SUNO Knights Athletics: A Year of Outstanding Achievements and Leadership

The Southern University at New Orleans (SUNO) Knights Department of Athletics saw a remarkable year under the dedicated leadership of the Director of Athletics and Men's Basketball Head Coach James A. Matthews, III. From record-breaking performances on the court to commendable community service initiatives, the Knights have exemplified excellence and character across all sports.

Jamal "Tall" Gibson's Return

One of the most notable highlights of the year is the return of Jamal "Tall" Gibson, who entered the transfer portal, but later chose to remain at SUNO due to the unwavering commitment and mentorship of Coach Matthews. As a freshman, Gibson's performance was spectacular, averaging 21.0 points per game, 15.8 rebounds per game, and 2.5 blocks per game over 30 games. His outstanding contributions led to the setting of new SUNO single-season records for total points (630), rebounds (474), and double-doubles (29). Gibson's accolades for the season include:

Dana Bailey Completes the 2024 Lamar Governor's Fellows Summer Program

This summer, Dana Bailey, the Southern University at New Orleans (SUNO) Student Government Association (SGA) President and Public Administration major, was selected to participate in the Lamar Governors Fellows program. This program was started in 2014, whereby scholars are chosen from across Louisiana to intern within an area of state government. Since its inception, Dana has been the only scholar from SUNO to participate in this unique opportunity.

This program invites scholars to visit the capital of Louisiana and intern at different agencies under the secretary of various state Executive Officers. Housing is provided on the Louisiana State University (LSU) campus for out-of-town students, and fellows are required to take a class at LSU. At the end of the program, each intern must present a policy proposal based on their work experience to the Governor.

Dana was assigned to the LA Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) under the leadership of Secretary David Matlock. DCFS is working to keep children safe, help individuals and families become self-sufficient, and provide safe refuge during disasters. DCFS has many locations throughout the nine regions of Louisiana. The nine areas in Louisiana include Alexandria, Baton Rouge, Covington, Lafayette, Lake Charles, Monroe, Orleans, Shreveport, and Thibodaux. With multiple offices in all nine regions, the main office is in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The agency receives resources from federal and local government.

Dana was most proud to complete a policy proposal for Governor Landry. The objective of the policy she proposed was to enhance the healthy food options available to recipients of the SNAP program, formerly known as food stamps.

Dana also participated in a committee to hire new staff at DCFS. She stated that the internship allowed her to see herself differently. "Very often, at HBCUs," Dana said, "students become accustomed to being around those who look exactly like them and often they forget about the diversity in the real world. The Lamar Governor Fellows program allowed her to test her ability in terms of adaptability, professionalism, diversity, resilience, and so much more. Dana believes she was challenged to work outside of her comfort zone. She is confident this experience will benefit her as she plans to do more in government, which is a predominately Caucasian male space.

New Orleans-Area Business School Deans Meet to Explore Participation in The Indiana Project: Cultivating Future Wall Street Leaders

Pamela Kennett-Hensel, PhD, Dean and Professor of Marketing, University of New Orleans (UNO), reached out to the Deans and Chair of the Business Programs at the three HBCUs in New Orleans to discuss potential joint participation by students from those schools in the Indiana Project. Dr. Kennett-Hensel explained that the opportunity came about due to a meeting that she and the University of New Orleans President, Dr. Kathy Johnson, had with Mr. David Girton, Founder and CEO of the Indiana Project.

The Indiana Project is a program designed to prepare minority students for careers in investment and finance. The program is focused on preparing them for the Securities Industry Essentials (SIE) exam and providing mentorship to help them transition into the "real world." Mr. Girton wants to expand this project by selecting higher education institutions in the New Orleans area. Dr. Kennett-Hensel proposed a partnership with UNO, SUNO, Dillard, and Xavier to Mr. Girton, who was quite excited about that possibility. The four campus representatives include Kennett-Hensel, PhD; Igwe E. Udeh, PhD, Dean and Professor of Business, Southern University at New Orleans; Shael Wolfson, PhD, Professor of Economics, Xavier University of Louisiana; and Dorian Williams, PhD, Dean and Professor, Dillard University met virtually with Mr. Girton on July 17, 2024. Dr. Dub Lane, a professor of finance at UNO, and Mr. Steven L. Jones, the dean for professional development at Wabash College, were also at the meeting. Wabash College already has a thriving Indiana Project and is eager to share its lessons with other institutions. The meeting ended with a request for each campus representative to consult with their students and faculty to gauge the level of interest and commitment to the program, which is very intense but with a lot of upside for those who earn their Security Industry Essentials (SIE) license, where the starting annual compensation is over \$90,000. A follow-up group meeting will occur in late August or early September 2024 after Fall registration has ended.

SBDMI Workshops/Seminars/Training/Meetings Report

The Small Business Development Minority Institute organized another claims adjuster certification program in partnership with the Louisiana Department of Insurance. The Louisiana Claims Adjuster's Seminar was hosted by Mr. Patrick Bell, Assistant Commissioner, Division of Diversity & Opportunity, Louisiana Department of Insurance, on July 2, 2024, with 50 attendees.

The Claims Adjuster's Workshop was held on July 19 – 20, 2024, facilitated via Zoom by Mr. Dwon Matthews.



The SBDMI staff collaborated with Mrs. Irma Dixon, the Facilitator of The Louisiana Economic Development (LED) Peer-to-Peer Roundtable, to recruit potential business owners to enroll in this business networking and mentorship program funded by LED. Ten (10) business owners were registered in the Peer-to-Peer Roundtable due to the outreach effort by Mrs. Terrie Guerin and the SBDMI office.

The SBDMI welcomed a new real estate firm to the Small Business Incubator Building on July 1, 2024. One of the current Incubator residents, Proficient Media, LLC, has expanded its footprint by creating a state-of-the-art production podcast studio, which was put into use on July 1, 2024. The Incubator Building now has 15 tenants, and Mrs. Terrie Guerin has signed up a new tenant scheduled to move in August. During the SBA Connecting the Dots Seminar on July 18, 2024, Mr. Micheal Ricks, District Director of the New Orleans area Small Business Administration (SBA), presented an 8(a) Advocate Award Plaque to Mrs. Cynthia Beaulieu and Mrs. Terrie Guerin on behalf of the SUNO-SBDMI for the Institute's advocacy and enthusiastic support for minority small and emerging businesses. In her remarks, Ms. Gayle Brogan, the SBA Business Opportunity Specialist, expressed her staff's gratitude for SUNO's commitment to growing entrepreneurship and wealth within its community through the effort of the SBDMI staff.

Mrs. Cynthia Beaulieu and Ms. Irma Dixon represented the SUNO SBDMI at the 2024 Connecting the Dots, Creating Business Opportunities/Small Business Expo, which took place at the Jedco Facility in Westwego, Louisiana on July 19, 2024. The SBDMI set up a booth at the expo to share information about the facility and the assortment of services available at the Institute to small and emerging businesses. They also used the opportunity to explore opportunities for collaboration and partnership with other vendors, public agencies, nonprofits, and the business community. The SBDMI staff continues to work with the NID Housing Counseling Agency to provide solutions to affordable housing and inter-generational wealth creation for African Americans. NID has had a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with SUNO since 2021. The SBDMI is facilitating the upcoming NID-HBCU Initiative Orientation session hosted by Ms. Tanchelle Washington, Certified Housing Counselor; Branch Manager, NID Housing Counseling Agency, Louisiana, on July 25, 2024. The SBDMI staff sent out flyers to SUNO students and community members to attend the sessions, and Cynthia Beaulieu will also serve as a guest speaker.

On June 24-28, 2024, Cybersecurity students Brandi Hardy and Genevieve Lopez, participated in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Machine Learning (ML) Robots (BOTS) Mentor Opportunity in Atlanta, GA. This was a weeklong, all expenses paid event to understand software programming that can perform tasks over a network automatically, often imitating human behavior.

In partnership with SUNO, BayouSTEM spearheaded the NASA-funded program that is centered around teaching students how to use artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning (ML). One of the goals is for Ms. Lopez and Ms. Hardy to select a middle or high school they can train and mentor educators currently teaching STEM related courses.

DEPARTMENT CRIMINAL JUSTICE



THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, OFFICE OF ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE, hosted a community listening session in the Leonard S. Washington Memorial Library on the campus of Southern University at New Orleans on Monday, June 24, 2024. Dr. Raymond Delaney, Associate Professor of Criminal Justice, was instrumental in providing leadership to host such a meaning collaboration with stakeholders with the assistance of Sheila Ruffin, Attorney Advisor, from the U.S. Department of Justice.

As directed by Executive Order 14096, "Revitalizing Our Nation's Commitment to Environmental Justice for All," the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) is required to publish an Environmental Justice Strategic Plan (the "Plan") outlining its vision, goals, priority actions, and metrics to address and advance environmental justice. The Plan must be posted online and submitted to the Council on Environmental Quality, a division of the Executive Office of the President, by October 2024.

The faculty, staff and community responses were great. We look forward to hosting many more meaning discussions that build relationships with communities and promote fairness and meaningful engagement in environmental decision-making processes.
