Dr. Joseph Bouie Jr. returns to Southern University at New Orleans as Chancellor, bringing with him a distinguished legacy in education, public service, and community leadership. A proud SUNO alumnus, Dr. Bouie holds a B.A. from Southern University at New Orleans, an MSW from Tulane University, and a Ph.D. from Clark Atlanta University.

With over 40 years of experience as a Social Work educator, university administrator, and community advocate, Dr. Bouie has held leadership roles in higher education and government. His career includes previous service as SUNO's Chancellor, as well as Louisiana State Senator for District 3 and Chairman of the Louisiana Legislative Black Caucus. His expertise spans administration, community organization, leadership development, and substance abuse research and prevention.

Dr. Bouie's return to SUNO marks a full-circle moment in his lifelong commitment to education, equity, and service. He is dedicated to advancing SUNO's mission as a vital institution for academic excellence and cultural leadership in New Orleans.

He is married to his wife of over 45 years, Leslie P. Bouie, and is the proud father of five adult children.

CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO HBCU SUMMIT

Southern University at New Orleans proudly welcomed the California Community Colleges to HBCU Summit delegation to campus on June 26th. The visit began with engaging presentations from SUNO's Academic Affairs and Student Support teams, followed by a dynamic panel discussion featuring our esteemed deans and directors inside the Millie M. Charles School of Social Work auditorium.

Following the panel, the group enjoyed a guided tour of the Park Campus. During the bus ride from the Lake Campus, SUNO's Director of Recruitment energized the group with entertaining commentary, fun facts about New Orleans, and local dining recommendations.

A highlight of the Park Campus tour was a stop at the Southern University at New Orleans Museum of Art (SUNOMA). Director Erika Witt offered an inspiring and heartfelt introduction to the museum's historical artifacts, emphasizing SUNOMA's role in preserving and celebrating our cultural heritage.

The group then visited the University Center (UC), concluding their tour with a visit to the SUNO Bookstore, where many stocked up on SUNO-branded merchandise to commemorate their visit.

The summit brought together over 100 higher education professionals from California's community colleges, with the goal of enhancing transfer pathways and increasing awareness of the value of a Historically Black College and University (HBCU) education—specifically at SUNO. Through this impactful visit, SUNO successfully strengthened its connection with California institutions and reaffirmed its commitment to academic excellence and student success.







RECRUITMENT ROUNDUP

The summer season remained active at Southern University at New Orleans as the Office of Recruitment welcomed a steady stream of both large and small tour groups to campus.

Visitors included students from the Boys and Girls Club of Mississippi, Southern University at Shreveport (SUSLA), and local high school students and their families—each eager to learn more about SUNO's academic offerings and vibrant campus culture.

SUNO's academic programs played a vital role in these tours, serving as enthusiastic partners in showcasing the university's commitment to academic excellence and student success.







STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Southern University at New Orleans (SUNO)'s Student Support Services (SSS) Program received a \$2.9 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education. This federally funded program supports 300 students by offering academic coaching, tutoring, financial and economic literacy guidance, career preparation, and assistance in graduate school enrollment, and so much more.

Students from low-income families, first-generation households, and/or students with disabilities qualify for the program. Linda D. Frederick, SUNO's Executive Director for TRIO Collegiate Programs, said the program has helped many students matriculate and graduate from SUNO within four to six years. In the 2023–24 academic year, the SUNO SSS achieved a 76% persistence rate, 85% good academic standing, and a 59% six-year graduation rate.

As the TRIO grant is distributed over the next five years, SUNO and program staff look forward to continuing the intensive and hands-on services the program provides.

EMMETT W. BASHFUL SCHOLARSHIP BASH

The Emmett W. Bashful Scholarship Gala, affectionately known as "The BASH", is an annual fundraising event hosted by the Southern University at New Orleans Foundation, the SUNO Alumni Association, and Southern University at New Orleans.
