Dr. Kevin Brown was named the incoming President of NOLACode. The organization teaches computing skills to at-risk students to bridge the digital divide and prepare young students for careers in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. With various social work educators from multiple universities, Brown will co-author the upcoming publication, preparing social work students to engage in disaster preparation, relief, and recovery.

The SSW students assisted in revitalizing the playground, including painting the playground equipment. This community volunteer event prepared students for hands-on community engagement, which was part of their course introduction. This was an opportunity to implement the Grand Challenges in Social Work, including "ensuring health development of youth" and "social response to a changing environment."

Dr. Jill E. Murray presented a 90-minute workshop at the National Association of Social Workers Louisiana Chapter Annual Conference. Her workshop, "DACA and the Border Wall: Policy Updates for Working with Louisiana's Growing Latino Population," provided practicing social workers from around the state continuing education credit in ethics and diversity.

The Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) is currently a controversial policy that is critical for understanding diversity, equity, and the vulnerability of Latino Families.

Dr. Murray was invited to participate in preparing the second edition of the Council on Social Work Education's (CSWE) Specialized Practice Curricular Guide for Macro Social Work Practice. She contributed to the first edition, published in 2018.

The new edition will include updated material geared toward the 2022 Educational Policy and Accreditation Standards.

Dr. Sentino hosted an event in collaboration with the Echoing Green's Ignite program. Echoing Green finds emerging leaders with the best ideas for social innovation as early as possible and sets them on a path to lifelong impact by funding, connecting, and supporting new generations of social impact leaders. The Ignite program provided SUNO and seven of the nation's top historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) a pathway towards innovation and social entrepreneurship for HBCU students. This multi-phase program provides early access to innovation skills, connections to Echoing Green's global network of innovators, access to seed funds, and a pathway to fellowship opportunities. The engaging and interactive campus workshop introduced students from all disciplines to the basic concepts of innovation and social entrepreneurship.





Dr. Patrice Sentino was appointed to the New Orleans Regional Black Chamber of Commerce (NORBCC) Board of Directors. The NORBCC's mission is to support, promote, and educate our members for sustainable growth and expansion and to empower and sustain the African American business community through entrepreneurship and economic activity in the greater New Orleans region and the global economy.
