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#### Dr. Orlando McMeans Discussed Academic Programs During the National SU Alumni Federation Panel

Dr. Orlando F. McMeans, Chancellor-Dean of the Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center and the College of Agricultural, Human and Environmental Sciences, participated in the Chancellor's Panel during the National Southern University Alumni Federation on June 28, 2024, in the Cotillion Ballroom of the Smith-Brown Memorial Union, along with the chancellors from throughout the Southern System.

During the panel, Dr. McMeans discussed the College of Ag's enrollment increase and was asked to highlight two academic programs.

He highlighted the area of environmental sciences and explained its importance.

"Our focus is on climate-smart commodities because of climate change. The foods that we grow up north. You can't grow them there anymore," explained Dr. McMeans. "So we are looking at genetic engineering and cross-breeding. We have created a whole new area that's not only Academic, we also have the Research area, as well as, the Outreach component. We have a request into Congress for \$100 million, along with our counterparts at LSU, to have the first climatesmart facility in the area," he expressed.

Dr. McMeans also mentioned the Enology and Viticulture Program.

"We are able to grow grape plants that would never grow in this part of the state. Through breeding and genetic engineering, we now have those grapes growing in our orchid right how at the Southern University Ag Center," he added. In addition to the College of Ag, Dr. McMeans also spoke about the recent changes to the state's medical marijuana program.

"There were some challenges during the last session as it relates to the licenses for Southern University and LSU," he stated. "Due to the legislation, the licenses for each of the universities was removed and LDH is now in charge of those licenses and they will go directly to the growers. The first HBCU to be in this space is no longer there as it relates to medicinal marijuana. However, we are and will continue to work in the area of research."

He went on to say that the Ag Center has partnered with other HBCUs because we have been in that space a lot longer.

"We have great research. One of the islands in St. Kitts is in the process of developing a research lab for the Ag Center. We will continue to work with medicinal cannabis, and we will go on to work with other Caribbean Islands. So some good has come out of it," said Dr. McMeans.

The panel ended with each chancellor discussing ways alumni can assist the five campuses of the Southern University System. The chancellors each echoed the need for scholarship dollars for their students and reminded the alumni of the System's current Million Dollar March on August 30, 2024. #### SU Ag Students and Faculty Members Participate In An International Trip to China

Seven Southern University College of Agricultural, Human and Environmental Sciences (CAHES) students and two faculty members were among over 1,000 participants from 28 countries and regions who participated in the 2024 Global Youth Conference & China-U.S. Youth Camp.

The conference, which was themed "Sharing Youth, Enjoying the Future," was held in Beijing, China from July 11-24, 2024.

The students, Tyler Jackson, a senior pre-veterinary medicine major; Georrein Dupre, a graduate student in Environmental Toxicology; Sterling Brown, a senior AgriBusiness major; Yasmyne Wells, a graduate student in Environmental Toxicology; Jude Robert, a sophomore AgriBusiness major; Nyasha Sims, a senior Child Studies major; and Evan Egana, a graduate student in the Dietetic Internship Program are being accompanied by Alexis Motley, CAHES Dietetic Internship Director/ Instructor; and Keandrys Dalton, CAHES Student Support Coordinator.

Each student was recommended to attend the conference by one of their professors. Many of the students stated they were shocked when they received the news that they had been nominated to go to China.

"Finals week started on campus and I had four of my finals on a Monday," recounted Jude Robert about the day he learned he had been recommended to go on the trip. "On that day I was walking across campus to get lunch when I received a phone call from Ms. Dalton and right before I picked up the phone I told one of my friends, 'I just need to go study and I keep getting phone calls and I don't know what's going on," he added with a laugh.

Members of the group also expressed their excitement for the opportunity and what they planned to gain from the experience.

"I'm most excited about hearing the different languages and trying to learn something more than just saying hello in Chinese," expressed Nyasha Sims. "I'm interested in going down the clinical psychology route so how people talk to each other and interact with each other is a major interest of mine."

"As a dietitian, I'm excited to see what other countries are doing as it comes to food, especially on the nutrition side but I also want to bring back some healthy recipes that we can tweak here at the Ag



Center and put our own spin on it when Café Lacumba reopens," said Alexia Motley.

Keandrys Dalton also expressed her thankfulness for this opportunity. Dalton was able to participate in a study-abroad program to Brazil while attending Southern University.

"Once I graduated, I knew I wanted to work with students and show students the world," she stated. "I'm glad our students will be able to experience this opportunity because it doesn't come around every day."

Although most of the students were excited to go on the international trip, the recommendation did come with some apprehension for one of the students.

"I was very hesitant when Mrs. Motley told me because I have a six-year-old and I'm a single parent," said Evan Egana. "The thought of me going away from my daughter for two weeks almost made me have a full-blown panic attack."

Egana said that after Motley reassured her that everything will be okay and her family told her that they would care for her daughter while she was away, she felt better about the opportunity.

"I just want her to know that anything is possible and if you have a dream you can do it," stated Egana.

Additional topics of interest for the students included learning about Chinese culture, their agricultural practices, logistics and supply chain, trade, foreign policies, import and export system, international networking, and food/cooking culture.

During the conference, students engaged in cultural exchange and friendship-building, learned about Shandong's history through lectures, participated in workshops covering topics such as e-commerce and traditional Chinese music, visited several landmarks such as the Great Wall of China, and participated in interactive activities such as E-Games and tree planting.

The CAHES group was a part of a 71-student delegation from universities throughout Louisiana participating in the conference.

Students from China will also have an opportunity to travel to the United States in the winter through this program.

#### SU Ag Center and College of Ag Professors Presented Research Findings at the Southern Regional Cooperative Soil Survey Conference

SU Ag Center research professor Dr. Lashunda Hodges and CAHES faculty members Drs. Jacqueline McComb and Crystal Vance presented their collaborative research on soil health at the 2024 Regional Cooperative Soil Survey Conference. The conference was held at the Louisiana Immersive Technologies Enterprise (LITE) Center on the campus of the University of Louisiana at Lafayette May 21-25, 2024.

This year's regional conference theme was "Our Soils, Our Heritage." Conference events included local field tours, oral and poster presentations, and sessions from the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) leadership while providing an opportunity



to connect with fellow soil scientists, re-evaluate activities of the National Cooperative Soil Survey, and learn about the soils and landscapes of South Louisiana.

Participation in the conference was a component of the \$150,000 award from the USDA-NRCS cooperative agreement to assess the soil health status of urban soils affected by flooding at the Southern University Baton Rouge campus.

#### The SU Ag Center Is Conducting a Research Project On Bagasse With Impact Fusion International, Inc.

The Southern University Ag Center has begun a research project on the use of bagasse as a cattle feed with Impact Fusion International Inc. (IFUS).

Bagasse is a waste byproduct of sugarcane. For years, cattle farmers have been trying to find an innovative way to feed it to cattle.

Since May 10, 2024, a team of researchers from the SU Ag Center has been studying why cattle are drawn to IFUS' Supreme Gold Plus (SGP+ $^{\text{M}}$ ) and sugarcane bagasse feed and how they are benefitting from it.

"Lignin was thought to be indigestible," said Dr. Pat Bagley, Director of Beef Cattle Research at the SU Ag Center. "What we think is happening here is the blend is making the lignin pull apart and become digestible, which we haven't seen happen before. In a drought like we had last year, bagasse can be a valuable replacement for hay. We currently have about five million tons of leftover sugarcane bagasse, and we need to find a useful product for it", he added.

The feed also addresses environmental concerns. The accumulation of manure in one area over weeks has been studied to observe the reduction in odor and the reduction of flies.

The Ag Center's research team will continue to analyze the herd score of the cattle being feed IFUS' Supreme Gold Plus.


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
