up to the formation of cysteine. After ATP mediated formation of SAM via transmethylation pathway (TMPW), S-adenosyl homocysteine (SAH) is formed after donating the methyl group to acceptor molecules. The SAH is deadenosylated to homocysteine (Hcy). This can either be remethylated to Met with methyl group from methyl tetrahydrofoate (THF) in remethylation pathway (RMPW); methyl group can also be accepted from betaine in liver, betaine homocysteine methyl transferase. Alternatively, Hey can be routed to transsulfuration pathway (TSPW) for the formation of cystathionine and thence cysteine. In addition to RMPW and TSPW, Hcy can also form the toxic intermediate Hcy thiolactone (HTL). Tetrahydrofolate, THF; α-ketobutyrate α-KB, methylene, CH2THF; methyl, CH3THF, S-adenosyl homocysteine hydrolase, SAHH.

The nutritional significance of labile methyl group balance to maintain normal liver function is well emphasized by many workers (15-19). Additionally, induction of experimental NASH

by feeding a Met-choline deficient diet has been well reported in literature (31-34) It is therefore logical to surmise if an excess of dietary Met would have a preventive effect on the initiation and progression of NASH or High Met countering the pathology of NAFLD. Based on our own findings of Met reducing inflammation, oxidative stress and fibrosis in rats on high Cho diet and abrogation of even the exacerbated response of these parameters due to sitagliptin, it is reasonable to investigate the beneficial effects of Met.

The metabolism of Met is depicted in figure 4. Methionine (Met) uptake and metabolism is involved in several cellular functions including methylation reactions, redox maintenance, polyamine synthesis and coupling to folate metabolism while coordinating nucleotide and redox status. Many intermediates of Met metabolism including cystathionine, cysteine, taurine and hydrogen sulfide by themselves have antioxidative properties or serve as precursors for this process (glutathione from cysteine). Met, by an ATP mediated reaction forms S-adenosyl methionine (SAM). This is the major methyl donor for multiple biological methylations like methylation of DNA, protein, catechol amine to name some, it plays a critical role in 1 carbon metabolism. Other significant biological intermediates of Met metabolism

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include succinyl-CoA, homocysteine, creatine, and carnitine. Recent research has demonstrated that methionine can regulate metabolic processes, the innate immune system, and digestive functioning in mammals. It also intervenes in lipid metabolism and activation of endogenous antioxidant enzymes such as methionine sulfoxide reductase A.

Methionine in a ATP mediated reaction is first metabolized to S-adenosylmethionine (SAM); transmethylation pathway (TMPW). After donating its methyl group to methyl group accepting molecules like DNA, RNA, proteins biogenic amies, it is converted to S-Adenosyl Homocysteine(SAH) which is deadenosylated to homocysteine (Hcy). This non-protein amino acid is the end product of the transmethylation cycle of Met metabolism. Since Met is a precursor for homocysteine (Hcy), diets rich in Met can increase circulating levels of Hcy resulting in hyperhomocysteinemia (HHcy). Additionally, mutations in the metabolism of Hcy and the deficiencies of vitamins like folate, B6 and B12 also can result in HHcy.

Typically, Hcy is either remethylated back to Met (folate, B6 and B12 mediated) in the remethylation pathway (RMPW) or can be metabolized in the transsulfuration pathway (TSPW). Several intermediates of the TSPW either by themselves or as precursors (for biological antioxidants) have documented anti-oxidative properties. These include cysteine, cystathionine, taurine and hydrogen sulfide. Apart from the antioxidative and anti-inflammatory properties of the intermediates of the TSPW, SAM also has been documented to prevent alcohol-induced liver injury in rats by reducing liver lipid peroxidation and inflammation (Gong et al. 2008). Although metabolism of Met is typically through transmethylation, remethylation and transsulfuration pathways, it can also be metabolized via the salvage pathway; Met salvage pathway, especially for the formation of polyamines spermine and spermidine.

We have previously reported that methionine (Met) significantly alleviated the hepatic inflammation and oxidative stress in rats fed a high Cho diet. Additionally, Met was able to counter the increases in hepatic inflammation (during hypercholesterolemia) that were aggravated by the administration of an anti-diabetic drug; sitagliptin. In line with our findings, there are studies demonstrating beneficial effects of Met that include protection from ischemia-reperfusion cardiac injury in the canine model (10), paracetamol hepatotoxicity (11, 12), formaldehyde inhalation toxicity (13), and nephroprotective effects against polymixin induced toxicity (14) to mention some. Additionally, administration of various Met metabolites in experimental animal models of liver disease have been shown to have hepato-protective properties (15). The improvement of endogenous antioxidant reserve by Met has been suggested to maintain and/or improve myocardial structure and function under a variety of conditions (16). It has been suggested that methionine could provide protection against oxidative stress-induced myocardial cell damage and heart failure. Although the current proposal deals with the beneficial effects of Met, there are innumerable number of studies which show the involvement of Hcy in several age-related pathologies like stroke, atherosclerosis, Osteoporosis, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases to mention some.

Hypercholesterolemia is not uncommon in diabetics who use gliptins for the management of their blood glucose. The proposed studies have a strong translational potential since there exists a possibility of gaining more understanding about the drug and dietary interactions in the development and progression of NAFLD.

# Research Plans and Timeline

Our studies with Cho and Met comprised both short and long-term experiments that lasted for 35 days and 98 days respectively. The intervention with sitagliptin was initiated from day 10 and lasted till the end of day 35 in short-term and from day 31 through day 98 in long-term experiments. In all experiments, an aqueous suspension of sitagliptin (100 mg/kg/d) was administered by oral gavage. Additionally, since sitagliptin exacerbated the inflammatory responses only in rats fed high Cho, the effect of other DPP-4 inhibitors was investigated if the accentuation of inflammatory responses were specific to sitagliptin or it was a class effect.

The development of HCC has been closely linked to an inflammatory liver condition in which the normal liver tissue is replaced by scar tissue and regenerative nodules induced by various etiologies including viral infection, chronic alcohol consumption or NAFLD (36-38). At the cellular level, the rate of cirrhosis is tightly coupled with several rounds of hepatocyte death, inflammatory responses, and compensatory hepatocyte proliferation. These processes result in the formation of the regenerative nodules surrounded by fibrous bands characteristic of cirrhosis. Studies have shown that the regenerative nodules consist of a mixed population of proliferative progenitor cells, newly generated hepatocytes and apoptosis-resistant (damaged) hepatocytes that, overtime, are likely to develop into dysplastic nodules, leading to the development of HCC (37,39).

Cirrhosis is an advanced stage of hepatic inflammation which can lead to liver cancer. Studies have shown that up to 90% of all cases of hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC) develop in patients with cirrhosis, suggesting a role for cirrhosis in the process of hepatocarcinogenesis (40-42). In rat cirrhotic livers a metabolic shift from oxidative phosphorylation to glycolysis has been demonstrated while normal rat hepatocytes continue to use oxidative phosphorylation to produce ATP. The expression of these genes and proteins may represent potential markers of cirrhosis and therefore are proposed to see the effect of Met in alleviating their expression and if it is reflected in the expression of concomitant proteins. Since we were able to explicitly demonstrate NASH in high Cho fed and also exacerbations in sitagliptin administered rats, we have an opportunity to investigate the disease progression during intake of high Cho which is most relevant in the context of consumption of Cho rich foods. Cirrhosis is recognized as a precancerous state and is important for the investigations of molecular markers. Therefore, genes involved in the progression from NASH to cirrhosis will be analyzed.

For the proposed studies, liver tissue of SD rats that were fed i) Control, ii) high Chol, iii) high Met or iv) high Met+high Chol diets will be used. Liver tissues from both short and long-term experiments for the isolation of protein and genes for *hexokinase 2, aldolase A*, to understand the progression of NASH to cirrhosis in rats fed high Cho and prevention or regression of this due to the presence of Met. Importantly, due to the known antioxidative properties of Met *per se* and its intermediates, we will analyze the genes and proteins for Glutathionine peroxidase, protein arginine methyl transferase (asymmetric dimethyl arginine related), methionine adenosyl transferase, cystathionine β synthase, cystathionine γ lyase due to their role in the production of hydrogen sulfide. This molecule is a well-documented anti-inflammatory and antioxidant gasotransmitter. Additionally, we will analyze glutamate-cysteine ligase and glutathione synthase which are key enzymes in the synthesis of glutathione, the natural antioxidant. In view of the known reduction of antioxidant stress of Met, mediated by hemoxygenase 1 (43), we will analyze for the status of hemoxygenase 1 in our samples (43). Apart from the data on anti-inflammatory effects of Met we have obtained in our studies, we will look for additional mechanisms that could be contributing to understanding the beneficial effects of Met based on literature reports (44,45). More importantly, we will conduct *in vitro* studies with CRL 1439 cells wherein the cells will be challenged with LPS and Cho for 24 hours with and without Met. This will help us in deciphering the status of inflammatory genes and the suppression of such responses by Met.

We anticipate obtaining useful and important information about progression of NAFLD in rats fed high Cho diets apart from the role played by DPP-4 inhibitors in this process. These facets contribute to advance our understanding about both diet and the drug.

Timeline for completing the analysis of genes and proteins as proposed currently

June 1, 2023 to January 31, 2024 – Analysis of liver samples from short and long-term experiments. February 1, 2024 to April 30, 2024 – Compilation of data for meeting presentations and manuscripts.

# Facilities and Other resources

The PI's laboratory at SUBR is housed in rooms 209 and 128, Health Research Center (HRC) occupying 2000 sq. ft. of laboratory space located on the first and second floor of HRC building which includes dedicated areas for microscopy, immunohistochemistry, PCR and analytical biochemistry. The PI's laboratory at Southern University is equipped with a thermocycler, tabletop refrigerated centrifuge, and ultracentrifuge. Furthermore, other instruments include spectrophotometer, and an inverted microscope.

Computers: The PI is provided with two IBM-compatible desktop PCs and two IBM-compatible laptops with a Pentium 4 processor for online access, word processing and data analysis. One desktop PC and one laptop PC are located in his office in Lee Hall room 210, and the rest of PCs are in different laboratories mentioned above. All PCs are loaded with licensed software of Microsoft Windows Vista and X-pro, Microsoft Office 2007 and 2010, Adobe 9.0, GraphPad Prism, EndNote and ISIS Draw 2.4.

The PI's office: space at SUBR is about 150 sq. ft located adjacent to the laboratory in room number 210. There is one desktop and one laptop PC computer in the office. Secretarial and administrative support is also available Other: The faculty members in the HRC and Chemistry and Biology Departments have a constant exchange of scientific information with scientists at LSU, Pennington Biomedical Research Center (PBRC) in the corresponding departments (ca. 10 miles away from SUBR). This is done through sponsoring collaborative projects and seminars of mutual interest. Facilities at Health Research Center (HRC): The research services with access are core facilities of HRC consisting of a large cold room, dark room, autoclave room, ice-making machine, cell culture laboratories (two), and several analytical instruments. Also, Beckman 5510 P/ACE capillary electrophoresis systems, Bio-Rad 583 gel dryer system, and Beckman LE80 and LS-65 ultracentrifuges. Other instruments include Cellometer Vision for automated fluorescent-based cell counting, one fluorescence microscope, an Olympus Fluoview FV10i confocal microscope, five -20 °C and one -80 °C freezers, and an AlphaScan microarray scanner can be used. In addition, the Toxicology unit at the Health Research Center has a common equipment room with spectrophotometers, ultracentrifuges, a peptide synthesizer, a Real Time PCR machine, one Fluorimager, and a Cell Lab Quanta SC MPL Flow Cytometer (Beckman Coulter).

CORE facilities at the Pennington Biomedical Research Center (PBRC) - For over three years, the PI has been using the core facilities at the PBRC in Baton Rouge, LA. The facilities include a) Cell Biology, Cell Imaging and Cell Culture, and b) Comparative Biology & Animal Metabolism & Behavior. Several animal experiments have been carried out in these core facilities in addition to processing aorta, liver, heart and other tissues from experiments for structural and functional changes and scanning and storing the images in their database.

# A. Personal Statement

I have been always passionate about intermediary metabolism of amino acids. I obtained my PhD in biochemistry from the National Institute of Nutrition/Osmania University, Hyderabad, India. I have worked on lysine metabolism to pipecolic acid in mouse brain for my doctoral dissertation. I continued this work at the Oregon State University after relocating from India in 1997. I was mainly working on the isolation and purification of pipecolic oxidase from monkey brains and Rhodotorula glutinis at Oregon State University and spent 1.5 years. In fall 1999, I took up an assignment in the Toxicology Department, College of Pharmacy at the University of Louisiana at Monroe, Louisiana where I worked on binary mixture toxicity. After working for over two years, I realized I could not stay away from my passion for amino acids and nutrition and therefore took up an assignment at the Tulane University School of Medicine in New Orleans, Louisiana in October 2001 to work on Homocysteine metabolism. I was in Tulane for over I I years rising to the ranks of Associate Professor. I worked on a surrogate marker for CVD, Intima/Media ratio using Zucker fatty (insulin resistance) and SD rats focusing on pulmonary hypertension, erectile dysfunction, and nutritional aspects. Several pharmaceuticals in clinical practice were evaluated for their pleotropic effects in addition to using stem cell therapeutic approaches. # **Budget Justification**

A. Senior Personnel

Hang Yin, Ph.D. will be responsible for the overall success of the project. The PI will be responsible for project management, team building, supervising and conducting research, reporting, and conducting outreach activities. She will be supported at 1.75 summer month, which is \$14,440/year for a total of \$57,760 for four years (Base salary: \$74261 for 9-month employee).

# B. Other Personnel

Graduate Research Assistants:

TBN: Funds are requested to support two Graduate Research Assistants (GRAs).

GRA # 1 will be assigned to the Department of Civil Engineering and of Environmental Engineering. He/She will work 20 hours/week for 38 academic weeks and 14 summer weeks in years 1 and 2 (\$17,680/year @ \$17.0/hr)

GRA # 2 will be assigned to the Department of Civil Engineering and of Environmental Engineering. He/She will work 20 hours/week for 38 academic weeks and 14 summer weeks in years 3 and 4 (\$17,680/year @ \$17.0/hr)

TBN: Funds are requested to support two undergraduate students per year.

- Southern University and A&M College encourages undergraduate research. The Mission of the university is "to provide a student-focused teaching and learning environment." In addition, the Mission of the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering is to "provide the students with a high-quality education" and "engage [them] in advanced study." Therefore, one goal of this project is to involve underrepresented African American students in research to enhance undergraduate STEM education in Civil and Environmental Engineering. Thus, a portion of the budget is dedicated to supporting one undergraduate students per year.
- The two undergraduate students (senior class with GPA > 3.0) with tuition waiver will assist the PI in conducting experiments, measuring and analyzing experimental data, preparing manuscripts for scholarly publication, and preparing presentations at academic conferences. The undergraduate students will also perform other necessary tasks to support this project.
- Each undergraduate student will work 13 hours per week and 24 academic weeks per vear. (624/year @\$13/hr)

C. Fringe Benefits

# **Laboratory Space**

The major tasks of the proposed project will be performed in the Geotechnical Laboratory in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Southern University and A&M College (Baton Rouge, LA). The Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering is housed in P.B.S. Pinchback Engineering Building at Southern University and A&M College. The University opened this landmark engineering facility in 2002 to develop and maintain competitive, high-quality research and teaching programs across the College of Sciences and Engineering. P.B.S. Pinchback Engineering Building contains approximately 11,000 m<sup>2</sup> of available area. This building is a state-of-the-art instructional, laboratory, technology, and administrative center, well-equipped to address all faculty members' research needs and all students' curricular needs.

The Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering has laboratories, computer rooms, classrooms, student engagement areas, and office spaces in P.B.S. Pinchback Engineering Building. #### 11. Contract

NORTHWESTERN STATE UNIVERSITY (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "State") and CONTRACTOR AS IDENTIFIED UNDER SECTION 1 (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Contractor") do hereby enter into contract under the terms and conditions stated herein.

#### 12. Taxes

Contractor hereby agrees that the responsibility for payment of taxes from the funds thus received under this Contract and/or legislative appropriation shall be Contractor's obligation and identified under tax identification number in Section 3. In accordance with R.S. 39:1624(A)(10), the Louisiana Department of Revenue must determine that the prospective contractor is current in the filing of all applicable tax returns and reports and in payment of all taxes, interest, penalties, and fees owed to the state and collected by the Department of Revenue prior to the approval of this contract by the Office of State Procurement. The prospective contractor hereby attests to its current and/or prospective compliance, and agrees to provide its seven-digit LDR Account Number to the contracting agency so that the prospective contractor's tax payment compliance status may be verified. The prospective contractor further acknowledges understanding that issuance of a tax clearance certificate by the Louisiana Department of Revenue is a necessary precondition to the approval and effectiveness of this contract by the Office of State Procurement. #### 13. Termination For Cause

#### 16. Other Remedies

If the Contractor fails to perform in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract, or if any lien or claim for damages, penalties, costs and the like is asserted by or against the State, then, upon notice to the Contractor, the State may pursue all remedies available to it at law or equity, including retaining monies from amounts due the Contractor and proceeding against any surety of the Contractor.

#### 17. Governing Law

This Contract shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, including but not limited to La. R.S. 39:1551-1736; rules and regulations; executive orders; standard terms and conditions, special terms and conditions, and this Contract.

Venue of any action brought, after exhaustion of administrative remedies, with regard to this Contract shall be in the Nineteenth Judicial District Court, Parish of East Baton Rouge, State of Louisiana.

#### 18. Ownership

All records, reports, documents and other material delivered or transmitted to Contractor by State shall remain the property of State, and shall be returned by Contractor to State, at Contractor's expense, at termination or expiration of this contract. All records, reports, documents, or other material related to this contract and/or obtained or prepared by Contractor in connection with the performance of the services contracted for herein shall become the property of State, and shall, upon request, be returned by Contractor to State, at Contractor's expense, at termination or expiration of this contract.

#### 19. Assignment

The Contractor shall not assign any interest in this contract and shall not transfer any interest in same (whether by assignment or novation), without prior written consent of the State, provided however, that claims for money due or to become due to the Contractor from the State may be assigned to a bank, trust company, or other financial institution without such prior written consent. Notice of any such assignment or transfer shall be furnished promptly to the State.

#### 20. Auditors and Records Retention

It is hereby agreed that the Legislative Auditor of the State of Louisiana and/or the Office of the Governor, Division of Administration and Federal Government auditors shall have the option of auditing all accounts of Contractor which is related to this contract for a period of five years

from the date of final payment under the prime contract and any subcontract. Contractor and subcontractor shall comply with federal and state laws authorizing an audit of their operations as a whole, or of specific program activities.

#### 21. Term of Contract

This contract shall commence and terminate on the dates as stated in Section 9.

#### 22. Fiscal Funding

The continuation of this contract is contingent upon the appropriation of funds to fulfill the requirements of the contract by the legislature. If the legislature fails to appropriate sufficient monies to provide for the continuation of the contract, of if such appropriation is reduced by the veto of the Governor or by any means provided in the appropriations act to prevent the total appropriation for the year from exceeding revenues for that year, or for any other lawful

purpose, and the effect of such reduction is to provide insufficient monies for the continuation of the contract, the contract shall terminate on the date beginning of the first fiscal year for which funds are not appropriated.

#### 23. Confidentiality

Contractor shall protect from unauthorized use and disclosure all information relating to the State's operations and data (e.g. financial, statistical, personal, technical, etc.) that becomes available to the Contractor in carrying out this Contract.

Contractor shall use protecting measures that are the same or more effective than those used by the State. Contractor is not required to protect information or data that is publicly available outside the scope of this Contract; already rightfully in the Contractor's possession;

independently developed by the Contractor outside the scope of this Contract; or rightfully obtained from third parties. Under no circumstance shall the Contractor discuss and/or release information to the media concerning this project without prior express written approval of the State.

#### 24. Amendments

Any modification to the provisions of this Contract shall be in writing, signed by all parties, and approved by the required authorities.

#### 25. Cybersecurity Training

In accordance with La. R.S. 42:1267(B)(3) and the State of Louisiana's Information Security Policy, if the Contractor, any of its employees, agents, or subcontractors will have access to State government information technology assets, the Contractor's employees, agents, or subcontractors with such access must complete cybersecurity training annually, and the Contractor must present evidence of such compliance annually and upon request.

The Contractor may use the cybersecurity training course offered by the Louisiana Department of State Civil Service without additional cost or may use any alternate course approved in writing by the State.

#### 26. Code Of Ethics

The Contractor acknowledges that Chapter 15 of Title 42 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes (R.S. 42:1101 et. seq., Code of Governmental Ethics) applies to the Contracting Party in the performance of services called for in this Contract. The Contractor agrees to immediately notify the State if potential violations of the Code of Governmental Ethics arise at any time during the term of this Contract.

#### 27. Discrimination Clause

The contractor agrees to abide by the requirements of the following as applicable: Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended by the Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1972, Federal Executive Order 11246 as amended, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, the Vietnam Era Veteran's Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, the Fair Housing Act of 1968 as amended, and contractor agrees to abide by the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

Contractor agrees not to discriminate in its employment practices, and will render services under this contract without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, veteran status, political affiliation, disabilities or age.

Any act of discrimination committed by Contractor, or failure to comply with these statutory obligations when applicable shall be grounds for termination of this contract.

#### 28. Prohibition of Discriminatory Boycotts of Israel

# ATTACHMENT 1 Statement of Work/Budget/Other Terms and Conditions

### I. OVERVIEW

The Louisiana Child Welfare Training Academy (LCWTA) is committed to providing a comprehensive array of training and professional development opportunities to child welfare staff and stakeholders. The LCWTA will strive to develop, through training, coaching, and mentoring, a community of professionals, paraprofessionals and caregivers with relevant knowledge, skills and expertise to effectively intervene with vulnerable children and families involved in Louisiana's child welfare system. The LCWTA is integral in helping the state improve safety, permanency and well-being outcomes for children and families.

LCWTA is a partnership between the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), the Pelican Center for Children and Families, and the Louisiana University Child Welfare Workforce Alliance (University Alliance) comprised of university partners from seven social work programs within Louisiana's public universities and one public university's psychology department. The University Alliance members include Southeastern Louisiana University (Southeastern) as the LCWTA Lead, Northwestern State University of Louisiana (NSU) as the Title IV-E Scholars and LCWTA/University Alliance Lead, Grambling State University (GSU), Louisiana State University (LSU), Southern University Baton Rouge (SUBR), Southern University New Orleans (SUNO), and the University of Louisiana at Monroe (ULM), and Nicholls State University.

In collaboration with the LCWTA/Southeastern and DCFS, NSU shall lead the Title IV-E Child Welfare Scholars Program, formerly known as the Title IV-E Stipend Program. This program also includes the DCFS/LCWTA Child Welfare Employee Educational Support Program. The scholars program awards stipends and provides educational support to prospective and current child welfare employees to obtain a Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) or Master of Social Work (MSW) degree.

As part of the collaboration, NSU also provides leadership, coordination, and support to achieve overall LCWTA/University Alliance partnership goals in Recruitment, Retention, Learning, and Infrastructure. In collaboration with the LCWTA and DCFS, NSU shall also lead and support the development of certificate training programs, workforce development simulation activities, clinical supervision of child welfare staff, support groups and the community of practice initiative, and other specialized learning programs at partner universities. In addition, they will expand the capacity of the partnership to provide high quality research and evaluation, and evidence-based practice and implementation models.

## Mission/Vision

The mission of the LCWTA and the University Alliance is to work collaboratively to strengthen the recruitment, training, and retention of child welfare professionals to achieve safety, permanency, and well-being of children and families in Louisiana.

The vision is to cultivate excellence in child welfare through competent, qualified, dedicated, and supported child welfare professionals, who in partnership with families and communities, will transform the system and achieve outcomes supporting thriving children and families. Four key goals of the partnership include: (1) Recruitment: Recruit competent, dedicated child welfare professionals; (2) Retention: Support the retention of child welfare professionals; (3) Learning: Offer comprehensive quality learning opportunities; and (4) Infrastructure: Build capacity to effectively and efficiently fulfill the LCWTA University Alliance mission. These goals are carried out within the five arcs of success that include Outstanding Customer Service; Impressive Delivery of Training and Expansion of Learning/Learning Opportunities; Measuring and Communicating Outcomes; Blending/Merging Operations within the LCWTA/University Alliance Partnership; and Fiscal Responsibility.

## II. SCOPE OF WORK

NSU shall lead the a) Title IV-E Student Scholars Program, including the Child Welfare Employees Educational Support Program and Title IV-E Child Welfare Scholars Community of Practice Professional Development, Title IV-E Support Groups, and related recruitment, learning, and retention goals; b) the Social Work Advanced Practice and Clinical Supervision Program to support child welfare employees becoming advanced social work practitioners; c) research and evaluation capacity building within the partnership; and d) other child welfare workforce recruitment, retention and learning goals committed to on behalf of the LCWTA, University This includes expanding and leveraging the strengths of Alliance and DCFS. partnering universities to expand certificate programs in advanced areas of practice, to offer more engaging, interactive, accessible learning experiences through practice simulations, community of practice groups, and other state-of-the-art teaching and learning practices, support advanced social work licensure, and overall capacity building and investment in the child welfare workforce at the university, department, and community level.

NSU shall provide programmatic and fiscal direction and oversight for each program and serve as a core member of the LCWTA Steering Committee and other committees and work groups where needed to support achievement of DCFS and LCWTA/University Alliance goals.

**University Alliance** 

NSU shall subcontract with Grambling State University, Louisiana State University, Nicholls State University, Southern University at Baton Rouge, Southern University at New Orleans, and the University of Louisiana at Monroe, and as agreed upon by the partnership other universities, to operate a scholars program within their respective universities and support achievement of agreed upon learning, recruitment, and retention goals.

This program relies on funds generated through identifying Certified Public Expenditures universities expend toward the further provision of training child welfare workers to serve Title IV-E eligible children and implementation of child welfare workforce development strategies.

## Title IV-E Funding:

This project relies on reimbursement of costs incurred while delivering child welfare training and education services under Title IV-E of the Social Security Act. The reimbursement of Title IV-E from the federal government will be provided to DCFS. DCFS retains the right to gather and audit any information pertaining to substantiating the claiming of Title IV-E dollars. Reimbursement to DCFS is based on the following: All education and training costs associated with child welfare preparation and worker skill enhancement are submitted as the cost is incurred. Each dollar spent is then discounted by the states IV- E penetration rate and then the appropriate Federal Financial Participation rate is applied (75% for training, and 50% for administrative activities).

## Responsibilities:

## A. NSU Shall

- 1. Provide payment to the SUBR within 30 calendar days of submission of completed and accurate invoices. NSU shall provide immediate communication regarding the need for any additional information so processing of the payment will not be delayed.
- 2. Provide technical assistance regarding rules, regulations, and policies governing the Title IV-E Program agreement.

- 3. Review all contract and agreement forms to be utilized for contractual agreements with other universities and/or professionals for compliance with Title IV-E requirements prior to the finalization of the agreements.
- 4. Review SUBR's expenditures to ensure that Title IV-E funds are expended appropriately for allowable expenditures during the contract period. If SUBR fails to expend the Title IV-E funds in accordance with this contract NSU shall meet with SUBR to determine the cause of the deviation, discuss a performance improvement plan necessary to alleviate the problem, and set a deadline for the performance improvement plan to be implemented.
- 5. Review SUBR's performance measures on a quarterly basis to ensure the outcomes set forth are being achieved during the contract period. The contract monitor will meet with the university at least quarterly to discuss the contract outcomes, any special projects, and all other terms and agreements contained within this contract.
- 6. Review monthly cost reports and backup documentation for every expenditure in accordance with the monitoring plan and determine if the charges are allowable. Backup documentation submitted each month must include payroll records for direct reimbursement and Certified Public Expenditures. If deficiencies are detected in the review of invoices, NSU will request clarification or additional information, and may, if warranted, request back up documentation on additional invoices both past and future. If any overpayments are determined from the review, the recoupment of the overpayment will occur on future invoices.
- 7. Assign specific agency personnel to serve as a liaison and monitor. The person will be responsible for monthly review of the request for cost reimbursement; quarterly reports; and ongoing meetings with SUBR to discuss program operations.
- 8. Provide criteria for stipend recipients set forth by DCFS and be available on matters related to the development of child welfare curriculum as needed.
- 9. There will be no known relationship or association between SUBR and employees of NSU which would be prohibited by the Code of Ethics (such as family relationships or business association), or which would give the appearance of affecting the judgment of employees in negotiating, monitoring or paying for this service.

## B. SUBR shall:

1. Assign specific university personnel to serve as a liaison and monitor. The person will be responsible for monthly review of the request for cost reimbursement;

quarterly reports; and ongoing meetings with NSU to discuss program operations including attending all quarterly alliance meetings.

- 2. Retain all books, records, and other documents relevant to the contract and funds expended thereunder for at least five (5) federal fiscal years after final payment or as described in 45 CFR 235.61 and 235.63 through 235.66(a) whichever is longest.
- 3. Grant to the state of Louisiana, through the Office of the Legislative Auditor, DCFS, Inspector General Office, Federal Government and/or other such officially designated body, the right to inspect and review all books and records pertaining to services rendered under this contract
- 4. Grant permission, as evidenced by the signing of this contractual agreement to DCFS to request, receive, and communicate with the Office of the Legislative Auditor or other auditing firm regarding any audit concerns or findings as they relate to the performance of any audit conducted for the provision of Title IV-E funded services under this agreement.
- 5. Comply with applicable federal and/or state laws (31 USC 7501 through 7507, Revised 0MB Circular A-133, 45 CFR, Vol.1and LA R.S. 24:513 and 514) pertaining to required audits or annual financial statement of NSU Title IV-E program operation as a whole, or of specific program activities.
- 6. Ensure all service delivery providers and subcontractors are informed of any applicable audit requirements and that all necessary requirements are complied with. NSU shall have the option to conduct an audit for any and all service delivery providers to ensure compliance.
- 7. Submit invoices for services and backup documentation (administrative consortium costs separated from the program or service unit costs) rendered by the 20th of each subsequent month. June invoices must be submitted no later than July 12th Backup documentation will include payroll records for direct reimbursement and certified public expenditures. Repay, to NSU, any federal sanction or penalty amount (not to exceed the amount received under this contract) determined by the single state audit or other reviews only if the sanction or penalty is directly related to the services provided pursuant to this contract and is imposed as a result of SUBR's failure to comply with agreements of and or federal policy/law or as otherwise stated.

- 10. Submit quarterly, a status report regarding program progress and subcontractor program progress toward meeting the state outcomes for the Title IV-E program, including a report on program goals and objectives, performance measures, and quarterly expenditures to NSU. Reports should include any barriers or concerns that would deter the contractor and/or subcontractors from realizing success in the service delivery or funding of the program.
- 11. Be responsible for the maintenance of documentation of training and services provided and detailed expenditure data as provided by law.
- $12.\,Communicate$  in writing requests for any programmatic or budgetary changes for review and approval by NSU and the LCWTA
- 13. There will be no known relationship or association between SUBR and employees of NSU which would be prohibited by the Code of Ethics (such as family relationships or business association), or which would give the appearance of affecting the judgment of employees in negotiating, monitoring or paying for this service.

14. By signing and executing this agreement SUBR agrees and understands the following:

a. Title IV-E funds received pursuant to the attached contract are for the stated fiscal years and are non-recurring funds. Receipt of these funds does not guarantee funding past the expiration date specified in this contract. NSU agrees to conduct the planning and Implementation of specified initiative, taking into consideration these funds are for the contract fiscal years pending further negotiation of agency training plans.

b. Funding is for the specific contract period only.

# Funding Agreements, Conditions, Payment Terms, and Administrative Allocations:

A. Funding for this program is contingent upon availability and appropriation of Title IV-E funds, and the ability of SUBR and other universities generating a sufficient amount of Certified Public Expenditures to claim Title IV-E dollars to provide full financial support for the program. All Certified Public Expenditures identified in the projected budget shall be billed each month. Invoices shall reflect the total eligible expenses; the amount of reimbursement to be directed to each university, at its request; and the portion of reimbursement each university is directing to the LCWTA and associated University Alliance efforts toward child welfare workforce development and retention. On an annual basis, unless otherwise directed and agreed by LCWTA, up to 10% SUBR's reimbursement shall be directed to the LCWTA-University Alliance partnership's overall efforts to support stipend graduates and others working in the child welfare system through training and professional development, support groups, clinical supervision, and other child welfare workforce development and retention activities.

B. All funds generated in excess of those necessary to support program operations shall be maintained by Southeastern in the LCWTA/Southeastern-University Alliance Fund (LCWTA Fund) for the exclusive use of the LCWTA and associated University Alliance. The balance of funds in excess of those necessary for the efficient use of the LCWTA shall be disclosed to all University Alliance members by August 30th of each year. All universities will be asked to participate in an annual planning meeting to identify and prioritize opportunities for expanding and strengthening the LCWTA partnership.

Example:

University X generates eligible IV-E expenses= \$150,000

UX request reimbursement of Title IV-E eligible expenses based on approved budget= \$130,000 UX authorizes remainder to CWTA/SLU-Alliance Fund= \$20,000

C. As a party to this agreement, SUBR understands and agrees to the following. Title IV-E funds shall:

1. Be used only for the designated purposes. Any overpayments will be offset from future payments within the contract period.

2. Be utilized in accordance with the legislative intent as specified within 45 CFR 235.61.

3. Used for the provision of services during the contract period.

D. Administrative expenses for Title IV-E funded services shall be reimbursable through the contract using the budget template. These expenses should remain segregated from programmatic costs.

This email communication is an explanation of the process for selecting Performance First Media for our Statewide Media campaign contract. In our 2021-2022 budget, we were allocated funds to develop the media and marketing for LCPR. It was at that time that we researched and sought out media firms in the Baton Rouge area. Unfortunately, we were unable to obtain any firms in the Baton Rouge area because the firms were unwilling to work with SU due to financial concerns (payment) for services in a timely manner or they wanted payment before services were rendered. Needless to say, we did not fulfill the deliverable due to the inability to find a company by the end of the contract. As we fast-forward to this contract, I began looking outside of Baton Rouge because of my prior experience in the area and reached out to other universities and companies who had used marketing firms in the New Orleans area. In my research, there were two firms in which I was provided names. #### GOAL/PURPOSE

The purpose of this contract is to create a statewide media campaign that shows the impact of substance use disorder paired with COVID-19 across Louisiana. This contract will also provide trainings and awareness campaigns for Service Members. Veterans, and their Families (SMVF) with targeted messages that focus on behavioral health prevention.

The Louisiana Center for Prevention Resources (LCPR) was established at Southern University and A&M College to provide training and technical assistance services to the Substance Abuse Prevention Workforce. The LCPR works directly with the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH), Office of Behavioral Health (OBH), and other statewide entities aimed at improving implementation and delivery of effective substance abuse prevention interventions.

#### COMPONENT A:

#### OVERVIEW:

The LCPR will develop a Statewide Media Alcohol Awareness Campaign. The Statewide Media Alcohol and Awareness campaign is to increase awareness of alcohol use and misuse due to COVID-19 and the associated consequences. Similar to other trauma-induced epidemics and pandemics that result in increased stress, COVID-19 social isolations are more likely to increase alcohol misuse; thus, the need for targeted prevention messages. Alcohol misuse adversely affects the immune system resulting in increased susceptibility to respiratory illness that contribute to more severe COVID-19 symptoms and ultimately greater risk of mortality. This campaign will be used to address the risk factors and educate community members on the increase in substance abuse and how it can increase COVID-19 exposure and symptoms.



Budget revisions approved by both parties in cost reimbursement contracts do not require an amendment if the revision only involves the realignment of monies between originally approved cost categories.

This provision is not applicable to contracts with physicians, psychiatrists, psychologists, or other allied health providers solely for medical services.
- 20. Purchased Equipment: Any equipment purchased under this Contract remains the property of Contractor for the period this Contract and future continuing contracts for the provision of the same services. Contractor must submit a vendor invoice with the reimbursement arequest. For the purpose of this contract, equipment is defined as any tangible, durable property having a useful life of at least (1) year and acquisition cost of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or more. - 25. Remedies for Default: Any claim or controversy arising out of this Contract shall be resolved by the provisions of La. R.S.
  - Other Remedies: If the Contractor falls to perform in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract, or if any lian or cialm for dameges, penalties, cost and the like is asserted by or against the State, then, upon notice to the Contractor, the State may pursue all remedies available to it at law or equity, including retaining monies from amounts due the Contractor and proceeding against any surety of the Contractor.
- 26. Governing Law: This Contract shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, including but not limited to La. R.S. 39:1551-1736; rules and regulations; executive orders; standard terms and conditions, and specifications listed in the Request for Proposals (RFP), if applicable; and this contract.
- 27. Contractor's Cooperation: Contractor has the duty to fully cooperate with the State and provide any and all requested information, documentation, etc. to the State, when requested. This applies even if this Contract is terminated and/or a lawsuit is filed. Specifically, Contractor shall not limit or impede the State's right to audit or shall not withhold State-owned documents.
- 28. Continuing Obligation: Contractor has a continuing obligation to disclose to the Department any suspansion or debarment by any government entity, including, but not limited to, the General Services Admihistration (GSA). Under no chromatance shall the Contractor discuss and/or release information to the media concerning this project without prior express written approval of the State.
- 34. Prohibition of Discriminatory Boycotts of Israel: in accordance with La. Department of Heelth and Human Services (DHHS) pursuent to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") of 1996 and were subsequently amended pursuant to the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health ("HITECH") Act of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
  - iii. The terms "Business Associate", "Covared Entity", "disclosure", "electronic protected health information" ("electronic PHI"), "health care provider", "health information", "health plan", "protected health information" ("PHI"), "subcontractor", end "use" have the same meaning as set forth in 45 CFR §180.103.
  - iii. The term 'security incident' has the same meaning as set forth in 45 CFR §184.304.
  - The terms "breach" end "unsecured protected health information" ("unsecured PHI") have the same meaning as set forth in 45 CFR §164,402
- b. Contractor and its egents, employees and subcontractors shall comply with all applicable requirements of the HIPAA Rules and shall maintain the confidentiality of all PHI obtained by them pursuent to this Contract es required by the HIPAA Rules and by this Contract.
- Contractor shall use or disclose PHI solely: (a) for meeting its obligations under the contract, or (b) as required by law, rule, regulation (including the HIPAA Rules), or as otherwise required or permitted by this Contract.
- Contractor shall implement and utilize all appropriate sefeguards to prevent any use or disclosure of PHI not required or permitted by this Contract, including administrative, physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of the electronic protected health information that it creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of the Department.
- In accordance with 45 CFR §164.502(a)(1)(ii) and (if applicable) §164.308(b)(2), Contractor shall ensure that any agents, employees, subcontractors, or others that create, receive, maintain, or transmit PHI on behalf of Contractor agree to the same restrictions, conditions, and requirements that apply to Contractor with respect to such information, and it shall


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ensure that they implement reasonable and appropriate safeguards to protect such information. Contractor shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that its agents', employees', or subcontractors' actions or omissions do not cause Contractor to violate this Contract.

- f. Contractor shall, within three (3) days of becoming awere of any use or disclosure of PHI, other then see permitted by this Contract, report such disclosure in writing to the person(s) named in Terms of Payment on page 1 of this document. Disclosures which must be reported by Contractor include, but are not limited to, any security incident, any breach of unsecured PHI, and any "breach of the security system" as defined in the Louisiana Database Security Breach Notification Law, Le. R.S. 51:3071 at seq. At the option of the Department, any harm or damage resulting from any use or disclosure which violates this Contract shall be miligated, to the extent practicable, either: (a) by Contractor at its own expense; or (b) by the Department, in which case Contractor shall reimbures the Department for all expenses that the Department is required to incur in undertaking such mitigation activities.
- g. To the extent that Contractor is to carry out one or more of the Department's obligations under 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart E, Contractor shall comply with the requirements of Subpart E that apply to the Department in the performance of such obligation(s).
- h. Contractor shall make available such information in its possession which is required for the Department to provide an accounting of disclosures in accordance with 45 CFR §164.528. In the event that a request for accounting is made directly to Contractor, Contractor shall forward such request to the Department within two (2) days of such receipt. Contractor shall implement an appropriate record keeping process to enable it to comply with the requirements of this provision. Contractor shall maintain data on all disclosures of PkI for which accounting is required by 45 CFR §164.528 for at least six (6) years after the date of the last such disclosure.
- Contractor shall make PHI available to the Department upon request in accordance with 45 CFR §164.524.
- Contractor shall make PHI evallable to the Department upon request for amendment and shall incorporate any amendments to PHI in accordance with 45 CFR §164.626.
- k. Contractor shall make its internal practices, books, and records releting to the use and disclosure of PHI received from or created or received by Contractor on behalf of the Department available to the Secretary of the DHHS for purposes of determining the Department's compliance with the HIPAA Rules.
- Contractor shall indemnify and hold the Department hermless from and against any and all liabilities, claims for damages, costs, expenses and attorneys' fees resulting from any violetion of this provision by Contractor or by its agents, employees or subcontractors, without regard to any limitation or exclusion of demages provision otherwise set forth in the contract.
- m. The parties agree that the legal relationship between the Department end Contractor is strictly an independent contractor relationship. Nothing in this Contract shall be deemed to create a joint venture, agency, partnership, or employer- employer relationship between the Department end Contractor.
- n. Notwithstanding any other provision of the contract, the Department shall have the right to terminate the Contract immediately if the Department determines that Contractor has violated any provision of the HIPAA Rules or any material term of this contract.
- o. At the termination of the contract, or upon request of the Department, whichever occurs first, Contractor shall return or destroy (at the option of the Department) eli PHI received or created by Contractor that Contractor still maintains in any form and retain no copies of such information; or if such return or destruction is not feasible, Contractor shall extend the confidentiality protections of the Contract to the information and limit further uses and disclosure to those purposes that make the return or destruction of the information infeasible.

# GOAL/PURPOSE

The purpose of this contract is to create a statewide media campaign that shows the impact of substance use disorder paired with COVID-19 across Louisiana. This contract will also provide trainings and awareness campaigns for Service Members, Veterans and their Families (SMVF) with targeted messages that focus on behavioral health prevention.

The Louisiana Center for Prevention Resources (LCPR) was established at Southern University and A&M College to provide training and technical assistance services to the Substance Abuse Prevention Workforce. The LCPR works directly with the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH), Office of Behavioral Health (OBH) and other statewide entities aimed at improving implementation and delivery of effective substance abuse prevention interventions.

# COMPONENT A:

# OVERVIEW:

The LCPR will develop a Statewide Media Alcohol Awareness Campaign. The Statewide Media Alcohol and Awareness campaign is to increase awareness of alcohol use and misuse due to COVID-19 and the associated consequences. Similar to other trauma-induced epidemics and pandemics that results in increased stress, COVID-19 social isolations are more likely to increase alcohol misuse; thus, the need for targeted prevention messages. Alcohol misuse adversely affects the immune system resulting in increased susceptibility to respiratory illness that contribute to more severe COVID-19 symptoms and ultimately greater risk of mortality. This campaign will be used to address the risk factors and educate community members on the increase in substance abuse and how it can increase COVID-19 exposure and symptoms.

### **DELIVERABLE A-1**

Develop Statewide Media Campaign to address the impact of substance abuse and COVID across Louisiana.

### Contractor shall:

- Identify a marketing firm to create and develop messaging for a Statewide Media Campaign.
- Develop Statewide Media messaging based upon combined regional COVID-19 and alcohol use data to address co-occurrence of these behavioral health concerns.
- Identify evaluation methods/tools used for prevention workforce to determine the
  effectiveness and fidelity of the Statewide Media Campaigns.

# OUTCOMES:

- Billboards to be placed in 64 parishes within the state with messaging regarding substance use and COVID-19.
- Local newspaper will share messaging regarding substance abuse on their website.
- Messages will be shared on radio stations.
- Resource documents will be created and disseminated. This will include, but not limited to
  infographics, brochures, flyers, personal stories, and frequently asked questions (FAQs) to
  be shared statewide.
- Data will be provided quarterly from the advertising company on the number of views for the billboards, and number of documents shared.

# COMPONENT B:

# OVERVIEW:

Trainings provided to SMVF will focus on behavioral health prevention services. Most activeduty service members and veterans have family members that are adversely impacted by separations, constant transitions and the stress of possible endangerment. Mental health stigma and career concerns often prohibit SMVFs from seeking needed behavioral health services. LCPR will offer trainings that encourage support for SMVF vulnerable populations whose behavioral health outcomes can be positively impacted. Trainings related to substance use/abuse will also be provided.

# DELIVERABLES B-1

Provide a Training Series for Service Members, Veterans, and their Families to include but not limited to the following topics.

### Contractor shall:

Training Series for Service Members, Veterans and their families (SMVF) to include the

# MONITORING PLAN:

- The Project will be monitored monthly by the Office of Behavioral Health, Prevention Services, Program Manager or his/her designee/successor. (Mrs. Felecia Johnson currently holds the position of Program Manager for OBH, Prevention Services).
- Conduct on-site programmatic review on a monthly to determine if the contractor is meeting
  the requirements of the statement of work. All documents listed under this performance
  indicator section shall be reviewed.
- Monitor quarterly to determine the quality of services being delivered by the program and the program monitor will also review all financial information related to this contract.
- Monitor annually to determine if all management and administrative procedures are followed
  and to determine if the program has implemented safety guidelines to protect the well-being of
  the program's enrollees and participants.
- Invoices will be reviewed monthly during on-site monitoring visits.

# OFFICE OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH (OBH) STANDARD PROVISIONS

- Contractor grants to the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH) and its official designees the right to inspect
  the facilities in which services are being provided at all times, particularly with respect to its standards of
  operation, maintenance and compliance with State and Federal regulations and the terms of this contract.
- 2. Contractor shall establish and maintain an accounting system that contains complete and accurate records that will justify and document all expenditures, reflect all accruals, and provide a clear audit trail to the point of origin. All funds received in the furtherance of this contract, whether fees, state, federal, private or inkind contributions, shall be accounted for in the same manner and according to generally accepted accounting principles.

Failure to establish and retain adequate documentation will result in disallowance of expenditures and represent a contractual breach.

Contractor further agrees that in the event that more than one program is operated by Contractor, the funds provided in this contract will be expended only to provide the services described herein to eligible participants. Under no circumstances are monies to be transferred from one program budget to another without contract amendment.

- In order that costs be considered allowable under this contract, they must satisfy the following general requirements:
  - They must be calculated using generally acceptable accounting principles, unless some other procedure is specified in federal regulation.
  - b. They must be consistent with the contract outcomes established in the Statement of Work.
  - c. They must be reasonable and necessary for the proper administration of this contract.
- Contractor agrees that funds provided under this contract may not be used for:
  - Costs that are prohibited by federal, state or local laws or regulations or by other provisions within this contract.
- 5. This provision applies to cost reimbursement contracts only. Contractor agrees to request reimbursement of expenses incurred in performance of this contract only after the Contractor has paid the expense. Further, should LDH determine the Contractor has not paid a reimbursable expense; LDH may withhold an amount equal to the unpaid expense from the reimbursable expenses until such time as LDH determines that payment has been made. In the event that payment has not been made by the end of the fiscal year, the Contractor will forfeit the disputed amount.
- 6. Contractor shall abide by the Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972, as amended; the comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention, Treatment and Rehabilitation Act of 1970, et. seq., as amended, the Mental Health System Act, Title V: the Protection and Advocacy for Mental III Individuals Act of 1986, as amended; all other requirements of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services; all applicable licensing standards and requirements; and requirements as enumerated in Title XVIII and Title XIX of the Social Security Act as applicable.

Contractor further agrees to establish and abide by internal policies and procedures that adhere to Federal and State statutory requirements and to applicable regulatory end licensure standards for reporting and investigating allegations of abuse, neglect and exploitation, and where applicable, taking appropriate preventative and correction action.

- Contractor agrees to develop and implement a drug-free workplace policy that meets the following minimum requirements:
  - a. Contractor shall publish a statement notifying the Contractor's employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition:
  - Contractor shall establish a drug-free ewareness program to inform the Contractor's employees about (i) the dangers of drug abuse in the workplace; (ii) the Contractor's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace; (iii) any available counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and (iv) the penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations;
  - c. Contractor shall provide each of its employees with a copy of the written statement required in A., above, and secure a signed statement from each employee indicating that the employee will, as a condition of employment, (i) abide by the terms of the statement; and (ii) notify the Contractor of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) days after such conviction.
  - Contractor shall notify OBH of any violations of the drug-free workplace policy.

- 8. In the preparation of any statements, press releases or printed documents describing the program provided under this contract. Contractor shall clearly acknowledge federal and/or state government funding received, and such credit will be given the same degree of prominence as any other sponsor, supporter or funding agency.
- Contractor agrees to serve any clients that LDH refers to the Contractor whose needs meet the program's description of services.
- 10. Contractor agrees to permit the LDH open access to all information and data concerning the program, the program fiscal operations and the program participants. Contractor shall provide the LDH such information and data as the LDH may from time to time require or request, such information to be provided in the form and manner as may be prescribed by the LDH.
- LDH may terminate this Contract immediately for actions or omissions of the Contractor that endanger client life, health and/or safety.
- 12. Contractor agrees to provide a monthly and an annual detailed written accounting of all in-kind contributions and all income generated by activities supported through funding from this contract, including payments received from clients or third parties, and to maintain records of the receipt and diaposition of grant related income in the same manner as required for Federal funds received in support of the grant.
- 13. Contractor agrees that the Department of Health and Hospitals is entitled to and may pursue recoupment in the event of an overpayment resulting from an error in billing or as a result of an audit or monitoring reviews.
- 14. Contractor agrees that no funds, neither federal nor funds obtained through a cost reimbursement mechanism, may be utilized under the terms of this contract for renovation of real property.
- 15. Contractor agrees to secure and maintain current applicable licenses.
- 16. Contractor agrees that the Office of Behavioral Health is the payor of last resort.
- 17. Contractor shall abide by all monthly/quarterly data gathering and record keeping procedures necessary to determine the number of persons utilizing the services of the contract and other service-outcome related information as determined by the OBH designated program office.
- 18. Fallure of the Contractor to specifically perform services required by this agreement will constitute cause for the Office of Behavioral Health to impose fiscal sanctions against the Contractor for such failure. Sanctions of up to \$100.00 a day may be imposed against the Contractor by permanently withholding payment when a determination has been made by the Office of Behavioral Health that required services are not being provided.
- Contractor shall maintain personnel policies and procedures including job descriptions and job qualifications to assure qualified staff are employed.
- Contractor must comply with legal mandates related to the populations being served (e.g. background checks for staff in contact with children) as provided by the Louisiana Child Protection Act (RS 15:587.1).
- Public Law 103-227, also known as the Pro-Children Act of 1994 (Act), requires that smoking not be permitted in any portion of any indoor facility owned or leased or contracted for by an entity and used routinely or regularly for the provision of health, day care, early childhood development services, education or library services to children under the age of 18, if the services are funded by Federal program either directly or through State or local governments, by Federal grant, contract, loan, or loan guarantee. The law also applies to children's services that are provided in indoor facilities that are constructed, operated, or maintained with such federal funds. The law does not apply to children's services provided in private residences; portions of facilities used for inpatient drug or alcohol treatment; service Contractors whose sole source of applicable Federal funds is Medicare or Medicaid; or facilities where WIC coupons are redeemed. Failure to comply with the provisions of the law may result in the imposition of an administrative compliance order on the responsible entity.

By signing this certification, the contractor certifies that it will comply with the requirements of the Act and will not allow smoking within any portion of any indoor facility used for the provision of services for children as defined by the Act. Contractor agrees that it will require that the language of this certification be included in any sub-contracts which contain provisions for children's services and that all sub-contracts shall certify accordingly.

# Nuclear Security, Advanced Manufacturing Enhanced by Machine Learning Phase II (NSAM-ML2) Statement of Work

SUBR PI: Dr. Shizhong Yang

Professor of Computer Science, focusing on Materials Sciences Sub-Awardee: Southern University and A&M College (SUBR)

Southern University and A&M College-Baton Rouge (SUBR) team led by Prof. Shizhong Yang is a sub awardee of the NSAM-ML2 award. This award is for Phase II of the *Consortium for Nuclear Security, Advanced Manufacturing Enhanced by Machine Learning* sponsored by NNSA-DOE and led by Elizabeth City State University (ECSU). The project will start on Oct. 1, 2023 and will end on Sept. 30, 2028. In this framework the consortium teams will partner with NNSA National Labs, which will support the research projects and the student training and summer internship programs. The annual budget for SUBR is \$170,000, the budget and the budget narrative have been submitted to ECSU.

The SUBR team will mainly be focused on developing nuclear radiation-resistant materials, which are mainly multi-component alloys for next generation nuclear reactor applications; these research goals and methods were proposed to MSIPP program under Project 6 (P6). The research will be performed through a close collaboration with the consortium faculty and staff, along with the CINT Gateway and the LANL Ion Beam Lab's staff scientists. Also, the team will collaborate with the computational team of the Center for Computing Research (CCR) at Sandia National Labs (SNL) on high performance computing using LAMMPS and DFT for modeling the complicated system simulation. We will use advanced computation resource at the SNL Supercomputing facility. Besides the major tasks in project P6, the SUBR team will work on P2 (T4), as well as P3 (T2), which include computer modeling of various aspects related to ion implantation experiment, where we will validate the nanoscale materials structure of Arc Melting process for micro- and nano-powder production, and chemical synthesis of high entropy alloys (HEA) and their characterization. The SUBR team will continue to provide support for the consortium, chiefly through data processing methods, including Machine Learning and other new methods that the SUBR's PI is envisioning. Junior faculty, postdoc staff, and students participating in this project, will be trained with the frontier-end research state-of-the-art facility and equipment, thereby laying a solid foundation for their future success.

The SUBR team leader, Dr. Yang, will be in charge of overall SUBR research and education activities, which will include: high performance computing for understanding the phase formation, defects and radiation resistance of new resistant materials (HEA, powder produced by Arc Melting, Ball Milling produced powders), machine learning to help rapidly validating or discovering new properties of these materials, experiment validation research, training, paper preparation, travel to conferences and workshop, and reports. Also as PI, Dr. Yang will be responsible on staff and student hiring as well as student engagement in research and training on research methods, and organization of summer internships.

Dr. Feng Gao, a co-investigator for the NSAM-ML2 will be responsible on materials computer simulation using density functional theory (DFT) and molecular dynamics (MD) LAMMPS. He will be also coordinating the work with the LBNL facility for preforming research using synchrotron XRD, and student training.

Dr. Lynette Jackson will be responsible for student recruiting, workshop, and outreach.

Prof. Shengmin Guo will be mainly focused on experiment synthesis (e.g. Arc Melting and spark plasma sintering (SPS)), characterization, and related student training.

Postdoc will mainly do simulation, ML and AI study on novel materials design and general experiment and safety training.

The SUBR contribution to the Consortium's milestones during this second phase are:

Milestone 1	Develop methods for simulating nanomaterials for advancing manufacturing methods,

Milestone 6 Sustained research training during academic year, summer internships at CINT, SNL, and LANL for maintaining a robust NNSA career pipeline.

# 1. Workforce Development and Student Career Pipeline:

- Education: This includes activities of mentoring students course works, teaching specialized courses with new course module(s) related to the NNSA fields.
- Research Training: This involves both in-campus research internships and summer internships in NNSA labs.
- Outreach: Hosting SUBR High School Day and Annual Symposium with topics closely related to NNSA science and technology fields.
- Both graduate and undergraduate students will be supported by the project to do state-of-the-art research. Students from SUBR will also collaborating with ECSU team and join LANL and SNL related training, and travel to the national labs to have hands-on training and on-site visiting.

Milestone (M5 & M6): Two graduate and one undergraduate students supported and trained per year; two course modules designed per year; two outreach events hosted per year.

# 2. Research Projects:

SUBR team will conduct DFT and MD simulation, ML study on developing novel high performance materials, then based on the prediction, synthesize the samples. The open-source big data tools TensorFlow and PyTorch will be employed to train the model. The computational data will be obtained by using an ab initio type molecular dynamic (MD) calculations and thermodynamics method to study the randomly distributed multi-component crystal metallic alloys through a slab model. The phase diagram calculation method (CALPHAD) will be used to support developing the stable alloys by calculating the possible stable single-phase alloys. One multicomponent alloy preparation route is mechanical alloying (MA) by ball milling and arc melting. The other route will be spark plasma sintering (SPS). Experiment validation will be conducted using XRD, ion implantation, SEM, and synchrotron XRD if the materials are potentially beneficial under pressure. - (3) Practical Application means to manufacture in the case of a composition or product, to practice in the case of a process or method, or to operate in the case of a machine or system; and, in each case, under such conditions as to establish that the invention is being utilized

and that its benefits are, to the extent permitted by law or government regulations, available to the public on reasonable terms.

- (4) Made when used in relation to any invention means the conception or first actual reduction to practice of such invention.
- (5) Small Business Firm means a small business concern as defined at section 2 of Pub. L. 85-536 (15 U.S.C. 632) and implementing regulations of the Administrator of the Small Business Administration. For the purpose of this clause, the size standards for small business concerns involved in government procurement and subcontracting at 13 CFR 121.3-8 and 13 CFR 121.3-12, respectively, will be used.
- (6) Nonprofit Organization means a university or other institution of higher education or an organization of the type described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (26 U.S.C. 501(c) and exempt from taxation under section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (25 U.S.C. 501(a)) or any nonprofit scientific or educational organization qualified under a state nonprofit organization statute.
- (7) The term statutory period means the one-year period before the effective filing date of a claimed invention during which exceptions to prior art exist per 35 U.S.C. 102(b) as amended by the Leahy-Smith America Invents Act, Public Law 112-29.

# (b) Allocation of Principal Rights

The Recipient may retain the entire right, title, and interest throughout the world to each subject invention subject to the provisions of this clause and 35 U.S.C. 203. With respect to any subject invention in which the Recipient retains title, the Federal government shall have a nonexclusive, nontransferable, irrevocable, paid-up license to practice or have practiced for or on behalf of the United States the subject invention throughout the world.

- (c) Invention Disclosure, Election of Title and Filing of Patent Application by Recipient
  - (1) The Recipient will disclose each subject invention to the Federal Agency within two months after the inventor discloses it in writing to Recipient personnel responsible for patent matters. The disclosure to the agency shall be in the form of a written report and shall identify the agreement under which the invention was made and the inventor(s). It shall be sufficiently complete in technical detail to convey a clear understanding to the extent known at the time of the disclosure, of the nature, purpose, operation, and the physical, chemical, biological or electrical characteristics of the invention. The disclosure shall also identify any publication, on sale or public use of the invention and whether a manuscript describing the invention has been submitted for publication and, if so, whether it has been accepted for publication at the time of disclosure. In addition, after disclosure to the agency, the Recipient will promptly notify the agency of the acceptance of any

manuscript describing the invention for publication or of any on sale or public use planned by the Recipient.

- (2) The Recipient will elect in writing whether or not to retain title to any such invention by notifying the Federal agency within two years of disclosure to the Federal agency. However, in any case where a patent, a printed publication, public use, sale, or other availability to the public has initiated the one year statutory period wherein valid patent protection can still be obtained in the United States, the period for election of title may be shortened by the agency to a date that is no more than 60 days prior to the end of the statutory period.
- (3) The Recipient will file its initial patent application on a subject invention to which it elects to retain title within one year after election of title or, if earlier, prior to the end of any statutory period wherein valid patent protection can be obtained in the United States after a publication, on sale, or public use. If the Recipient files a provisional application as its initial patent application, it shall file a non-provisional application within 10 months of the filing of the provisional application. The Recipient will file patent applications in additional countries or international patent offices within either ten months of the first filed patent application or six months from the date permission is granted by the Commissioner of Patents to file foreign patent applications where such filing has been prohibited by a Secrecy Order.
- (4) For any subject invention with Federal agency and Recipient co-inventors, where the Federal agency employing such co-inventor determines that it would be in the interest of the government, pursuant to 35 U.S.C. 207(a)(3), to file an initial patent application on the subject invention, the Federal agency employing such co-inventor, at its discretion and in consultation with the Recipient, may file such application at its own expense, provided that the Recipient retains the ability to elect title pursuant to 35 U.S.C. 202(a).
- (5) Requests for extension of the time for disclosure, election, and filing under paragraphs (1), (2), and (3) of this clause may, at the discretion of the Federal agency, be granted. When a Recipient has requested an extension for filing a non-provisional application after filing a provisional application, a one-year extension will be granted unless the Federal agency notifies the Recipient within 60 days of receiving the request.
- (d) Conditions When the Government May Obtain Title

The Recipient will convey to the Federal agency, upon written request, title to any subject invention -

- (1) If the Recipient fails to disclose or elect title to the subject invention within the times specified in paragraph (c) of this clause, or elects not to retain title.
- (2) In those countries in which the Recipient fails to file patent applications within the times specified in paragraph (c) of this clause; provided, however, that if the Recipient has filed

- a patent application in a country after the times specified in paragraph (c) of this clause, but prior to its receipt of the written request of the Federal agency, the Recipient shall continue to retain title in that country.
- (3) In any country in which the Recipient decides not to continue the prosecution of any non-provisional patent application for, to pay a maintenance, annuity or renewal fee on, or to defend in a reexamination or opposition proceeding on, a patent on a subject invention.
- (4) Upon breach of paragraph (m) U.S. Competitiveness on of this Patent Rights clause.
- (e) Minimum Rights to Recipient and Protection of the Recipient Right to File
  - (1) The Recipient will retain a nonexclusive royalty-free license throughout the world in each subject invention to which the Government obtains title, except if the Recipient fails to disclose the invention within the times specified in (c), above. The Recipient's license extends to its domestic subsidiary and affiliates, if any, within the corporate structure of which the Recipient is a party and includes the right to grant sublicenses of the same scope to the extent the Recipient was legally obligated to do so at the time the agreement was awarded. The license is transferable only with the approval of the Federal agency except when transferred to the successor of that party of the Recipient's business to which the invention pertains.
  - (2) The Recipient's domestic license may be revoked or modified by the funding Federal agency to the extent necessary to achieve expeditious practical application of the subject invention pursuant to an application for an exclusive license submitted in accordance with applicable provisions at 37 CFR part 404 and agency licensing regulations (if any). This license will not be revoked in that field of use or the geographical areas in which the Recipient has achieved practical application and continues to make the benefits of the invention reasonably accessible to the public. The license in any foreign country may be revoked or modified at the discretion of the funding Federal agency to the extent the Recipient, its licensees, or the domestic subsidiaries or affiliates have failed to achieve practical application in that foreign country.
  - (3) Before revocation or modification of the license, the funding Federal agency will furnish the Recipient a written notice of its intention to revoke or modify the license, and the Recipient will be allowed thirty days (or such other time as may be authorized by the funding Federal agency for good cause shown by the Recipient) after the notice to show cause why the license should not be revoked or modified. The Recipient has the right to appeal, in accordance with applicable regulations in 37 CFR part 404 and agency regulations (if any) concerning the licensing of Government-owned inventions, any decision concerning the revocation or modification of the license.
- (f) Recipient Action to Protect the Government's Interest

- (1) The Recipient agrees to execute or to have executed and promptly deliver to the Federal agency all instruments necessary to (i) establish or confirm the rights the Government has throughout the world in those subject inventions to which the Recipient elects to retain title, and (ii) convey title to the Federal agency when requested under paragraph (d) above and to enable the government to obtain patent protection throughout the world in that subject invention.
- (2) The Recipient agrees to require, by written agreement, its employees, other than clerical and nontechnical employees, to disclose promptly in writing to personnel identified as responsible for the administration of patent matters and in a format suggested by the Recipient each subject invention made under agreement in order that the Recipient can comply with the disclosure provisions of paragraph (c) of this clause, to assign to the Recipient the entire right, title and interest in and to each subject invention made under agreement, and to execute all papers necessary to file patent applications on subject inventions and to establish the government's rights in the subject inventions. This disclosure format should require, as a minimum, the information required by paragraph (c)(1) of this clause. The Recipient shall instruct such employees through employee agreements or other suitable educational programs on the importance of reporting inventions in sufficient time to permit the filing of patent applications prior to U.S. or foreign statutory bars.
- (3) For each subject invention, the Recipient will, no less than 60 days prior to the expiration of the statutory deadline, notify the Federal agency of any decision: Not to continue the prosecution of a non-provisional patent application; not to pay a maintenance, annuity or renewal fee; not to defend in a reexamination or opposition proceeding on a patent, in any country; to request, be a party to, or take action in a trial proceeding before the Patent Trial and Appeals Board of the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, including but not limited to post-grant review, review of a business method patent, inter partes review, and derivation proceeding; or to request, be a party to, or take action in a non-trial submission of art or information at the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, including but not limited to a pre-issuance submission, a post-issuance submission, and supplemental examination.
- (4) The Recipient agrees to include, within the specification of any United States patent applications and any patent issuing thereon covering a subject invention, the following statement, "This invention was made with government support under (identify the agreement) awarded by (identify the Federal agency). The government has certain rights in the invention."

# (g) Subawards

(1) The Recipient will include this clause, suitably modified to identify the parties, in all subawards, regardless of tier, for experimental, developmental or research work to be performed by a domestic small business firm or nonprofit organization. The subrecipient will retain all rights provided for the Recipient in this clause, and the Recipient will not, as part of

the consideration for awarding the subaward, obtain rights in the subrecipient's subject inventions.

(2) The Recipient will include in all other subawards, regardless of tier, for experimental developmental or research work the patent rights clause directed by the DOE Contracting Officer.

# (h) Reporting on Utilization of Subject Inventions

The Recipient agrees to submit on request periodic reports no more frequently than annually on the utilization of a subject invention or on efforts at obtaining such utilization that are being made by the Recipient or its licensees or assignees. Such reports shall include information regarding the status of development, date of first commercial sale or use, gross royalties received by the Recipient, and such other data and information as the agency may reasonably specify. The Recipient also agrees to provide additional reports as may be requested by the agency in connection with any march-in proceeding undertaken by the agency in accordance with paragraph (j) of this clause. As required by 35 U.S.C. 202(c)(5), the agency agrees it will not disclose such information to persons outside the government without permission of the Recipient.

# (i) Preference for United States Industry

Notwithstanding any other provision of this clause, the Recipient agrees that neither it nor any assignee will grant to any person the exclusive right to use or sell any subject inventions in the United States unless such person agrees that any products embodying the subject invention or produced through the use of the subject invention will be manufactured substantially in the United States. However, in individual cases, the requirement for such an agreement may be waived by the Federal agency upon a showing by the Recipient or its assignee that reasonable but unsuccessful efforts have been made to grant licenses on similar terms to potential licensees that would be likely to manufacture substantially in the United States or that under the circumstances domestic manufacture is not commercially feasible.

# (j) March-in Rights

The Recipient agrees that with respect to any subject invention in which it has acquired title, the Federal agency has the right in accordance with the procedures in 37 CFR 401.6 and any supplemental regulations of the agency to require the Recipient, an assignee or exclusive licensee of a subject invention to grant a nonexclusive, partially exclusive, or exclusive license in any field of use to a responsible applicant or applicants, upon terms that are reasonable under the circumstances, and if the Recipient, assignee, or exclusive licensee refuses such a request the Federal agency has the right to grant such a license itself if the Federal agency determines that:

- (1) Such action is necessary because the Recipient or assignee has not taken, or is not expected to take within a reasonable time, effective steps to achieve practical application of the subject invention in such field of use.
- (2) Such action is necessary to alleviate health or safety needs which are not reasonably satisfied by the Recipient, assignee or their licensees;
- (3) Such action is necessary to meet requirements for public use specified by Federal regulations and such requirements are not reasonably satisfied by the Recipient, assignee or licensees; or
- (4) Such action is necessary because the agreement required by paragraph (i) of this clause has not been obtained or waived or because a licensee of the exclusive right to use or sell any subject invention in the United States is in breach of such agreement.
- (k) Special Provisions for Agreements with Nonprofit Organizations

If the Recipient is a nonprofit organization, it agrees that:

- (1) Rights to a subject invention in the United States may not be assigned without the approval of the Federal agency, except where such assignment is made to an organization which has as one of its primary functions the management of inventions, provided that such assignee will be subject to the same provisions as the Recipient;
- (2) The Recipient will share royalties collected on a subject invention with the inventor, including Federal employee co-inventors (when the agency deems it appropriate) when the subject invention is assigned in accordance with 35 U.S.C. 202(e) and 37 37 CFR 401.10;
- (3) The balance of any royalties or income earned by the Recipient with respect to subject inventions, after payment of expenses (including payments to inventors) incidental to the administration of subject inventions, will be utilized for the support of scientific research or education; and
- (4) It will make efforts that are reasonable under the circumstances to attract licensees of subject inventions that are small business firms and that it will give a preference to a small business firm when licensing a subject invention if the Recipient determines that the small business firm has a plan or proposal for marketing the invention which, if executed, is equally as likely to bring the invention to practical application as any plans or proposals from applicants that are not small business firms; provided, that the Recipient is also satisfied that the small business firm has the capability and resources to carry out its plan or proposal. The decision whether to give a preference in any specific case will be at the discretion of the Recipient. However, the Recipient agrees that the Federal agency may review the Recipient's licensing program and decisions regarding small business applicants, and the Recipient will negotiate changes to its licensing policies, procedures, or practices with

the Federal agency when the Federal agency's review discloses that the Recipient could take reasonable steps to implement more effectively the requirements of this paragraph (k)(4). In accordance with 37 CFR 401.7, the Federal agency or the Recipient may request that the Secretary review the Recipient's licensing program and decisions regarding small business applicants.

# (I) Communication

Unless otherwise directed by DOE Patent Counsel, all reports and notifications required by this clause shall be submitted in accordance with the instructions provided in the Federal Assistance Reporting Checklist (FARC) of this agreement.

# (m) U.S. Competitiveness

The Recipient agrees that any products embodying any subject invention or produced through the use of any subject invention will be manufactured substantially in the United States unless the Recipient can show to the satisfaction of DOE that it is not commercially feasible. In the event DOE agrees to foreign manufacture, there will be a requirement that the Government's support of the technology be recognized in some appropriate manner, e.g., alternative binding commitments to provide an overall net benefit to the U.S. economy. The Recipient agrees that it will not license, assign or otherwise transfer any subject invention to any entity, at any tier, unless that entity agrees to these same requirements. In the event that the Recipient or other such entity receiving rights in the Subject Invention undergoes a change in ownership amounting to a controlling interest, the Recipient or other such entity receiving rights shall ensure continual compliance with the requirements of this paragraph (m) and shall inform DOE, in writing, of the change in ownership within six months of the change. The Recipient and any successor assignee will convey to DOE, upon written request from DOE, title to any subject invention, upon a breach of this paragraph (m). The Recipient will include this paragraph (m) in all subawards/contracts, regardless of tier, for experimental, developmental or research work.

- (n) The requirements, rights and administration of paragraph (m) are further clarified as follows:
  - 1. Waivers. The Recipient (or any entity subject to paragraph (m)) may request a waiver or modification of paragraph (m). Such waivers or modifications may be granted when DOE determines that (1) the Recipient (or any entity subject to paragraph (m)) has demonstrated, with quantifiable data, that manufacturing in the United States is not commercially feasible and (2) a waiver or modification would best serve the interests of the United States and the general public.
  - 2. Final determination of breach of paragraph (m). If DOE determines the Recipient is in breach of paragraph (m), the Department may issue a final written determination of such breach. If such determination includes a demand for title to the subject

inventions under the award, the demand for title will cause an immediate conveyance and assignment of all rights to all subject inventions under the award to the United States Government, including all pending U.S. and foreign patent applications and all U.S. and foreign patents that cover any subject invention, without compensation. Any such final determination shall be signed by the cognizant DOE Contracting Officer with the concurrence of the Assistant General Counsel for Technology Transfer & Intellectual Property. Advanced notice will be provided for comment to the Recipient before any final written determination by DOE is issued.

- 3. Pursuant to Recipient's agreement in paragraph (m) to not license, assign or otherwise transfer rights to subject inventions at any tier unless the entity agrees to paragraph (m): any such license, assignment, or other transfer of right to any subject invention developed under the award shall contain paragraph (m) suitably modified to properly identify the parties. If a licensee, assignee, or other transferee of rights to any subject invention is finally determined by DOE in writing to be in breach of paragraph (m), the applicable license, assignment or other transfer shall be deemed null and void. Advanced notice will be provided for comment to the non-complying party before any final written determination by DOE is made.
- 4. For clarity, if the forfeiture of title to any subject invention is due to a breach of paragraph (m), the Recipient shall not be entitled to any compensation, or to a license to the subject invention including the reserved license in section (e)(1), unless DOE grants a license through a separately agreed upon licensing agreement.
- 5. Authority. The requirements and administration of paragraph (m) is in accordance with the Determination of Exceptional Circumstances (DEC) under the Bayh-Dole Act to Further Promote Domestic Manufacture of DOE Science and Energy Technologies executed by DOE on June 7, 2021. A copy of the DEC is available at https://www.energy.gov/gc/determination-exceptional-circumstances-decs. By accepting or acknowledging the award, the Recipient is also acknowledging that it has received a copy of the DEC through the foregoing link. As set forth in 37 CFR 401.4, any nonprofit organization or small business firm as defined by 35 U.S.C. 201 affected by any DEC has the right to appeal the imposition of the DEC within thirty (30) working days from the Recipient's acceptance or acknowledgement of this award.

  - b. Recipient Name (as it appears on the award face page)
  - c. Project Title

  - f. Project Period (Start Date, End Date)
  - g. Report Submission Date

- 2. GOALS AND OBJECTIVES: A written comparison of the actual project accomplishments with the project goals and objectives established for the reporting period; if goals and/or objectives for the reporting period were not met, a detailed description of the variance shall be provided.
- 3. ACCOMPLISHMENTS: A discussion of what was accomplished under these goals and objectives established for this reporting period, including major activities, significant results, major findings or conclusions, key outcomes or other achievements. This section should not contain any proprietary data or other information not subject to public release. If such information is important to reporting progress, do not include the information, but include a note in the report advising the reader to contact the Principal Investigator or the Project Director for further information.
- 4. COST STATUS: A comparison of the approved budget by budget period and the actual costs incurred during the reporting period shall be provided. If cost sharing is required, the cost breakdown shall show the DOE share, recipient share, and total costs.

- 5. SCHEDULE STATUS: List milestones, anticipated completion dates and actual completion dates. If you submitted a project management plan with your application, you must use this plan to report schedule and budget variances. You may use your own project management system to provide this information.
- 6. PROJECT CHANGES: Describe any changes during the reporting period in project approach and the reasons for these changes. Remember, significant changes to the project objectives and scope require prior approval by the Contracting Officer.
- 7. ISSUES/DELAYS: Describe any actual or anticipated problems or delays and any actions taken or planned to resolve them.

#### **Special Status Report**

PII is defined as any information about an individual which can be used to distinguish or trace an individual's identity. Some information that is considered to be PII is available in *public* sources such as telephone books, public websites, university listings, etc. This type of information is considered to be Public PII and includes, for example, first and last name, address, work telephone number, email address, home telephone number, and general educational credentials. The Recipient should NOT submit the journal's published version of the article, i.e., the Recipient should NOT submit a copyrighted reprint. The Recipient should not submit the content of peer reviews or a commitment to publish. The Recipient should provide only the accepted manuscript content intended to be the published article.

DOE will make no additional review of the content of an AM because the AM is a version of the journal article with the content to be published (i.e., publicly released) by the journal publisher. The Recipient is responsible for ensuring the suitability of the content for public release. The terms and conditions of award provide that PII, proprietary, export control or classified information shall be protected. DOE may choose to defer providing public access until an administrative interval period has passed.

The Recipient must self-certify at the time of submission to DOE via E-Link that the content is appropriate and that it is not a copyrighted reprint, i.e., the final version of the published article. Recipients are reminded that the article is to include an acknowledgement of Federal support and a disclaimer.

<u>Electronic Submission Process.</u> The Journal Article-Accepted Manuscript must be announced via the DOE Energy Link System (E-Link) by submitting a completed DOE Announcement Notice (AN) 241.3 (https://www.osti.gov/elink-2413).

Within the AN 241.3, provide relevant journal information (article title, journal name, volume, issue, and any other pertinent publication information). Also provide a persistent link to the repository location of the accepted manuscript. An example of an acceptable persistent link is a URL to the specific location of the Journal Article-Accepted Manuscript hosted on a public, openly accessible university research publications website. If a persistent link is not available or if the website has access restrictions (preventing public access), then the Recipient must upload the full-text of the Accepted Manuscript using the AN 241.3 and E-Link instructions.

Full-text of accepted manuscripts must be in Adobe Portable Document Format (PDF) and be one integrated PDF file that contains all text, tables, diagrams, photographs, schematics, graphs, and charts. Please refer to <a href="http://www.osti.gov/stip/best-practices-portable-document-format-pdf-creation">http://www.osti.gov/stip/best-practices-portable-document-format-pdf-creation</a> for PDF document creation.

### b. Scientific/Technical Conference Paper/Presentation or Proceedings

Recipients are encouraged to announce Scientific and Technical Conference Papers/Presentations if they are the primary means by which certain research results are disseminated or if they contain research results not already announced to DOE by the Recipient in technical reports, accepted journal articles, or other STI. This Reporting Requirement will be denoted with the Frequency "O – Other" on the Checklist. Instructions for how to announce such STI can be found below. In cases where the Recipient is required to create and submit a Conference Proceedings, the Frequency will be "F – Final."

<u>Content</u>. The content should include: (1) Name of conference; (2) Location of conference; (3) Date of conference; and (4) Conference sponsor. Also include an acknowledgement of Federal support and a disclaimer.

DOE will not review conference papers or presentations prior to making publicly available via OSTI since they were already presented in a public setting during a conference. The Recipient is responsible for ensuring the suitability of the content for public release. The terms and conditions of award provide that PII, proprietary, export control or classified information shall be protected. The Recipient must self-certify at the time of submission to DOE via E-Link that the content is appropriate for and has been publicly released.

Scientific/technical conference papers or proceedings that are textual documents must be submitted in Adobe Portable Document Format (PDF) and be one integrated PDF file that contains all text, tables, diagrams, photographs, schematics, graphs, and charts. Please refer to <a href="http://www.osti.gov/stip/best-practices-portable-document-format-pdf-creation">http://www.osti.gov/stip/best-practices-portable-document-format-pdf-creation</a> for PDF document creation. Audiovisual formats, such as PowerPoint (PPT) or video presentations, may be submitted as a Microsoft PPT file or audiovisual file by selecting the appropriate format on the AN 241.3 for the file to be uploaded or, in the case of videos posted on a publicly available website, by providing a link to the specific video. Format options and other instructions can be found at <a href="http://www.osti.gov/stip/audiovisualsti">http://www.osti.gov/stip/audiovisualsti</a>.

#### c. Scientific/Technical Software & Manual

<u>Content</u>. When a Recipient submits software to OSTI for dissemination, the following must be delivered: source code, the executable object code and the minimum support documentation needed by a competent user to understand and use the software and to be able to modify the software in subsequent development efforts, unless otherwise specified in the award.

#### d. Other STI

Recipients are encouraged to announce other forms of STI especially if they are the primary means by which certain research results are disseminated or if they contain research results not already announced to DOE by the Recipient in technical reports, accepted journal articles, or other STI. This Reporting Requirement will be denoted with the Frequency "O — Other" on the Checklist.

Other types of STI produced which may be for used for public dissemination of project results include: dissertation/thesis, patent, book, or other similar products. These types of STI may also be announced using DOE AN 241.3 by following instructions on the E-Link website (http://www.osti.gov/elink-2413).

#### 2. Final Scientific/Technical Report

For R&D type awards where a Final Scientific/Technical Report is required, recipients are required to create and submit a final technical report. This Reporting Requirement will be denoted with the Frequency "F – Final" on the Federal Assistance Reporting Checklist.

- c. Provide identifying information: the DOE award number; sponsoring program office; name of recipient; project title; name of project director/principal investigator; and consortium/teaming members.
- d. Include an acknowledgment of Federal support and a disclaimer, which must appear in the publication of any material as noted in the terms and conditions.
- e. Include any limitations on public release of the report, if applicable. If the document being submitted contains patentable material or protected data (i.e., data first produced

in the performance of the award that is protected from public release for a period of time by terms of the award agreement, e.g., SBIR protected data), then (1) prominently display on the cover of the report any authorized distribution limitation notices, such as patentable material or protected data (e.g., SBIR protected data) and (2) clearly identify patentable or protected data on each page of the report. Reports delivered without such notices may be deemed to have been furnished with unlimited rights, and the Government assumes no liability for the disclosure, use or reproduction of such reports. Any restrictive markings must also be noted in the distribution limitation section of the Announcement Notice (AN) 241.3 (see Electronic Submission Process, below). No protected PII should be included (see PII definition).
