MCNAIR SCHOLARS PROGRAM



Nickolus Harrison and Dr. Jill Murray's clinical workshop proposal was accepted at the National Association of Social Workers – Louisiana Chapter Annual Conference, offering 1.5 Clinical Continuing Education Units (CEUs). This recognition highlights their research on critical social work issues. In Summer 2024, they worked with Dr. Kassidy Herring on Nickolus's research, "The Arbitrary Terms of Substance Use Disorder and the Validity of Research," challenging current definitions that affect research, treatment, and policy. Presenting this work emphasizes its significance and Nickolus's dedication.

Teeshell Lawrence, a McNair Scholar and Student Support Services member, will present her research at the 62nd Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences Annual Meeting in Denver from March 11-15. Her work, developed during the Summer 2024 Ronald E. McNair Research Project under mentor Dr. Raymond Delaney, addresses the school-to-prison pipeline. Titled "Stopping the Flow: Innovative Solutions to Dismantle the School-to-Prison Pipeline," her research explores strategies to disrupt systemic factors contributing to student incarceration.


