Recently, SUNOPD officers participated in the Campus Emergencies Prevention, Response, and Recovery course at Dillard University on June 30, 2022. In response to recent bomb threats at HBCUs across the country, this course was vital in educating first responders, emergency managers, and law enforcement officers on different practices that can help preserve and protect the lives of our campus community. In this collaborative course, participants incorporated practical, problem-based integrated group activities that required a coordinated approach and emergency planning considerations, in


addition to discussing the importance of an integrated response to campus emergencies and communications and recovery techniques. This course was sponsored by the Department of Homeland Security's Office for State and Local Law Enforcement, in conjunction with the White House Initiative on Advancing Educational Equity, Excellence, and Economic Opportunity through Historically Black Colleges and Universities.

In response to a sharp increase in drug overdoses in the Metro New Orleans area over the last year, the Metropolitan Human Services District (MHSD) educated SUNOPD officers on recognizing an opioid overdose and the administration of Naloxone, a medication used to counter the effects of heroin and opioid overdoses.

The SUNO Police Department recently held its annual Oath of Office and Awards Ceremony. During this time, new officers pledge their steadfast commitment to upholding the law, while others are recognized for their dedication and commitment to the department and the SUNO community.

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCES (AAFCS)

Faculty attended the American Association of Family & Consumer Sciences AAFCS 113th Annual Conference and Expo in Orlando, FL, in June. The workshops addressed assessment criteria for the AAFCS standards in Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) associated with the Child Development and Family Studies program. It provided the updates and/or changes to the future accreditation process, including our unit's upcoming Accreditation FCS Self-Study.

Discussions centered on Re-accreditation, Preparing an AAFCS Accreditation Self-Study Report, Standard 1: Institutional Environment, Standard 2: Instructional Programs, Standard 3: Discovery, Integration, Application of Knowledge, and Standard 4: faculty, staff, and students. The AAFCS Assembly of Higher Education (AHE) provides leadership for examining issues and changes that affect the family and consumer sciences profession in higher education. The monthly meeting focuses on Leadership Fellows Programs, the AHE Rules of Order, Strategic Plan, and Development of Goals aligned with AAFCS.

Summer Advisement and Summer Class:

Throughout June and July, we conducted electronic advisement and registration for students in the College of Education and Human Development. We advised and registered students remotely who were transfers and returning students. We conducted course audits for transfer credits into the CDFS Program for transfer students. Also, I met with students on campus in the College for pre-advisement. During pre-advisement, we reviewed CDFS students' Banner Academic Transcript records to create their fall 2022 class schedule.

For May, June, and July, we conducted my Summer 2022 class which includes CDFS 325N Abuse in Families. I contacted students who haven't participated in class activities and are inactive.

University Academic Affairs Retreat

On July 19th, the faculty attended the Academic Affairs Retreat for Deans and Directors. The Retreat highlighted the university's mission and goals. There were presentations and discussions addressing assessment, data, retention, graduation rate, new student orientation, the University College Model, advisement, financial aid, admissions, and student engagement. Leadership also discussed the implementation of a new faculty mentorship program. The fall 2022 enrollment data from the fall 2022 semester and the projected enrollment goal for the 2022–2023 school year were shared and discussed. Participants began planning unit goals in terms of student enrollment and retention.

CBA DEAN ATTENDS IAC MEETING



The semi-annual meeting of the Initial Accreditation Committee (IAC) of AACSB International, the premier business school accreditation agency, was held in Tampa, Florida, on July 12 and 13, 2022. Dr. Igwe E. Udeh, Dean of the SUNO College of Business & Public Administration, was in attendance. The IAC oversees the acceptance of eligibility applications, approves the initial Self-Evaluation Reports (iSER), guides institutions in implementing the plans, and oversees processes for initial business accreditation. The ultimate responsibility of the committee is to ensure consistency of accreditation standards application and equity of recommendations across teams and programs reviewed. The committee comprises deans and directors of AACSB-accredited business schools and programs worldwide. Participants at the recently concluded meeting were from North and South America, Asia, Africa, Europe, New Zealand, and Australia. Dr. Udeh has been serving a three-year term on the committee since 2020. AACSB International accredited the SUNO College of Business in 2012. The school is preparing for a reaffirmation visit in October 2022.

Robert Noyce Program: Summer Training and Enrichment Program (STEP)

Robert Noyce Program sponsored Summer Training and Enrichment Program. It offered educational opportunities and college experiences to 9 — 11 grade students of New Orleans at SUNO in the Department of Natural Sciences from June 13 to July 1, 2022. The STEP program is an essential part of the Robert Noyce Program. The program commenced on Monday, June 13, 2022, with an opening ceremony that included greetings from Dr. Evelyn Harrell, Dean (College of Arts and Sciences) and Dr. Carl P. Johnson (Chair, Department of Natural Sciences), and program personnel. Eleven students from different high schools in the state were initially selected for STEP. One hundred percent of the participants completed the program and received certificates and stipends for the 2022 STEP.

Robert Noyce's science faculty are Dr. Cynthia Singleton (Robert Noyce Program PI), Dr. Joe Omojola, Dr. Murty Kambhampati (Robert Noyce Program Co-PIs), and Ms. Kimberly Stanley (Robert Noyce Education Coordinator) and Dr. Yi Zhen (Robert Noyce Program Coordinator). These faculty members provided instruction in Mathematics, Applications of STEM, Biology/Chemistry, English, and Physics, respectively. During the closing ceremony, students expressed their appreciation for the program, especially for the content areas that were unavailable to them in their schools.

The parents appreciated that the program provided a much-needed avenue for their children's academic growth during the summer. Dr. Harrell and Dr. Johnson congratulated the students on their successful completion and encouraged them to continue to strive for excellence. Faculty members expressed their availability and encouraged the students to reach out if they needed any academic or research assistance during their academic careers.

DR. DERRICK FREEMAN

INCREASE IN GRANT AWARDED BY THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH (NIH) ALL OF US RESEARCH PROGRAM (2022 - 2023 ACADEMIC YEAR)

Dr. Derrick Freeman (Associate Professor of Social Work, Grant – P.I.), Dr. Rebecca Chaisson (Dean of the Millie M. Charles School of Social Work, Grant – CoPI), Ms. Camille Alexander (MSW Admissions Coordinator, Grant – Program Assistant), and six graduate assistants will continue to work throughout the Greater New Orleans Metropolitan area promoting the participation of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities (the most underrepresented research communities/populations) in the All of Us Research Program. The All of Us Research program focuses on health disparities research and ways to engage the named underrepresented populations in health research. It is inviting one million people across the U.S. to help build one of the most diverse health databases in history. As a result of the excellent work by Dr. Freeman, the students, and the staff at SUNO, the program received a 15% increase in funding for the 2022–2023 year.

The All of Us Research Program welcomes participants from all backgrounds. Through clinical research, investigators will use the data gleaned from this program to learn how biology, lifestyle, and the environment affect health. The program makes the national data bank accessible to SUNO by providing data to be used by faculty, staff, and students conducting research.

DR. TORIN SANDERS

CHAIR OF ETHICS REVIEW BOARD, GUMBO COALITION, AND GRIEF AND TRAUMA EXPERT

Dr. Torin Sanders has been involved in several activities this month. On June 13, he was elected chair of the City of New Orleans Ethics Review Board. The Ethics Review Board is authorized by the Code of Ordinances for the City of New Orleans to administer and enforce the provisions of the Code. The Code applies to all City government officials, whether elected or appointed; all employees, whether classified or unclassified; and all members and employees of all boards, agencies, commissions, advisory committees, public trusts, and public benefit corporations of the City. Dr. Sanders has served on the Ethics Review Board, which meets monthly, since 2020. It is an honor for SUNO to provide leadership for the City of New

Orleans in this area of governmental function.

On the national scene, as part of the Essence Festival celebration, on July 1, 2022, Dr. Torin Sanders, among several community and civic leaders, received the 1st annual Gumbo Coalition award presented by Marc Morial, former Mayor of New Orleans and current President/CEO of The National Urban League. Awards were presented at a luncheon at Messina's. Dr. Sanders received the award for his excellence as a Spiritual Guide in the community, evolving from his role as the Pastor of Sixth Baptist Church. Spirituality in social work practice is another area of renewed interest, especially given disastrous community events, trauma, crisis, and the immense need for healing. On July 28, Dr. Sanders will deliver a two-hour presentation on "Understanding and helping children with grief and trauma" during the NOLA Public Schools Summer Training Collaborative. Over 200 employees of public schools within the New Orleans area will be in attendance during this day-long event. Dr. Sanders demonstrates all the diverse areas of social work practice through his work, from direct clinical knowledge about trauma and children to governmental representation on ethics.
