TED ELLIS SPEAKS: UNLOCKING THE VALUE OF ART THROUGH COMMERCE

Mr. Ted Ellis, Director of the SUNO Museum of Art (SUNOMA), was invited by the College of Business's Student Advisory Council to address the theme: Unlocking the Value of Art through Commerce as part of the Fall 2022 College of Business Week. Mr. Ellis's expertise, aside from being a practicing artist, includes art and culture curation, distribution, and marketing – roles that interest many business majors. Seventy-two graduate and undergraduate students were present during the presentation. Dr. Calvin Mackie founded STEM NOLA in 2013 as a non-profit organization to provide educational opportunities in STEM. Since its inception, STEM NOLA has engaged over 75,000+ students – mostly under-served low-income students – in hands-on STEM project-based learning.

HBCU-Stanford Think Tank Conference, Stanford University in San Jose, 'California, October 12 -14. Mrs. Vonda Taplin, Associate Director for Career Services, was awarded funding from UNCF to attend the 1st HBCU-Stanford Think Tank Conference, along with Higher Educational professionals from Howard University, Morehouse College, Spelman College, Dillard University, Bowie State University, and Meharry Medical College at Stanford University in San Jose, California, October 12 -14. The HBCU-Stanford Think Tank allowed Stanford to build intentional and authentic bidirectional partnerships with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) to enhance the academic and professional trajectory of students, staff, and faculty. One of SUNO Career Center's missions is to collaborate with and build relationships with graduate schools, creating partnerships that will strengthen research and internship opportunities for SUNO students.









The SUNO Suited for Success Career Services Center was proud to participate in the inaugural Money4Life Leadership Conference hosted by the Center for Advancement (CFA). The conference took place October 5-7th in Atlanta, Georgia. HBCUs from around the country came together for a power-packed conference providing vital information for students to prepare to purchase a home upon graduating. The meeting also brought together industry professionals who provided a personal experience for students to learn. Four students were selected from SUNO to participate. SUNO students attended breakout sessions, including budget and savings, credit academy, strengths finder, the power of everyday leadership, and encountering unconscious bias, to name a few. They gained priceless information from leading experts in the housing and financial industries. On the last day of the conference, students participated in a career fair with leading employers on hand to engage and have one-on-one interviews.

The career services staff ensured that students were supported as they participated in the conference. We look forward to many other opportunities the CFA will provide for our students.

On Monday, September 19, 2022, Chancellor Ammons and Vice Chancellor Rugon attended the Center for Financial Advancement—HomeFree USA (CFA) annual conference at the Omni Hotel in New Orleans. The University signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with CFA to provide SUNO students opportunities for jobs and internships in the real estate finance, mortgage, and banking industry, prepare them for solid financial growth, teach money management and social skills, introduce them to credit, wealth building and aspects of real estate finance. In addition, faculty, staff, parents, alums, and our local community members will also be able to take advantage of these services, empowering them with the information to promote their financial growth.

Through this partnership with HomeFree-USA, the University will receive \$25,000 in funding to ensure program results and assist the agency with identifying students and alums for potential internships and jobs.

After a 3-year hiatus, the men's and women's basketball teams—Knights and the Lady Knights-are back in The Castle. On Saturday, October 29, 2022, SUNO hosted a homecoming doubleheader. More than 50 guests, faculty, and students were on hand to welcome the new Southern University at New Orleans Museum of Art on October 27, 2022. Several dignitaries offered well wishes, including Dr. Leon Tarver, President Emeritus of the Southern University System. New Orleans City Councilman Eugene Green brought proclamations from Mayor LaToya Cantrell and the City Council. Louisiana Senator Joseph Bouie also send a proclamation.

The 15,000-square-foot museum consists of four galleries, each highlighting different works of art, including regional, national, and international works, and the university's permanent collection of artifacts from the Congo and Nigeria.

Museum Director Ted Ellis has been a professional artist for over thirty years. Known for his unique style of "Tede-ism," Ellis is self-taught and boldly blends realism and impressionism in his work. He received his M.A. in Museum Studies from SUNO.

Ellis' first curated exhibit is entitled "I Fear for My Life: The Art of Justice," showcasing the work of 18 artists. The pieces depict how African Americans and communities of color deal with fear when encountering law enforcement. The history of this experience is told through works about the infamous slave patrols, the quality of life in the form of the Black codes to the stop-and-frisk and policing strategies used as social control and repression.



Chancellor of SUNO meets Superintendent of New Orleans Public School System

On September 19, 2022, Chancellor Ammons met with Superintendent, Dr. Avis Williams to discuss furthering the existing partnership between the University and the Orleans Parish Schools. The team discussed the following:

- -Building a teacher pipeline—would like to see a "grow your own program" to address teacher shortage—field trips, job shadowing, etc.
- -Educators Rising Program for middle and high school students—spelling bees, STEM activities that will introduce the young student to the University environment
- -Creation of an Advisory Council to discuss the pipeline to a teaching career
- -K-5 Literacy partnership
- -Increasing dual enrollment, apprenticeships, and internships
- -Science of Reading for elementary school-aged children
- -Introduction of the JAG program that addresses educating youth in the Juvenile Justice System

Dr. Williams was very receptive and also added that we should consider offering the following academic concentrations:

- -School Counselor concentration
- -Clinical Mental Health Counseling
- -Instructional Coaching as an add-on certification



On Friday, October 28, 2022, the University hosted the Emmett Bashful A Southern Knight in New Orleans Scholarship Gala and Silent Auction outside the beautiful Arts and Humanities Building. It was a grand evening hosting a sold-out event with over 500 guests and fourteen corporate sponsors in attendance.

COVID-19 prevented the University from hosting the event over the last two years; however, this year's event was extraordinary as the University chose to honor two of its late University faculty with the Lifetime Achievement award. THE PRESIDENT OF ST. AUGUSTINE HIGH SCHOOL VISITS SUNO TO PROPOSE A

PARTNERSHIP THAT WILL UNITE THE TWO HISTORICALLY BLACK INSTITUTIONS

WITH THE NEW ORLEANS POLICE DEPARTMENT







St. Augustine High School (St. Aug.), the country's only African American college preparatory school for young men, would like to explore a potential partnership to create a pipeline to address the crime issues and shortage of law enforcement personnel.

President Aulston Taylor is specifically interested in the Criminal Justice and Forensic Science programs that would create a pipeline to the world of law enforcement for students interested in joining the New Orleans Police Department (NOPD).

This partnership is in direct alignment with the Chancellor's vision of SUNO being the premier urban laboratory school that addresses healthcare disparities, education, crime, and poverty issues in the city and across the country.

SUNO alumnus Lt. Merrill Merrick was in attendance and shared his vision of how the New Orleans Police Department (NOPD) and shared the department's role in the partnership. The NOPD would assist with aligning the SUNO and New Orleans Police Academy's curriculums to create a clear law enforcement plan rooted in internships for graduating seniors beginning with the class of 2023.

The Chancellor agreed to offer two St. Aug. graduates a scholarship (complete with tuition and fees) to enroll in the Criminal Justice program. Once a graduate of SUNO, they would enter the law enforcement field, preferably NOPD, and chart their course towards a leadership role within the organization.

This alliance and collaboration would build up future leaders of our city to attain significant leadership roles in NOPD.



Recent SUNO retiree Dr. John Penny (along with his wife, Dr. Mary Penny) was honored by New Orleans Police Department (NOPD) and Louisiana State Police (LSP) for his 39 years of service through education in criminal justice. Presenters included Alumnus NOPD Superintendent Shaun Ferguson, who presented Dr. Penny with the Superintendent's Coin Service of Excellence Award for his many years of dedication to the University and the City of New Orleans. Alumnus LSP Colonel Lamar Davis was also on hand to share some words of appreciation and well wishes for Dr. Penny's retirement. SUNO Chancellor Dr. James Ammons, Jr. and several SUNO faculty and staff members were in attendance for this momentous occasion.

Dr. Penny's quote: Dr. Penny sees himself as "the voice in the community that whispers above the crowd."

The University will begin meeting with New Orleans Police Department and the State Police to discuss how SUNO can address the current shortage of police officers in our city, state, and nationwide.
