QEM NETWORK SOUTHERN REGIONAL OFFICE TO OPEN IN BATON ROUGE; PARTNERSHIP WITH SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY TO EXPAND RESEARCH OPPORTUNITIES



The Quality Education for Minorities (QEM) Network, in partnership with Southern University has announced the opening of its Southern Regional Office on the Southern University Baton Rouge campus.

QEM Network, a national leader in advancing equity in research and development, and Southern University, recognized for conducting research to address scientific, technological, socioeconomic, and cultural challenges, will co-locate the office to strengthen the national research and development position of Southern and other Louisiana-based minority-serving institutions (MSIs) and community colleges.

This co-location will expand Southern's collaborative research capacity by providing direct engagement with QEM's technical expertise in grant development, proposal writing, and evaluation. The new office will also broaden faculty and student access to national research initiatives and opportunities.

As a strategic hub for MSIs, QEM will help Southern and its partners form competitive multi-institutional collaborations, attract federal funding, and align with emerging research priorities in areas such as STEM, artificial intelligence, education, and agriculture.

The partnership also seeks to amplify workforce development, support entrepreneurship among underrepresented groups, and foster community engagement through inclusive innovation programs. Hosting the QEM Southern Regional Office on campus enhances the university's research competitiveness, builds institutional capacity, and underscores its commitment to empowering historically Black colleges and universities while advancing inclusive excellence in the national research ecosystem. DEPARTMENT OF COMPUTER SCIENCE HOSTED ROBOTICS & AI CAMP FOR MIDDLE, HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS THIS SUMMER



The Department of Computer Science successfully hosted the Robotics & AI Camp this summer, providing middle and high school students with a free, weeklong opportunity to explore robotics and artificial intelligence through hands-on activities and mentorship.

Now in its seventh year, the camp, traditionally focused on robotics, expanded its curriculum to include artificial intelligence. This addition gave students more opportunities to engage with emerging technologies and apply critical thinking skills in real-world contexts.

Participants took part in interactive lessons, lab activities, and collaborative team projects designed to spark their interest in STEM fields. Activities included building robots, conducting AI experiments, engaging in creative challenges, and attending speaker sessions led by industry professionals and academic experts.

"The goal of the camp was to inspire the next generation of innovators by demystifying AI and robotics, promoting digital literacy, and increasing representation of underrepresented students in STEM," said Dr. Lynette Jackson, associate professor of computer science. "Through mentorship, exposure, and hands-on learning, we showed students that STEM is creative, collaborative, and accessible."

The camp welcomed students ages 11 to 17 from the Metropolitan Baton Rouge region across two sessions: July 7–11 for ages 11–13 & July 14–18 for ages 14–17. Each day ran from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in Henry Thurman, Jr. Hall, Rooms N204 and N205. Both sessions concluded with student presentations, where participants proudly showcased the robots and AI projects they developed during the week.

The 2025 Robotics & AI Camp continued the university's mission of inspiring the next generation of STEM leaders while building a stronger pipeline of diverse students prepared for careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

CONGRESSMAN TROY A. CARTER, SR. DELIVERED KEYNOTE ADDRESS AT SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY EXECUTIVE PHD HOODING CEREMONY

On Friday, August 1st, Congressman Troy A. Carter, Sr. addressed candidates for the Executive PhD in Public Policy from the Nelson Mandela College of Government and Social Sciences during its annual hooding ceremony. The public ceremony was held at 11 a.m. in the F.G. Clark Activity Center.

This year's ceremony honored 16 doctoral candidates, marking the completion of a rigorous academic journey that included 36 credit hours of advanced coursework and an original dissertation research study. The graduates represented the fifth cohort to complete the prestigious terminal degree program, which was launched in 2020. Notably, this was the largest class to graduate since the program's inception.

"Having Congressman Carter deliver this year's keynote address was a tremendous honor," said Dr. Charmaine Williams, executive director of the Executive PhD program.

"His distinguished career in public service exemplifies the kind of leadership and civic impact we aim to cultivate in our graduates. This cohort represents the next generation of scholar-practitioners who will shape the policies and systems that define our future."

Now serving his third term in the U.S. House of Representatives, Congressman Carter was first elected to the 117th Congress. He currently serves on the exclusive Committee on Energy and Commerce in the 119th Congress, as well as the House Homeland Security Committee and the Democratic Steering and Policy Committee. He was selected by Democratic leadership to serve as a Deputy Whip on the House Floor, and he holds the position of 1st Vice Chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus while also serving as a member of the Regional Leadership Council.

Congressman Carter previously served on the House Committees on Small Business and Transportation and Infrastructure. A graduate of Xavier University of Louisiana, he earned bachelor's degrees in political science and business administration, later completing a Master of Science in business summa cum laude from the University of Holy Cross. He has also been awarded honorary doctorate degrees from Xavier University and Southern University at New Orleans in recognition of his contributions to public service.

The Executive PhD in Public Policy is tailored for seasoned professionals, equipping them to bridge the gap between academic research and real-world public service challenges. Graduates of the program are prepared to serve as visionary leaders and transformative scholars across government, nonprofit organizations, academia, and the private sector.

Leadership Rooted in Service



VICE CHANCELLOR SANDRA C. BROWN EXPANDS HEALTH INITIATIVES THROUGH PARTNERSHIPS, MENTORSHIP, AND MEDIA VISIBILITY

In her first weeks as Vice Chancellor of Health Initiativesy, Dr. Sandra C. Brown, DNS, APRN, FNP-BC, CNE, ANEF, FAANP, FAAN, has hit the ground running, advancing strategic partnerships, strengthening leadership pipelines, and raising the university's profile in health and higher education.

One of her earliest engagements was at Ochsner's Employee Day of Purpose, held at the Crowne Plaza. In front of more than 400 employees, Ochsner CEO Pete Fountain highlighted Southern University with a special mention, applauding the institution's contributions to the region. As the primary decision-maker for academic-practice partnerships and donor relations, Mr. Fountain represents a key connection for advancing collaborative opportunities. "It was an honor to meet him for the first time and to hear Southern University recognized so prominently," Dr. Brown said.

Dr. Brown also met with leaders at Our Lady of the Lake (OLOL), including the Chief Nursing Officer, to discuss an expansion of Southern's PhD in Nursing program. The initiative envisions creating a Nurse Leaders Fellowship, with a projected cohort of five OLOL nurse executives beginning doctoral studies in Spring 2026. This collaboration underscores the College's commitment to preparing the next generation of leaders at the highest levels of nursing practice and research.

In addition to building partnerships, Dr. Brown has worked to elevate the College's story to a broader audience. On Tuesday, August 26, she appeared live on FOX 44's Morning Show for SU Give Day, representing the College of Nursing and Allied Health. The segment highlighted the College's contributions to the health care workforce and reinforced its role in advancing the mission of the Southern University System.

Dr. Brown is also investing in mentorship and academic leadership development. At the personal request of the newly appointed Dean of Nursing at Southern University at New Orleans (SUNO), she will host him for a campus visit designed as an orientation and mentorship experience. The session will provide guidance and support as he transitions into his new role. "Mentorship is critical to sustaining excellence in leadership," Dr. Brown noted. "It is a privilege to support colleagues who are taking on responsibilities that shape the future of nursing education."

Finally, in continuing to align resources with community needs, Dr. Brown met with the Chief Nursing Officer at Woman's Hospital to explore funding opportunities tied to women's health initiatives. These conversations reflect a growing emphasis on ensuring that the College's academic mission is deeply connected to pressing health priorities across Louisiana and beyond.

"From partnerships and mentorship to media visibility, these first weeks have been filled with positive momentum," Dr. Brown reflected. "We are putting the pieces together for continued SUccess. All good things, more to come soon!"



CHANCELLOR PIERRE REAFFIRMS COMMITMENT TO STUDENT MENTAL HEALTH

Chancellor John Pierre reaffirmed Southern University's commitment to prioritizing student well-being with a strong focus on mental health during the Fall 2025 semester. Recognizing the challenges students face both inside and outside the classroom, Pierre emphasized that addressing mental health is essential to creating a safe, supportive, and thriving campus community.

One of the newest initiatives underscoring this commitment is the Southern University Police Department's addition of a certified emotional support dog named Skye. Trained to provide comfort during stressful or traumatic moments, Skye gives officers an additional tool to de-escalate situations with empathy and compassion. Chancellor Pierre praised the program, describing it as a clear example of the university's proactive approach to student support.

"Our students' mental health is just as important as their academic success," Chancellor Pierre said. "By equipping our team with resources that meet students where they are, we are showing that their safety, well-being, and growth matter to us."

Students have already embraced Skye, a husky with a calm spirit and fluffy presence, who is quickly becoming one of the most popular members of SUPD. Handled by Lt. Gregory Rogers, Skye assists in crisis situations and also participates in outreach events, giving students opportunities to connect with law enforcement in a positive way.

Donna Burke, SUPD's crisis interventionist counselor, often requests Skye's presence during student crises, noting that her calm demeanor can help ease tense situations. "She may be the calming point," Burke explained. Lt. Rogers agreed, saying student response has been overwhelmingly positive. "So far, they love her," he said. "They see her, nice, fluffy husky, and just with the fact of her fluffiness, they are able to hug her and establish contact with her." Skye made her debut during Southern's 2024 Homecoming pep rally, where she confidently handled the large crowd and loved the attention. Certified for deployment in public spaces, she may also pursue further certifications as her role on campus expands.

Strengthening the Mental Health Framework

Through partnerships with campus departments, the University Counseling Center, and initiatives like Skye's deployment with SUPD, the university is broadening its mental health framework. Chancellor Pierre highlighted these efforts as part of the university's larger mission to ensure every Jaguar has access to the resources and support they need to thrive both academically and personally.

With leadership from Chancellor Pierre and the growing presence of Skye, Southern University is showing that mental health matters, and that sometimes, the best support comes on four paws.



CHANCELLOR PIERRE REFLECTS ON THE IMPACT OF SU GIVE DAY 2025

On Thursday, August 28th, the Southern University System Foundation successfully hosted its annual SU Give Day, streamed live from the Valdry Center for Philanthropy on the Baton Rouge campus. The event served as the culminating appeal for the "Are You In?" campaign, with a goal of raising \$25 million in support of the Southern University System's five campuses and the Southern University Laboratory School.

Chancellor Pierre described the day as a powerful reminder of the University's unity and enduring commitment to higher education. He joined President Dennis J. Shields and the System's chancellors to open the program, sharing a collective vision for advancing faculty, supporting students, and strengthening the impact of each campus.

Throughout the day, the virtual audience heard from diverse voices across the university family. Student leaders representing the Student Philanthropy Council and Student Government Associations underscored the importance of stewardship and student-led giving. Corporate partners highlighted the value of investing in Southern University as a catalyst for workforce development and innovation. 




