

The Research and Application Development course (CISP 698) introduces students to research methods and provides an opportunity for students to develop individual problem-solving applications. The research methods component provides a solid foundation for conducting literature reviews, identifying problems, developing applications and reporting findings. Students typically develop applications in their area of interest based on current technology trends.

A series of questions and answers between the presenter and the audience followed each 20-minute presentation. Audience members were given the opportunity to submit an evaluation of the relevance, clarity and presentation skill of the research topic and the presenter.

Elementary Education Students Research Anti-Bullying Campaigns

Dr. Deborah Darby, assistant professor of Elementary Education, has involved students in her fall courses in discussions, activities and research regarding "Anti-Bullying Campaigns in Schools." Her research is ongoing across semesters. The goal is to raise the awareness of teacher candidates as it relates to this pervasive problem in grades K-12 – and post-secondary arenas. This effort is particularly helpful in her "Diverse Learners" and "Introduction to Teaching" courses.

Students have created (and acted out) scenarios about bullying, considering: understanding bullying, warning signs for bullying and bullying prevention and intervention tips. A beneficial by-product of this research for future educators is to raise the awareness of SUNO students of self-reflection regarding needed dispositions in the field of education. Given the proliferation of violence on school campuses across the nation, the highlight on bullying is crucial.

Karen M. Washington, administrative assistant in the General Student Program was inducted Nov. 25 as a member of the Xi Phi Chapter of Phi Alpha National Honor Society, a National Honor Society for Social Work, by Dr. Torin T. Sanders, and Dr. Hyacinth McKee, the co- advisors.

A new ancillary program - Nutrition and Wellness Certification - was approved by the University Curriculum Committee in November. The program was developed by Dr. Celina Carson, assistant professor of Child Development and Family Studies.

Dr. Robert Azzarello gave a talk about his new book, *Three Hundred Years of Decadence: New Orleans Literature and the Transatlantic World*, at the Louisiana Book Festival in Baton Rouge Nov. 2. He also presented a paper called "New Orleans and Critical University Studies in Black and White" at the South Atlantic Modern Language Association Conference Nov. 23.

On behalf of the College of Education and Human Development, a donation of \$1,600 was provided to Eboni Johnson, a 2017 Certification-Only completer, to upgrade her technology initiative at Terrytown Elementary School. Ms. Johnson was chosen as the Outstanding Teacher of the Year at the school.

In other news, six Certificate-Only candidates were enrolled as interns during the Fall 2019 semester. Two of the interns are Robert Noyce STEM scholar interns.

Fine Arts Professor Cynthia Ramirez exhibited a Day of the Dead Altar in the Enrique Alfarez Sculpture Garden in City Park Oct. 28-Nov. 5 in collaboration with Wednesdays with Enrique musical events. This event was sponsored by the Helis Foundation.

She exhibited another Day of the Dead Altar at Algiers Regional Library, Oct. 24-Nov. 13. It was sponsored by Tulane's Stone Center for Latin American Study.

Professor Ramirez also presented a lecture at Tulane University on the Mexican celebration on Day of the Dead and conducted a Sugar Skull workshop for Professor Heather Knight's Tulane "NOLA Cities of the Dead" class on Oct. 31.





Dr. Deborah Darby, assistant professor of Elementary Education, has received a \$1,500 Matching Fund Community Partnership Grant from the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Foundation. The grant supports after-school, summer educational and arts programs offered by non-profit organizations in Louisiana.

In addition to teaching students to play instruments, the goal of the grant is to enhance life-long math skills. She has received this grant since 2015.

Dr. Darby also has received the Foundation Outreach Award since 2014. The grant's goal is to expose participants to the music/arts festival and to reinforce the academic and social implications of this exposure.

Drs. Christian Clement, Rachid Belmasrour, John-Clifford Obih, Mostafa Elaasar hosted a Benjamin Franklin High School student, Kayla Carey, on campus for research and educational activities during the Fall 2019 semester. As part of her high school training at Benjamin Franklin High School, Kayla had to be supported by a university to engage in research activities and to be mentored, exposing her to a specialized skillset and advanced knowledge to properly prepare her for higher education and future prospects in medical school. Kayla was sponsored under SUNO's participation in the Minority Serving Institutions Partnership Program in the Pipeline Development of Skilled Workforce in STEM through Advanced Manufacturing (STEAM) grant funded by the Department of Energy/National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA). Kayla investigated Antibacterial Properties of *Garcinia kola* herb used in homeopathy and other ailments and made important further drug findings. She will present her work at Benjamin Franklin High School and at SUNO Research Day 2020.
