






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

To date, the Ag Center's Produce Giveaways have distributed more than 1,200 five-pound bags of fresh food to families in five parishes.

















### **Greauxing Financial Future: Financial Literacy and Empowerment Workshop with First South Farm Credit**

The Southern University Ag Center and the College of Agricultural, Human and Environmental Sciences (CAHES) held the Greauxing Financial Future: "Financial Literacy and Empowerment Workshop with First South Farm Credit" for students enrolled in the CAHES in the Valdry Center for Philanthropy on Oct. 23.

John Sport, Vice President and Young, Beginning, Small Farmer (YBS) Director provided students with information on the financial literacy touching on the ways that they can begin to build credit, information on the importance of a credit score in lending, and budgeting.

"When you're young and you're paying for does education and living expenses, it's challenging sometimes to make those credit card payments when they come up," expressed Sport when discussed how to build credit. "I share this with you now so that you can get off to the best start possible. Whatever credit you have, thirty-five percent of your (credit) score is based on how timely you make your payments. So ever if it's a credit card, just at least make that minimum payment.

By making that minimum payment, you meet the standard of a timely payment. Do everything you can to make that minimum payment on time."

Dr. Renita Marshall, Vice Chancellor for Academic & Student Services/Associate Dean, told the students that she wished that she knew the information that Mr. Sport shared while she was in college and implored the students to take head to the information that was shared.

First South Farm Credit also presented a \$2,500.00 check to CAHES to support student scholarships.

### **Iowa State University School of Science and Technology Informational Session**



Jaguar N.E.S.T. **Receives Generous Donations from Aldi** and La Capitale (LA) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated



The College of Agricultural, Human and Environmental Sciences proudly recognizes and extends its gratitude to Aldi and the La Capitale (LA) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated for their recent contributions in support of the Jaguar Nourishment, Essentials, Support to Thrive (N.E.S.T.), a campus-based initiative designed to combat food insecurity among college students.

Aldi provided a donation of \$1,000.00, while the La Capitale (LA) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated, under the leadership of Dr. Raquel Square Ayles, presented a \$2,500.00 donation on September 22, 2025. These contributions reflect a shared commitment to ensuring that Southern University students have consistent access to nutritious meals and essential items.

Launched in November 2024, the Jaguar N.E.S.T. was established to address the growing problem of food insecurity on campus. Research indicates that nearly 40% of college students in the United States experience food insecurity, defined as the lack of reliable access to affordable and nutritious food, according to a 2019 report by Goldrick-Rab, Baker-Smith, Coca, Looker, and Williams. At Southern University this issue is even more critical, as the campus is located in a food desert with limited access to grocery stores



and fresh food outlets. Through the leadership of the Dietetic Internship Program and the ongoing support of community partners such as State Representative Vanessa LaFleur, the Baton Rouge Sigma Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc., and the My Kid Plate Foundation, the Jaguar N.E.S.T. has already demonstrated measurable impact. Since its opening, the program has served more than 500 students across campus.

The Jaguar N.E.S.T. operates entirely through donations and volunteer efforts, showcasing the power of collective action. With convenient locations at Pinkie Thrift Hall and the Horace W. Moody Intramural Sports Complex, the program provides accessible resources that directly support student success, health, and well-being.

"These generous contributions from Aldi and the La Capitale (LA) Chapter of The Links, Incorporated reinforce the importance of community collaboration in addressing food insecurity," expressed Alexis D. Motley, Dietetic Internship Director and coordinator of the Jaquar N.E.S.T. The continued generosity of community partners, donors, and volunteers ensures that the Jaguar N.E.S.T. remains a vital resource for Southern University students.

Every success reflects SUCDL's unwavering commitment to delivering high-quality early childhood education, strengthening Southern University families, and advancing the mission of the College of Agricultural, Human, and Environmental Sciences.

### **Acknowledgment of Leadership**

The achievements of 2024–2025 are made possible through the extraordinary leadership of Dr. Renita Marshall, whose vision continues to guide the Southern University Child Development Laboratory (SUCDL). Her commitment to innovation, accountability, and excellence ensures that SUCDL thrives as both a learning laboratory for Southern University students and a model for high-quality early childhood education.

Dr. Marshall's leadership has created a foundation where children are nurtured, families are embraced as partners, and staff are empowered to grow. SUCDL's success is a direct reflection of her unwavering support.

### **Program Performance**

SUCDL closed the 2024–2025 academic year with outstanding accomplishments in program quality. The program earned a CLASS average score of 5.98, placing us in the High Proficient category, and achieved an Excellent rating of 6.23 in another performance dimension.

Additionally, SUCDL reached a major milestone by becoming a 4-Star Center, affirming our commitment to excellence in early childhood education and care. These results reflect the hard work of our teachers, staff, and leadership team in providing intentional, research-based instruction, and nurturing environments for children.

### **Professional Growth and Staff Achievements**

Faculty and staff advanced their professional expertise through participation in the Louisiana Department of Education Teacher Leader Summit, where SUCDL was positively impacted. This platform provides access to innovative, research-driven strategies that will directly strengthen instructional delivery and classroom practices. The conference also fostered collaboration among educators statewide, enabling SUCDL faculty to bring back best practices that will enhance teacher-child interactions, improve lesson planning, and support differentiated instruction for diverse learners.

The benefit to staff extends beyond professional development, it positions SUCDL teachers to implement new strategies that nurture children's critical thinking, creativity, and social-emotional growth. As a result, the projected student outcomes include measurable gains in school readiness, increased family engagement in learning, and stronger foundations for academic success.

Highlights of staff achievement include:

- · Krystal Blackwell, Creative Arts Teacher, completed her Master's in Early Childhood Education.
- · Brittany Robinson, Assistant Director and Instructional Coach, earned her second Master's degree in Early Intervention.
- · Alexis C. Perkins, SUCDL Director, was an active participant in the restructuring of tuition, registration, and enrollment processes.

These changes expanded enrollment of all family types (student-parent families, faculty and staff families, and community families) while maintaining program quality and integrity.

## Five CAHES Students Explore Coastal Science at LUMCON



Southern University's College of Agricultural, Human and Environmental Sciences students Abriana Rubin, Chasity Joseph, Terrance Banks, Myles Moore, and Jared Anthony participated in the MissDelta Initiative's Fall 2025 field excursion to the Louisiana Universities Marine Consortium (LUMCON) in Cocodrie, Louisiana, held October 10–12, 2025.

During the trip, students explored Louisiana's unique coastal ecosystems through hands-on learning experiences, including marsh transect studies, salt marsh ecology, and a research cruise aboard the R/V Acadiana. These immersive activities introduced participants to real-world environmental science – from water quality testing to studying coastal biodiversity and ecosystem health.

The experience fostered collaboration, scientific curiosity, and environmental awareness among students pursuing agricultural, environmental, and marine sciences.

This trip was part of the MissDelta Initiative, which connects undergraduates with applied research and field experiences that strengthen workforce readiness in sustainability and ecological stewardship.

The event serves as a bridge between traditional rodeo culture and youth engagement in agricultural sciences, a core mission of the Livestock Program.

"Our goal is to provide a space where students, alumni, and the community can come together to celebrate excellence and hands-on learning."

In addition to showcasing talented ropers, the

When disaster strikes, access to reliable information and communication can be just as essential as food and water. The Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center (SU Ag Center) is meeting that need through its Mobile Technology Education Center (M-Tech Unit), a mobile classroom that delivers educational programs and disaster recovery support across Louisiana.

Launched with federal recovery funds after Hurricanes Gustav and Ike, the M-Tech Unit was created to help small agricultural businesses rebuild. "After those storms, many of our clientele along the coast lost everything, including their businesses, equipment, and customer base," said William Augustine, M.Ed., Project Coordinator ECP/ MTEC Technician at Southern University Ag Center. "We developed four certification programs—Food and Farm Safety, Small Business Development, Sustainable Urban Agriculture, and Master Small Ruminant Production—to help them get back on their feet."

The mobile classroom is equipped with internet access, computers, and printers, making it a traveling hub for education and outreach. Although not originally built for disaster response, its capabilities have made it a vital tool in crisis situations.

"When hurricanes or tornadoes hit and power and communications go down, we can roll in and provide internet access so people can contact insurance companies, apply for SNAP benefits, or complete FEMA paperwork," Augustine said. "Even if the community has lost power, we can establish a connection and help them communicate with local or federal government."

After Hurricane Laura, the unit deployed to Bastrop, Louisiana, where residents had been cut off from essential services. "We set up internet, computers, and printers inside and outside the unit so more people could apply for assistance," Augustine said. "We also distributed water and COVID supplies. People were so relieved to finally move forward."

When not supporting disaster response, the M-Tech Unit fulfills its core mission of providing statewide certification training. Augustine said this dual role—education during normal times and response during disasters—makes the unit uniquely valuable. "It's not just what we teach," he said. "It's how we show up for people when they need us most."

While the M-Tech Unit operates within Southern University's Extension programs, its work connects closely with national efforts to strengthen disaster preparedness and community resilience. The Extension Disaster Education Network (EDEN), a collaboration of land-grant universities that share research-based resources before, during, and after disasters, highlights programs like Southern's to demonstrate how Extension supports recovery. Augustine hopes sharing the M-Tech model will inspire similar outreach in other states.



"We do a lot of extension work that may not be widely known," he said. "EDEN could be a great platform to help more people learn about what we offer, and help other states consider similar models."

With its innovative design and boots-on-the-ground approach, the M-Tech Unit stands as a model of how land-grant institutions can combine education and disaster resilience to meet community needs. As Augustine puts it: "Wherever we can help, we go."

**Evaluation of Muscadine Table Grape Varieties** for Regional Adaptability and **Market Quality**

Sugargate Triumph

The Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center (SU Ag Center) Viticulture Proiect is currently evaluating several commercially available table muscadine cultivars to determine vine vigor, yield potential, fruit quality, and ripening period. The fruits produced during the season are made available for interested growers to sample and use in recommending cultivars for local U-pick operations and fresh market production.

The study includes a diverse collection of bronze, red, and black muscadine grapes planted in a randomized block design, including Hall, Late Fry, Big Red, Black Beauty, Darlene, Dixie Red, Sugargate, Triumph, Janet, and Fry Seedless. Preliminary observations indicate differences in bud break, flowering time, and sugar accumulation, with an average Brix value of 18.0° across cultivars. Popular table variety Black Beauty recorded a Brix of 17.0°, while the highest sugar contents were observed in Sugargate (20.5°) and Hall (20.26°), and the lowest in Big Red (13.2°). The weight of individual berries ranged from 2 -12 g/berry and size varied from 13-27 mm.

These table grapes were also showcased during

college welcome week, Ag Week, and several fundraising events. The vineyard continues to serve as a learning site for new and existing farmers seeking information on varietal performance for table and wine grapes in the region. As part of its outreach, the SU Ag Center recently visited White Farm in Baton Rouge, LA, where Pastor White is working with the viticulture team to revitalize his muscadine vineyard as a local U-pick operation. Farmers like Pastor White represent the core mission of the SU Aq Center's Viticulture and Enology research to support and strengthen grape production for the region.

The SU Ag Center will continue to evaluate table and wine grapes for regional adaptability and stand ready to assist growers interested in establishing vineyards for fresh market, juice, or wine production.

### SU Ag Center Hosted Ag Drone Certification Test Prep Training







The Southern University Ag Center hosted a drone certification test preparation training at the M. A. Edmound Multi-Purpose Building from Oct. 13-16, 2025 through a partnership with Alcorn State University.

The four-day training was designed for farmers, researchers, students, educators, entrepreneurs, and professionals interested in using drones for agriculture, research, business applications, or anyone seeking to become an FAA-certified drone pilot.

"The training was held to help individuals prepare for the FAA-certification exam," said Dr. LaShunda Anderson Hodges, SU Ag Center Research Professor of Soil and Plant Sciences and FAA Part 107 Certified Drone Pilot. "By hosting training sessions, the SU Ag Center provides valuable opportunities for education, workforce development, and innovation, ensuring that our community stays at the forefront of agricultural and technological advancements," added Dr. Hodges.

"Farmers are getting older and it's harder to get the younger generation to get into farming so Dr. Hodges and I came up with the idea to inject advanced technology into drones to peak the interest of more people in the field of agriculture," said Azali Muhammad, Drone Director at Alcorn State University and SU College of Ag alumni.

The training provided participants with information on the fundamentals of drone operations, FAA Part 107 regulations, airspace classifications, weather effects on drones, safety protocols, and how to prepare for the FAA Part 107 certification exam. Participants also gained hands-on knowledge of how drones can be applied in agriculture, research, and technology-driven industries.

Dr. Hodges is planning to hold another training in earlier 2026.
