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## The Joint Senate and House Committee on Agriculture, Forestry, Aquaculture, and Rural Development Visits the SU Ag Center

Members of the Louisiana Joint Senate and House Committee on Agriculture, Forestry, Aquaculture, and Rural Development visited the Southern University Ag Center on May 25, 2023.

The visit began at the Valdry Center for Philanthropy where Dr. Katara Williams, Vice Chancellor for Institutional Advancement and External Relations, presided over the program and President-Chancellor Dennis Shields welcomed the legislators.

Dr. Orlando F. McMeans, Chancellor-Dean of the Southern

University Ag Center and College of Agriculture provided opening remakes and was followed by presentations from Drs. Renita Marshall, Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Services in the College of Ag; Jose Toledo, Vice Chancellor for Research; De'Shoin A. York, Vice Chancellor for Extension and Outreach; and Calvin R. Walker, Executive Vice Chancellor on their respective areas.

Dr. McMeans also explained the 1890 Land-Grant designation, mission, and the Ag Center's legislative priorities.

At the conclusion of the program, the legislators boarded a shuttle and toured the Ag Center's facilities and roads making stops at A. O. Williams Hall, the meat lab, and poultry and swine units. The tour ended at the M. A. Edmond Livestock Arena Multi-Purpose Building where faculty, staff, and students from the teaching, research, and extension areas discussed programs and projects with the legislators.

#### \$1M National Science Foundation Grant to Fund Planning for Initiative to Improve Health, Economy in Delta Region

A coalition of organizations in Louisiana, Arkansas, and Mississippi will use a \$1 million grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to promote improved and equitable health and economic outcomes in the Mississippi Delta regions of those states, the Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center (SU Ag Center) announced Thursday, May 11.

The Arkansas Center for Health Improvement is the recipient of the planning grant, entitled NSF Engines Development Award: Advancing Equitable Access to Food and Health Technologies in the Delta. ACHI will lead the tri-state effort, partnering with the SU Ag Center and the Arkansas Rural Health Partnership, the Mississippi-based Delta Health Alliance, Mississippi-based HOPE (Hope Enterprise Corporation, Hope Credit Union, and Hope Policy Institute), and the Louisiana Public Health Institute.

"The Mississippi Delta region faces many longstanding challenges, including inadequate food availability, high rates of chronic disease, and limited health care access," said Dr. De'Shoin A. York, Vice Chancellor for Extension and Outreach at the SU Ag Center. "This is a transformational investment in the region, and we hope this first joint effort of partners in Louisiana, Arkansas, and Mississippi will lead to solutions that will improve health and economic outcomes for these communities," she added.

The coalition intends to spend up to 18 months developing a plan for an initiative that will harness the region's strengths to address its key disparities. ACHI will then apply for additional NSF funding to implement the initiative, which the coalition expects to focus on three areas:

- 1. Development and testing of new telehealth models and digital tools that can be embedded in the home and across rural clinical and pharmacy sites, taking advantage of modern advances in machine learning, artificial intelligence, and data science. The initiative will also provide the resources and infrastructure to train and increase fluency in virtual care among healthcare professionals, community health workers, and patients.
- 2. Development of more effective methods for the production, distribution, and accessibility of fresh, healthy food, including the development of new business models that integrate food as medicine with existing and emerging healthcare delivery, and advancements in precision agriculture.
- 3. Design, development, and manufacture of over-the-counter or pharmacy-administered diagnostic materials and therapeutics, with a focus on innovations, advancements, and infrastructure that improve health care for underserved populations.

The grant is part of NSF's Regional Innovation Engines program. Authorized by the CHIPS and Science Act of 2022, the program is designed to reach geographic areas that have not fully benefited from the technology boom of the past decades. "These NSF Engines Development Awards lay the foundation for emerging hubs of innovation and potential future NSF Engines," said NSF Director Sethuraman Panchanathan. "These awardees are part of the fabric of NSF's vision to create opportunities everywhere and enable innovation anywhere. They will build robust regional partnerships rooted in scientific and technological innovation in every part of our nation. Through these planning awards, NSF is seeding the future for in-place innovation in communities and growing their regional economies through research and partnerships. This will unleash ideas, talent, pathways, and resources to create vibrant innovation ecosystems all across our nation."

DANGERS OF MENTHOL VIRTUAL PRESENTATION

The Southern University Ag Center's Communities of Color Network (CoC) hosted a virtual presentation, Dangers of Menthol, in partnership with Project ASIRT, a Robert Wood Johnson funded organization on May 17, 2023.

The CoC team's presentation highlighted the addictive and dangerous nature of menthol cigarettes. Menthol is a chemical compound that provides a cooling or numbing sensation in the mouth or throat when inhaled. African Americans have a higher prevalence of smoking menthol cigarettes compared to other racial and ethnic groups in the United States. Menthol cigarettes are more addictive than non-menthol cigarettes, and research has shown that they are more difficult to quit. According to the CDC, nearly 85% of African American smokers use menthol cigarettes. This high prevalence of menthol use has led to higher rates of tobaccorelated disease and death in the African American community compared to other groups.

The marketing of menthol cigarettes to the Black community has been a major factor contributing to this disparity. Historically, tobacco companies aggressively targeted this community with advertisements featuring popular Black celebrities and public figures, and sponsoring events and concerts in predominantly Black neighborhoods.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has recognized the impact of menthol cigarettes on the African American community and has taken steps to address the issue. In 2021, the agency announced plans to ban menthol cigarettes and flavored cigars. Attorney Christopher Leung was the lead litigator on this remarkable effort. Attorney Leong is a Partner at Pollock Cohen LLP-a New York Law Firm focused on public impact litigation, whistleblower actions, and complex litigation. Attorney Leong joined CoC to speak more about his personal journey with tobacco and his landmark litigation going up against the FDA.

"A very special thanks to our partners from the Southern University Ag Center's Communities of Color Network for putting together such an informative and engaging presentation," Stephanie Kennedy's, ASIRT Project Manager. "And another special thanks to Attorney Christopher Leung for joining CoC to share his journey in going up against the FDA to advocate for the ban of menthol and flavored tobacco products to improve the health and lives of Black communities."

#### Mansura's Community Health Day

Members of the Avoyelles Parish community gathered at the Cochon De Lait Center in Mansura, LA on May 18, 2023 for a community health day focused on senior health. In partnership with the All of Us Research Program, this event hosted many activities, health screenings, and informational tables to promote healthy living among the elderly.

"The Southern University Ag Center strives to link all citizens of Louisiana with opportunities for success, and this is one way we do that," said Jasmin Mathews, SU Ag Center Public Health Specialist. "With a special focus on our seniors for this Community Health Event, we recognize they are the pillars of all communities around our state. They face unique health concerns, and there can be many barriers that prevent them from addressing those issues. We lessen some of these barriers by meeting them where they are and bringing much need resources and services to the heart of their community."

With 160 participants, this event was a one-stop shop for seniors to receive vaccines, blood pressure checks, and glucose checks. They were also able to speak with representatives about Medicare, senior housing, and social services. Seniors were able to learn about ways to stay healthy and active and were connected with resources in their community that could help them live independently and

comfortably. The event was a testament to the power of community and collaboration in promoting healthy living.

"When it's your job to help people, you have clear evidence every day that you're making a difference," stated Camellia Brown, SU Ag Center Extension Agent for Avoyelles Parish. "Plus, like most people of any age, seniors appreciate and look forward to opportunities for laughter and conversation. Studies also show that seniors participate more in activities where they can socially interact with similar age groups in the same communities. My job allows for me to make that possible along with providing the resources and information needed."

The All of Us Research Program is part of the broader Precision Medicine initiative that aims to collect data from one million or more people living in the U.S., to help build one of the most diverse health databases in history. Researchers will use data to learn how our biology, lifestyle, and environmental factors affect a person's health.
