

The up close and personal forum allowed students to engage with FBI agents learning and hearing their personal experiences. In addition, breakout sessions allowed students to ask the agents detailed questions.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS MONTHLY REPORT

NURSING PROGRAM

Our program received approval from the American Association of Colleges of Nursing on February 8, 2023. AACN drives patient health and safety through the comprehensive credentialing of acute and critical care nurses.

As of February 9, 2023, SUNO's Nursing Program is now a member of the International Nursing Association for Clinical Simulation and Learning. The purposes of INACSL are education, assessment, research, and health system integration in facilitating patient safety.

Dr. Kelly Smith -Chair of Nursing, presented at the Louisiana State Board of Regents at Xavier University of Louisiana on February 16, 2023.

The program is currently in our second admissions cycle. As of Friday, February 10, 2023, we have forty-nine applicants, and thirty-nine have been accepted. Applications are still being reviewed until March 3, 2023.





DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL SCIENCES

Brookhaven National Laboratory (BNL) is an Upton, New York, research institution. Ms. Rayan Demery and Mr. Delton Richardson were placed in the 2023 Mini-Semester Program at BNL by Dr. Murty S. Kambhampati, Research Mentor and Professor of Biology. Delton and Rayan had the opportunity to complete a mini-semester internship there this winter. The Department of Energy funded the internship, and Ms. Rayan Demery said, "This was an experience of a lifetime. I was introduced to various scientists and learned about their professions and responsibilities at Brookhaven. We toured multiple laboratory facilities on site, such as the National Synchrotron Light Source II (NSLS II), Center for Functional Nanomaterials (CFN), Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC), and lastly, the greenhouse. We conducted a research project on what kind of flour makes the best bread for a ketogenic diet. In addition to doing this research, we made ice cream using liquid nitrogen. Overall this internship expanded my knowledge on numerous careers people with a STEM degree can have."



The students research compared macromolecular spectrums of several different types of milk. The objective was to figure out which milk is better suited for people who are lactose intolerant.

MILLIE M. CHARLES SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK



The faculty and staff of the Millie M. Charles School of Social Work continue work on grant development and the preparation for certificate programs. The School has received a \$100,000 anonymous donation through Dean Chaisson and a \$300,000 grant through Social Work alum Ron McClain, Executive Director of the Institute of Mental Hygiene. Both funding streams will support the Grief and Trauma Center. In addition, the School is preparing to launch an Interprofessional Practice Certificate in Child Welfare (funded by Title IV-E). At the same time, it continues to plan for the Online MSW & BSW programs.

Under the leadership of Dr. Derrick Freeman, ACSW, first-semester MSW graduate students Michelle Ozah and Travis Costanza (pictured below) presented at a national conference sponsored by the Employee Assistance Professionals Association (EAPA) in partnership with the New Orleans Association of Black Social Workers (NOABSW).

The conference theme, *Brain Development and Criminal Behavior: Its Impact on the Judicial System,* required students to focus on these areas. Ozah's and Costanza's presentations addressed brain development, behavioral and cognitive effects of smoking and nicotine use, criminal behavior, prevention, and intervention. Chapter member Monitetra King, SSW alumni, gave the students positive reviews and wrote that "the students were on par with the other experienced speakers and that no one would have guessed that they were students."

The School of Social Work participated in the National Alliance for the Mentally III (NAMI) Walk. The College of Education and Human Development was awarded \$183,000 from the Board of Regents to develop a Dual Enrollment Teacher Certification program.

COMMUNITY SERVICE/SERVICE LEARNING AND RESOURCES

The University is developing a partnership with Hynes Magnet School which will allow education majors to earn service-learning hours. In addition, we are in the process of finalizing a Health Fair in conjunction with the Nursing Department. Also, the Community Service/Service Learning and Resources Offices are developing plans and establishing relationships for Cybersecurity Service-Learning initiatives.

The University hosted an "Our Money Matters" session with students and participated in recent basketball games promoting financial wellness and health.

The Office of Community Service/Service Learning and Resources are finalizing services for homeless students utilizing START Corp.

COUNSELING

In January, The Counseling Center Hosted "Wellness Week."
During this week, the University Counselor, Ms. Kimberly Paige, facilitated
10 - minute Mental Wellness Checks for students, faculty, and staff. There was a
friendly competition between Athletes, Student Government Association/
Student leaders, and Resident Assistant's to determine who could encourage or
influence the most students to receive wellness checks. The student athletes
won and over 100 students received Wellness checks as we kicked off the
semester.

UNIVERSITY CENTER AND INTRAMURAL SPORTS

During January 2023, over 20 students engaged in a vision board social. Students had the opportunity to use magazines, newspapers, and books to create a visual chart of goals and achievements they hope to accomplish for the semester or year. Students shared best practices on how they plan to accomplish the items with other students.
