SUNO ATHLETICS

SUNO's basketball teams set a new benchmark in the HBCU Athletic Conference (HBCUAC) this season. The women's team achieved six impressive conference wins, including key victories over defending champion Rust College, Wiley University, and the University of the Virgin Islands, ranking among the top in offensive production and rebounds.

The men's team re-established themselves as a formidable force with a 9-8 conference record and their first double-digit win total since 2013-14. A thrilling 82-78 victory over rival Xavier capped their season, marking a historic win on Philander Smith's home court.

Beyond basketball, SUNO Baseball rebounded remarkably in its second year under Head Coach Olen Parker, with a 5-1 record in conference play and a No. 2 ranking in the West Division. The SUNO Knights Athletics Internship program also elevated media engagement, serving as the official media team for major events and significantly boosting online views.

These achievements underscore SUNO's commitment to excellence and prominence in collegiate athletics. With record-setting performances and groundbreaking wins, the Knights continue to inspire both on and off the field, embodying the spirit of resilience and progress in the HBCUAC.

MILLIE M. CHARLES SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK

The Millie M. Charles School of Social Work moves forward with an online Master of Social Work program.

Dean Rebecca Chaisson is happy to report that the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) approved its application for a fully online MSW program option this fall. Dr. Chaisson, along with the faculty and staff, are excited about the opportunity to expand the delivery system to students who require a fully online option for successful entry into the social work profession.

The program will start entirely online in the fall of 2025, and approximately 40 students will be expected to join the first cohort in the program. Faculty and staff are immersed in preparing for the first cohort, working closely with Dr. Bree Cook, Vice-Chancellor of Academic Affairs, and Ms. Melinda Perry, Director of E-Learning.

Dr. Holly McKenney

Dr. Holly McKenney recently conducted a continuing education workshop on Self-care for Work Month. **Approximately** participants, including students, internship/field supervisors, faculty, and alumni, attended the event. Self-care is currently an ethical standard requirement from the National Association of Social Workers (NASW). It was a timely event, especially given the recent local, regional, and national organizational climate changes. Dr. McKenney invited a local holistic healer, Shanda Damango, a certified expert in several body movement methods, who has degrees from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette Claremont Graduate University. Dr. McKenney Shanda collaborated to deliver an outstanding complement of techniques borrowed from mental health practice, body movement healing, and mindfulness work. Shanda Damango shouted out the School of Social Work at SUNO on her social media page shortly after the event.

Dr. Jill Murray

Dr. Jill Murray served as a mentor and guide for Nickolus Harris for the McNair Scholars Program. Dr. Murray and Nickolus will present a paper at the statewide National Association of Social Workers conference in Baton Rouge. Dr. Murray has worked with several students whose papers have been accepted by various statewide and national conferences.

Dr. Patrice Sentino

Dr. Patrice Sentino facilitated a knowledge-building event about new amendments being voted on for the March 29th election. Empowered Voting: The Millie M. Charles School of Social Work held a community discussion on ballot measures. Dr. Sentino moderated the discussion and presentation to about 50 participants present for the event, which was designed to explain the language and intent of the four amendments. Senator Royce Duplessis from District 5, Representative Aimee Adatto Freeman from District 98, and Jon Moller, Executive Director of Invest in Louisiana, a non-partisan think tank, provided information about the upcoming voting opportunities. The panelists spoke about specifics about each amendment and later took questions from the audience. It was an important critical event for the community. Dr. Sentino and the panelists encouraged all participants to actively assist other voters in understanding the ballots this month and promote voter turnout. The presentations were timely, and many participants walked away with a better understanding of the amendment and some of the processes for placing unclear language on the ballots. One audience member asked about the law that requires precise and understandable language for the public. The panelists spoke about the challenges faced with sending out information to constituents with language that better explain changes at the ballot box. Currently, the law in this area is not fully implemented.
