These funds will be used to develop an academy to support student research in viticulture and enology, continue faculty development, the establishment of a concentration or minor in viticulture for SU students; the development a bioprocessing facility that would be used for research development and wine making; the creation of a Chancellor's Research Apprentice Program with a track for viticulture; Junior MANRRS Club for students in grades 7-12; and
a statewide Ag in the Classroom Curriculum for $\mathrm{K}-12$ students.

The McBride Sisters Collection Wines SHE CAN Fund was established in 2019 and creates greater opportunity for women and people of color in the wine making industry. Last year, the McBride Sisters presented funds to the Ag Center and the College for the purpose of research, career exploration and development, and other opportunities.

Matador Spirits and Legacy House Media also pledged $\$ 250,000$ to the Center and the

College during the meeting. Through this new partnership, Matador will provide support for the creation of distilling and

# Southern University Research \& Teaching Faculty Awarded \$150,000 from the USDA-NRCS 

Southern University research professors Drs. LaShunda Hodges, Jacqueline McComb, and Crystal Vance have been awarded a $\$ 150,000$ grant from the United States Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS).

The grant is a cooperative agreement to assess the soil health status of urban soils affected by flooding near the Southern University Baton Rouge campus to support climate-smart agriculture and soil health initiatives. It will integrate climate-smart agriculture technologies and techniques for the management of dynamic soil properties of urban soils at the Southern University campus and Southern University Ag Center's Research Farm that were impacted by the 2016 Mississippi River
 Flood. This grant will also prepare Southern University agriculture students to become the next generation of soil scientists seeking careers with the USDA-NRCS.

## SU Ag Center holds Medical Marijuana Educational Tour in New Orleans

Terrence Ferguson, DVM, one of the Nat Geo Wild's famous veterinarian duo in the show, Critter Fixers: Country Vets, visited the Southern University campus on November 4 as a part of the show's Vet for a Day college tour.
The event was open to Southern University College of Agricultural, Family and Consumer Sciences students, high school students, and veterinary and agricultural professionals.

Dr. Ferguson began his presentation by deputizing the students into official veterinarians during his 35-40 minute presentation titled, "Case Study, Veterinary Medicine: What's It All About?" He then introduced the students to their first patient, an 8 -year-old Maltese who was suffering from frequent urination.

The students were asked if they could name the medical instruments needed to examine the animal, the organs that were not functioning properly, and the proper steps that needed to be taken to diagnose the animal. Ferguson also showed the students an x-ray of the dog to
see if anyone could spot anything unusual. After viewing the x-ray, the students asked Ferguson to explain what the cauliflower-shaped image was in the x-ray. He explained that the image showed the dog had bladder stones or Urolithiasis. He went on to discuss the treatment for the animal and held and a question and answers session with the students.

Ferguson also participated in a panel discussion with College of Ag alums Tyra Davis Brown, DVM, Associate Professor of Animal Science in the CAFCS, Renita Marshall, DVM, Vice Chancellor for Academic \& Student Services/ Associate Dean College of Agricultural, Family and Consumer Sciences, and Ted Sanders, DVM. The panelists shared personal experiences about why they wanted to become veterinarians, how they overcame some of the challenges they faced, and provided tips for students who were interested in going to a school of veterinary medicine.

Dr. Sanders also discussed Zoetis and Henry Green, DVM, Associate Professor of Veterinary Cardiology at the LSU School of Veterinary

Medicine spoke to the students about the summer Diversity Experience for students interested in careers in Vet Med and how they can get involved. Several SU students who participated in the program also shared their experiences and demonstrated how to do CPA on a dog.

The event concluded with the students visiting several College of Ag and SU Ag Center booths that contained information about degree programs and opportunities available through the Ag Center.

## Sharing My Experiences in Graduate School: A ROADMAP TO SUCCESS

This article was written by Urban Forestry Master's student Abigail Yeboah and Urban Forestry Assistant Professor in Urban Forestry/Entomology and Pathology Dr. Veronica Manrique. Yeboah received her Master's degree in Urban Forestry on December 9, 2022.

As an international student originally from Ghana, I was excited to travel abroad to advance my education and pursue my Master's in Urban Forestry at Southern University. Arriving in a new country in the middle of a pandemic, Spring 2021, was not easy to say the least. With mostly virtual classes and social distance, the interactions with other students and professors were limited. During this time, I decided to focus on my courses and learned about the different areas in my field of study.

In August 2021, I joined the Entomology Laboratory under the advisement of Dr. Veronica Manrique to conduct research on invasive species. This was a new topic for me but extremely interesting, and looking back, it completely changed my career path. Immediately, I started working on my research which involved laboratory and field studies on a specialist leaf beetle (Lilioceris cheni) that feeds on the invasive vine, air potato. I didn't know much about the biological control of pests or how insects can be used to manage invasive weeds. I learned to use laboratory equipment to measure insect's thermal limits,
 maintained insect colonies and plants in the greenhouse, assessed the beetle's impact in the field, assisted other students in sampling insects in pine forests and in the restoration of native communities in BREC parks.

As I completed my courses and worked on my research, I had many opportunities for career growth with the guidance of my advisor. I was able to attend four scientific conferences

at the state, national and international level I also presented a poster at the Louisiana Society of American Foresters (LA-SAF) in Alexandria, LA where I won the first-place award in the Graduate Student Competition in September 2021. I then attended, for the first time, the Annual Meeting of the Entomological Society of America (ESA) in Denver, CO in November 2021. This was an incredible experience, my first time in such a large meeting with more than 2,000 attendees. The next year, I traveled to Puerto Rico to present my research at the Southeastern Branch of ESA and obtained Training in new skills and techniques was
the first-place award in the Master's Student Competition in March 2022. My next trip was international, I participated in the ESA Joint Annual Meeting in Vancouver, Canada in November 2022. By attending all these meetings, I was able to improve my oral skills, learn about the research being conducted in other Universities, and networked with my peers. The awards and recognitions gave me more confidence and determination to continue advancing my career in Urban Forestry focusing on Entomology.
mportant for my career growth. I was introduced to the Professional Advancement Career Training (PACT) initiative by my advisor. This is a virtual 6-month mentorship program organized by ESA for early career students. I was assigned to a mentor who provided information about career opportunities in different Entomology fields. In addition, attended monthly webinars oriented towards career development, and discussion of jobs available in Industry and Academia. In the summer of 2022 , I spent three-days at the USDA Forest Service in Athens, Georgia training in insect mounting and identification. was able to meet with scientists from the Forest Service and University of Georgia, visit several laboratories and facilities, and gained laboratory techniques to prepare insect collections. At my return, I had a better appreciation of the importance of preserving specimens for identification and to use for future reference. A few months later, I applied and received a scholarship for a week-long leadership training with the Municipal Forest Institute in Ohio in September 2022. This was an intense training which involved the preparation of oral presentations, working in small groups, and improving personal skills to better lead an organization. The prior experience gained from the PACT program helped me to better communicate and interact with other professionals in Urban Forestry and related fields.

Finally, I was involved in several outreach activities to showcase the Urban Forestry program and encourage our younger generations to continue careers in environmenta sciences. I assisted in preparing materials and attractive infographics using the software Canvas to teach kids about insects. I participated in summer camps with elementary and middle school students organized by Southern University and the Southern University Lab School. I also helped with the recruitment of high school students during the SU College of Agricultural, Family and Consumer Sciences BAYOU programs and in large exhibitions at the Raising Canes River Center. All these activities further improved my communication and interpersonal skills and give me the chance to share with others my career interests and personal experiences. I am grateful for every single one of these opportunities, and the great mentors encountered on the way. The future looks bright!
